

SECRET SOCIETY CHAT

Pertinent Paragraphs Concerning the Lodges of Three Cities.

NEW LODGES IN FORMATION

Many Notes Social and Fraternal Gleaned From Various Lodges Rooms-An Exceptionally Quiet Week.

In secret society circles during the past week matters have been extremely quiet. In nearly all of the societies sickness has caused the absence of a great many members and the business transacted has been very light.

At a special meeting of the A. F. & A. M. Friday night there were but a few members present and but little business was done. In fact nothing was done except to adjourn until next Friday night, when it is thought there will be a full attendance.

The P. O. S. of A. met in regular session on Thursday night. In the absence of President Walker Vice President Spier took the chair. The meeting had a very fair attendance, although a great many were obliged to be absent owing to illness. Perhaps the principal matter to come before the meeting was the election of delegates to the state encampment, which is held in Helena to-day. After a short deliberation, Vice-President Spier and N. H. Morley were elected as delegates to the meeting and to leave for Helena last night. No other important business was transacted. The select knights of the P. O. S. of A. held a regular meeting Saturday night.

At the meeting of Colfax Lodge No. 22, I. O. O. F., last Tuesday night the attendance was up to the average. Nothing of importance was brought before the meeting. On Saturday evening Laurel Encampment met in regular session. The attendance was very fair, but no business of any importance was brought before the meeting.

On Friday evening several delegates left for Butte to take the Daughters of Rebekah degree. Among those who left for Butte were: Mrs. C. H. Tracy, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Wier and daughter, E. O. Farrell, E. R. Powell, Samuel Fryer, J. T. Templeton and others. The Rebekah degree was taken in Butte by these persons preparatory to organizing a Rebekah lodge in this city. It has not been fully decided upon as yet when this degree will be organized here. It will probably be organized next Saturday night at the regular meeting of Laurel Encampment. If not then it has been decided to fix the date as the second Saturday night in March when full arrangements will be made for the organization.

Grand Warden C. H. Tracy of Montana received word last Wednesday of the death of his mother, Mrs. William Tracy, of Guthrie Centre, Iowa, his former home. Mr. Tracy receives the sympathy of his many brethren.

The Knights of Pythias meeting on Monday night was quite well attended. The second degree was conferred on three candidates and other important business was transacted. Preparations were also made for the proper celebration of the twenty-seventh anniversary of the foundation of the order on Thursday night. No pains were spared in making the occasion one not soon to be forgotten by those present, and all guests were greatly pleased with the entertainment. The music was sweetly rendered and the addresses made were exceptionally clever, and the many guests were in a happy humor when lunch was announced. An elaborate luncheon was served, which wound up the affair in a most agreeable manner.
