The judges, Messrs. D. Cohen, ex. Ashford and Sines, decided in favor of the affirmative. The next meeting promises to be a very interesting one, as the subject for debate will be in charge of ladies. A committee was appointed to select a subject and appoint debaters. There are several lady members who are eloquent orators, and their debate next week will surely be heard by a large audience. The subject will be given out during the week; also the ladies' names who are to debate.

The editor, W. H. Allen, read a very interesting report of the progress of the society. He spoke of the necessity of securing larger quarters for holding meetings. When the organization first started out it was feared by many that it could not long survive under such small attendance; now the members were encouraged by large audiences and the lyceum is destined to become a literary factor in the city. The paper was highly enjoyed, as it was replete with witticisms and good words for all members. With such popular and intelligent young men and women at its head the lyceum will indeed thrive and become a source of unmeasured benefit to the city.

PUBLIC SCHOOL NOTES. [Under this head will appear regularly in the Sunday STANDARD items of information and school news calculated to be of interest and importance to all patrons and friends of our schools. The items will be contributed by the teachers and High school pupils, who hope thus to awaken, if possible, a livelier interest in our educational work.]

No investment pays so largely in satisfaction as the tax which supports good schools. Of the 47 pupils enrolled in the High school room during the year '02 are now in attendance. The bookkeeping class will have a course in actual business as soon as they complete a course in theory.

The superintendent's office hour is from 9 to 10. Regular monthly teachers' meetings on the Friday closing each school month at 3:30 o'clock. A system of calisthenics or free gymnastics will be introduced in the rooms of the Central building as a relaxation for pupils who have no recesses.

On Monday there will be a general shift of pupils and four grades will be placed in the new building on Park avenue. Notes of next week on this theme. The record for attendance and punctuality during the present month was very excellent until the big storm of Friday when only about one half of the enrollment were present.

Miss Shea failed to reach her school at Carroll Friday morning on account of the blockade. She has three grades to manage and teach, but is working hard to bring them up to the required standard and should be encouraged by all. All of the teachers are working faithfully to stimulate regular and punctual attendance. Parents are urged to cooperate along this line as it means the fixing of habits of promptness and reliability, upon which the future success of these children is largely dependent.

Superintendent Kern has expressed himself as highly pleased with his corps of teachers, rating them far above the average, and he has also strongly commended his predecessor on the systematic organization of the schools and fine results obtained. Very few changes are contemplated or necessary.

The regular weekly entertainment of musical and literary exercises given by the Delta Sigma society last Friday afternoon was fully up to the average. Ben Baker was chosen president to fill vacancy and he presided with skill and dignity. Parents and others are cordially invited to be present each week. The High school paper read on these occasions is full of pith and point and local hits, and affords a field for such journalistic talent as may be developed.
