THEY MADE THE FUR FLY

Attorneys Who Don't Think Much of Each Other.

CADWELL TOOK THE TRICK

The Old Schmalhausen Case Comes Up Again in the District Court of Silver Bow.

BUTTE, Jan. 5.—There was an unusually lively proceeding in the district court this morning when the Schmalhausen divorce case came up before Judge McHatton on a motion of the doctor's to set aside the order of the court made last Saturday requiring him to pay certain alimony for the benefit of his children, who are now in the custody of his divorced wife. The order was made in the absence of Mr. Lippincott, counsel for Dr. Schmalhausen, and therefore in default, and the motion heard this morning was based on Mr. Lippincott's allegation that he had been taken by surprise through the fraud practiced on them by Mr. Cadwell, counsel for Mrs. Schmalhausen, who, they alleged, had the matter called up and passed on in their absence after he had consented to let the case go over.

Mr. Lippincott, one of the doctor's attorneys, made an affidavit to the effect that he had received a note from Mr. Cadwell on the day, and prior to the hearing of the petition, for alimony, requesting Mr. Lippincott to draw up the stipulation for a continuance and send it to him at Bozeman, from which it was to be inferred that the matter was to be continued.

Mr. Cadwell replied to the charge of fraud made by Mr. Lippincott, and said that the least he could say was that it was unkind, in view of the fact that he made eight trips from Bozeman to Butte before he could get a hearing on the motion for alimony. He called the court's attention to the fact that Mr. Lippincott was present in court when the case was not for hearing, and that he agreed to it. Mr. Cadwell also made an affidavit and denied that he consented to a further postponement, and on the contrary emphatically told Mr. Lippincott that he should insist on a hearing when the motion was called up. Cadwell said that the note sent by him regarding the drawing up of a stipulation referred to the taking of affidavits in Madison county, and for nothing else. The attorney said to note sent by him was not given to Mr. Lippincott until the next day after the hearing, and therefore his claim that he was misled by it the day before was frivolous, and showed that it had no reference to a continuance of the hearing, but that it referred to an entirely different matter. Mr. Cadwell grew excited in refuting the charges of sharp practice.

"It probably goes without saying," he exclaimed, "that there is a popular mania to accuse me of sharp practice when they have nothing else to stand upon. They come into court and think that by abusing me they can sustain their case which itself has no merit. Ordinarily their motion would be perfectly ridiculous, yet we are compelled to come 100 miles to answer it."

Mr. Cadwell referred to the trouble he has been in with a Helena attorney, which resulted in disbarment proceedings against himself, and said something about a young man who had been in the penitentiary appearing in the matter against him. He said that he appeared at a great disadvantage in the present case, but he owed a duty to his client and her children, who were in actual want, and he intended to do the best he could for them. He did not ask a cent for Mrs. Schmalhausen, but he did maintain that the father should be compelled to support and educate his little children. Mr. Schmalhausen, she employed additional counsel to keep his children in want, "and he has come into court and swore to things that the records show to be absolutely false."

Mr. Lippincott replied to Mr. Cadwell and said that the latter had made statements regarding the alleged stipulation that were also absolutely false, and then some harsh words passed between the attorneys and the court stopped them.

In ruling on the matter Judge McHatton refused to set aside the order requiring the doctor to pay \$250 into court at once and \$50 on the first of each month, and also reviewed the former proceedings in the case to show that Mr. Cadwell's actions had been honorable and proper. The court said that it was only the legal phase of the matter that had to be determined and he was not disposed to try the attorneys. What they had done or failed to do had nothing to do with the case. The judge said it was well for the attorneys to remember that the court was entitled to some respect and that it had some right and power to make orders. He said that when the matter was set for hearing for last Saturday afternoon both

parties were in court and that Mr. Lippincott had agreed to the stipulation. When the matter was called for hearing Mr. Lippincott was absent, and Mr. Cadwell said he did not desire to submit the matter in the absence of the attorney on the other side, whereupon the court sent the sheriff out to secure the attendance of counsel, but he failed, and then the court ordered the matter to be submitted. The original papers were not in court, but it was submitted on copies had by Mr. Cadwell. The papers showed the facts as set out by both sides, and that the doctor possessed some property and was in a position to support his children. The court had the power to make the order, and there was no question that it is the duty of a father to support his minor children.

"If that had not long since been determined and established," said the judge, "it would be determined now." The judge said that attorneys and parties to actions are obliged to wait upon the court, and the court was not obliged to wait on attorneys as counsel for respondent seemed to think, and when they are not present when their cases are called, they or their clients must suffer the consequences.

John T. Baird was associated with Mr. Lippincott in the proceedings to-day, and George Haldor appeared in the case with Mr. Cadwell.

Mr. Cadwell today also filed several affidavits in answer to the affidavit made by Schmalhausen to the effect that he always supported his children, that his wife was a spendthrift, etc. One of the affidavits was by Mrs. Schmalhausen herself and she said that for five years she had the two minor children, Sadie and Pearl, in her custody and had sent them to school and clothed them, while the plaintiff did not in any manner contribute anything to their support, except about \$50 during the past eight months. For 10 years prior to the time the plaintiff secured a divorce, in April, 1892, she supported the family to a great extent by sewing and keeping boarders. She denies that she is a spendthrift and says she always had an opportunity of being one, but on the contrary has always been very glad and thankful to get the necessities of life, saying nothing whatever about luxuries. She is now physically unable to work and is absolutely without means of support or to clothe and maintain the children.

Annie Schmalhausen, aged 22, and Beatrice Schmalhausen, aged 23, made affidavits in which they said that in the two years since their father secured a divorce he had contributed nothing toward the support of the two minor girls, but that their mother paid all bills for their care and education. They also state that their father has no suitable home to offer the children, as he lived in a house containing only two rooms, which he uses as an office, sleeping room, cooking and living rooms, and it would not be desirable for the girls to live with him. Anna is a dressmaker and Beatrice a stenographer and typewriter and what they earn and contribute are the only means for the support of the family. They asked their father for assistance a number of times but he refused to give it.
