

GET MARCHING ORDERS

Captain McQuade Called Upon to Hold His Guards in Readiness.

AT THE ARMORY ALL DAY

The Wolfe Tone Guards Were Under Arms From Early Morn Till Night—Will Assemble at 9 O'clock To-Day.

Early yesterday morning Capt. James McQuade of the Wolfe Tone Guards received a dispatch from Co. H. C. Kessler of the First regiment N. G. M., commanding him to assemble his company at his armory at 9 o'clock a. m. and to hold them in readiness to march at a moment's notice.

"It is to protect life and property," said Captain McQuade, "that we are ordered out, every member of this company will do his full duty. We will not be asked to do any dirty work, I am sure. If we should be commanded to do that which is against our ideas of right, we shall not be obliged to obey the order."

These sentiments were loudly cheered by the members of Captain McQuade's command. Captain Kelly and Lieut. J. M. Kennedy briefly addressed the men also, endorsing the remarks of the commander of the company.

RESOLUTION.

Resolution ordering the construction of certain sidewalks in the city of Anaconda, Deer Lodge county, Montana. Be it resolved by the city council of the city of Anaconda, in the county of Deer Lodge and state of Montana: That there shall be constructed by the owners of property at their own cost and expense in the city of Anaconda, in front of and opposite such property and under direction of the street commissioner within twenty days from the passage of this resolution wooden sidewalks, to be constructed of lumber not less than one and one-half (1 1/2) inches in thickness, upon the following named streets and of the following dimensions, to-wit: First street, from Hickory to Elm street, walks to be ten (10) feet in width. Hickory street, from First street to Park avenue, walk to be six (6) feet in width. Elm street, from First street to Park avenue, walk to be six (6) feet in width. Maple street, from First street to Park avenue, walk to be six (6) feet in width. Locust street, from First street to Park avenue, walk to be six (6) feet in width. And the street commissioner is hereby ordered to serve written notice not later than April 28, 1894, upon all parties (or their agents) owning lots affected by this resolution, to comply with the same within the time as herein fixed for the construction of said sidewalks.

That a sanitary sewer to be constructed of vitrified clay pipe twelve (12) inches in diameter properly connected with all necessary manways, and appurtenances for connecting house drains, be and the same is hereby ordered constructed on Main street from a point sixty-five (65) feet south of the south line of First street, to a point twenty (20) feet north of the south side of Front street in the city of Anaconda, Montana.

The same to be constructed under the supervision of the city engineer of said city as a part of a sanitary system, and for the purpose of completing and providing connections with said sewer system for the said part of said city. And be it further resolved and ordered that the city clerk is hereby authorized and ordered to advertise in the Anaconda STANDARD, a daily newspaper published within the corporate limits of said city of Anaconda, for bids to be filed in the office of the city clerk not later than the twenty-third day of May, A. D. 1894, at six o'clock p. m. of said day, and the city clerk is hereby directed to cause this resolution to be published in the Anaconda STANDARD, a daily newspaper published within the corporate limits of the city of Anaconda, aforesaid.
