## IN SOUTH AFRICA.

A Former Resident of Montana Writes About Affairs in That Region.

Under date of November 1, John Jarvis, who has many friends in this city and in Granite county, writes to his brother an interesting letter from Salisbury, South Africa, after a journey of three months from Victoria to Johannesburg and thence three days to Salisbury. The letter speaks of abundance of game found on the journey into Africa and gives interesting details respecting the life and habits of the Kaffirs, from whom the traveler secures vegetables, Indian corn and the like in exchange for old clothing and trifes of every description. The letter describes improvised arrangements for cooking and camping in a manner which suggests that the Montana prospector is quite at home in the South African fields. "On the journey," writes Mr. Jarvis, "I did not find timber fit for lumber in the Transvaal. On this side the timber improved, but nowhere was it anything like what is in Montana. Mining timbers last little more than one year." Salisbury is described as a good-sized town having about 200 whites among its inhabitants with an equipment of stores, churches, saloons and the like. Living is costly and freight rates are high, but wages are good although at this time, industry is practically at a standstill and nothing will be done until the conclusion of the war now going on. There appears to be no uncertainty as to the result of the war, at the close of which a great impulse is expected in the entire region and prosperous times are anticipated.
