HIS HEAD CUT OFF.

An Unknown Man Killed on the Montana Union.

About 11 o'clock last night the engineer and fireman on switch engine No. 107, noticed about half a mile east of the Montana round-house the dead body of a man lying beside the main track. Without disturbing the body the railroad men returned to the shops and sent word to Judge Fitzgerald, as the city's acting coroner. Judge Fitzgerald went to the scene, and found the body to be that of a young man, perhaps 22 or 23 years old. The head had been completely severed from the trunk, and lay some little distance from it. The clothes were those of a workingman, black coat, dark trousers and a black hat. No one was able to identify the man. Judge Fitzgerald instructed Undertaker Ehret to take charge of the body. The inquest will be held at the judge's office at 11 o'clock this morning.

Judge Fitzgerald examined the wheels of engine No. 107, but they were free from blood and bore no indications whatever of having run over the man. The supposition is that he was killed by the passenger train which reaches here at 10:15 P. M.

Officer White while unable to identify the body positively, said the man looked very much to him like William Thomas, a rancher living down the valley, whom he arrested for drunkenness late Tuesday night. Thomas had left his team in the streets and was wandering aimlessly about very drunk. He was fined five dollars and costs in the police court yesterday, and was not released until 6 o'clock last evening when a friend guaranteed the payment of the fine.
