Bickelman, G. W. Proctor and Elroy E. Simmons left without appointment to attend school. Before reading the appointments Bishop Joyce said he was not satisfied with them, but he never had been with any list he ever made. He wished he could put every pastor into a good charge but it was impossible to do it in Montana. His spoke of the hard work on the part of the pastors and their noble wives, and added that he was frank to confess that he would rather be a bishop than a presiding elder or pastor. A large number of important and minor reports of committees were made and adopted at the morning session of conference. The statistician secretary made a report showing a general condition of prosperity in the church of the state. The committee on the Montana University reported the indebtedness existing on that institution and a motion was carried to apportion it among the various charges of the state. The expenses from printing the minutes of the conference were raised by subscription from the pastors present. On Sunday school work recommended that the invitation of the State Sunday School association to unite in Sunday school work and organization, be accepted, and created considerable discussion. It developed during the debate that Helena's selfishness had grossly manifested itself even in religion and that the association took all the honors and credit and asked the Methodists to pay the greatest share of expenses. A motion was adopted that the Methodist church draw out of the association and push the Sunday school work on its own hook. The committee on resolutions thanked Bishop Joyce for his presence and good work, the pastor and ladies of the Mountain View church for their entertainment of the ministers, Dr. Koen for his spiritual sermons, and the railroads, street railway and newspapers for courtesies extended. After the adjournment of the conference Bishop Joyce and a number of the pastors left for Helena to attend the first state convention of the Epworth league, which convened there to-day.

WITHOUT HIS WHISKERS.

Seth Longabaugh Returns to Butte and His Friends Don't Know Him.

BUTTE, Aug. 13.—The principal part of Seth Longabaugh, all of him in fact except his whiskers, arrived in town today after an absence of several months. The veteran prospector marched up Main street to his usual haunts but no one recognized him. He finally wrote on a card "I am Seth Longabaugh without his whiskers," and handed it to all the old time friends he met and then got a hearty shake of the hand from all sides. Interviewed by a STANDARD reporter as to his whiskers, Seth said that there being no wind in southern Nevada, he had no further use for his whiskers and he cut them off. Seth has been all through Nevada and California and finally came back to Butte to see a live city again.

THE BODY RECOVERED.

Eddie McNamee Died From the Bad Air Rather Than the Fall.

BUTTE, Aug. 13.—The body of Eddie McNamee, the boy who fell down the abandoned Excelsior shaft in North Walkerville yesterday afternoon, was recovered at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon. All night and all of to-day men were at work unsuccessfully. The way the body was finally recovered was on the plan outlined in the STANDARD this morning. The air was forced down into the shaft by a line of hose connected with the air compressor at the Goldsmith. When the air was sufficiently purified, Messrs. Finnegan and Skelton went to the bottom and got the body. The shaft is 155 feet deep on an incline. No bones were broken and it is supposed death resulted from foul air rather than the fall, although the roll down the incline would probably have caused death of itself. An inquest was held by Coroner Porter and a verdict found in accordance with the facts. The shaft has been deserted for a great many years. The owners are Edward McNamee, father of the dead boy, James McGovern, Henry Mueller, James Cummings and Dennis O'Donnell.

Dying in Dakota.

BUTTE, Aug. 13.—Coroner Porter received a dispatch Saturday night announcing that his brother-in-law, Levy Axtell, a wealthy resident of Kindred, N. D., was at the point of death and requesting that his nephew, Charles Axtell, be notified at once. Chauncey Harris drove out to Silver Star yesterday to get young Axtell and brought him to Butte to-day. He will start for Dakota in the morning.

SCHOOLS OPEN SEPT. 10

A Slight Delay Owing to the Completion of Necessary Repairs.

TWO TEACHERS RESIGNED

Three New Ones Added to the List —The Board to Meet in Senator Quarters—Old Rules Readopted.

BUTTE, Aug. 13.—A special meeting of the board of school trustees was held this afternoon with all the members present except Curtis and Hawley. Miss Rogers, Miss Broughton and Miss Majors were added to the list of teachers for the coming term, which completes the corps. Miss McStee and Miss Stanley, who had been elected some time ago, sent in their resignations on account of ill health. Both resignations were accepted and a resolution adopted expressing sympathy for the ladies and the hope that they would soon recover health.

The board decided to open the school term on the second Monday in September. They had intended to open on the first Monday, but were delayed on account of a number of repairs that can not be completed by that time. It was decided to fix up an extra in the South Butte school building.

The board has heretofore been meeting in a small dingy room on the second floor of the high school building, but today a resolution was adopted instructing a committee to fit up a larger room on the first floor and put it in respectable shape for board meetings. The clerk will also occupy the new room.

The rules and regulations which governed the board and the schools last year were readopted for the present year. The clerk was given supervision over the janitors, with power to discharge when necessary. He was also instructed to see the janitors to work about a week before the opening of school.

The clerk was ordered to advertise for bids to furnish the district with wood and coal for winter.

The board ordered the Stringtown school to be closed next Friday. The school has been running for three months and taught by Miss Janie Broughton, one of the teachers elected to-day for the regular school term. She is a graduate of the normal training class.

Clerk Faxon was instructed to purchase a number of flags and the national colors will be placed over every school house in the district.


