SUTTON IS SICK OF IT

The Irish National League Secretary Intends to Quit the Job.

John P. Sutton is sick and tired of Irish politics on this side of the water and is going to resign his position as secretary of the Irish National League.

In a few days he will be free from every evil influence, out from under the thumb of the viciously inclined faction leaders and under the protecting wings of his friend and counselor, John Fitzgerald, the retired president of the league.

The two Johns will hereafter devote themselves to business pursuits, seeking their rewards in a legitimate way from honest toil. Sutton will be Fitzgerald's right hand man in railroad contracting business.

In a letter to a friend in this city Sutton says: "I am weary of this work. It has made me poor and exposed me to a heap of undesired abuse. I gave up a lucrative position as accountant for a big firm in order to serve the league. I have given it the best that is in me, but it seems that the more we work and struggle the more ground we lose, the greater is our discredit at home and the fiercer is the hostility here, both within and without our organization. I am sick and tired of it all. The league pays me a salary, but it does not pay my expenses. Every fraud who has a game to work comes to me with his plan, and in entertaining him I am out of pocket. Nor can I collect the money I am compelled to spend, for I don't handle the cash."

"I am tired of working to such little advantage to myself and am going to quit. Let them get another secretary."
