LARGEY'S BIG LAWSUIT.

Summons Served in the Case Against the
Blue Bird Company.

BUTTE, June 16.—Under Sheriff Gallagher
to-day serving a summons on the
Blue Bird Mining company on a com-
plaint filed by Patrick A. Largey, for un-
lawfully extracting ores from the Little
Darling, Lena K. and Little Darling Fra-
ction lodes. The case will be tried before
the circuit court at Helena.

The suit is brought to recover damages to
the amount of \$1,800,000. It is said that
ore to the value of \$2,500,000 has been
taken from the lode during the same time.
Every company booked by him ex-
cept grand opera, for which there is not
suitable convenience, will positively ap-
pear in Anaconda also.

SENT TO THE JAIL.

A Pickpocket in Keeping for the District
Court.

BUTTE, June 16.—Saturday night Officer
Anderson arrested a man in the saloon
under the Lizzie block on a charge of
picking pockets. The man gave his name
as Frank Howard and was placed in the
county jail. Yesterday he was arraigned
before Judge McMurphy on a charge of
robbery and entered a plea of not guilty.
His examination was set for this afternoon.
When the case was called a half
dozen witnesses testified that Howard
had been caught in the act and that they
held him until a policeman could be de-
termined to arrest him. Howard's denials
and explanations failed to impress the
court and he was held to the district
court on a charge of robbery from the
person. Bonds were fixed at \$250, but
even this small security could not be
given by Howard and he was jailed.

GREEN GOODS MEN.

A Trio of Swindlers Arraigned in Judge
McMurphy's Court.

BUTTE, June 16.—F. E. Guyot, W. G.
Ward and A. E. Selmer, the three men
arrested Saturday for trying to pass
counterfeit money and impersonating of-
ficers, were arraigned before Judge Mc-
Murphy this afternoon. Selmer showed
signs of weakening, and pleaded guilty to
the charge of obtaining money under
false pretenses, and said that the money
obtained by "shoving the queer" had
been appropriated by another man who
had left the city. Guyot and Ward stood
charged with impersonating officers and
making false arrests. They entered pleas
of not guilty, and will be examined to-
morrow when Selmer will also be ar-
raigned for sentence.

neral of Thomas Dunn, who was ac-
cidentally killed in the Alta mine yester-
day. Mr. Dunn was a charter member of
the court that buried him, and formerly
resided in this city.

is set for June 22. Mr. Lally also desires
to state that the goods in question were
not sent to the two young men that were
there, but were sent by J. Lally at Butte

BATTLE OF BUNKER HILL.

A Big Celebration To-day—Speeches,
Music and Fireworks.

BUTTE, June 16.—To-morrow will be the
anniversary of the battle of Bunker Hill,
and it will be the first time the anniversary
was ever celebrated in Butte City, a
good many thousand miles from the place
where the famous fight took place which
started the war of American Independence
in good shape. Washington Camp,
No. 18, of the P. O. S. of A., has in charge
the celebration of the day. The day's
celebration will be held at the fire hall,
at 10:30 o'clock this morning. The line will
form on Broadway at Fidelity hall, move
west to Washington street, north to
Quartz, east to Main, south to Park, and
east to Arizona, where the cars will be
taken to the Columbia Gardens. A
squad of police will lead the line, fol-
lowed by the Boston & Montana band,
the commandery of the P. O. S. of A.,
the various camps of the P. O. S. of A.,
the G. A. R., the Sons of Veterans, the
Sons of St. George, and the representa-
tives of other organizations.

All paraders will take cars for the
garden at the corner of Park and Arizona
streets.

Cars will run to the grounds every half
hour during the forenoon and every 15
minutes in the time the parade is over.
Besides music, dancing, etc., there will
be short speeches delivered by favorite or-
ators, among them Hon. W. A. Clark and
Lee Mantle. Hon. Martin Maginnis may
not be able to be present, but it is hoped
he will be on hand.

In the evening there will be the grand-
est display of fireworks ever seen in
Butte City. The Boston and Montana
band will give a concert at the grounds in
the evening.
