

KANSAS AND HER KICKERS.

Pops Denounce the Republicans as a Gang of Anarchists.

TOPEKA, Jan. 15.—A sensational incident took place in the Kansas senate at noon today, when that body received the concurrent resolution from the house providing that both bodies go into joint session to elect a state printer.

A substitute was offered by Senator Dennison to the effect that no certificate of election be issued to any one unless he receive a majority vote of each house. The substitute passed, but was overruled by Lieutenant Governor Troutman, the presiding officer, who declared he would adjourn the senate and ask the senators and officers to proceed to the house for the purpose set forth.

DUPLY COMMENDED.

Conservative Frenchmen Say He Was a Wis- Leader.

PARIS, Jan. 15.—The newspapers, without exception, are of the opinion that a solution of the ministerial crisis will be a long and difficult matter. The monarchists' organs assert that the republic is passing through a period of difficulty which may assume grave proportions and even involve the Elysee.

The moderate republican press pays unanimous tribute to the correctness and clearness of the attitude of ex-Premier Dupuy, who has fallen, it is asserted, only because he was determined to safely guard constitutional privileges. Many persons blame M. Barthou, ex-minister of public works, for not having shown the same reserve as M. Dupuy. The consensus of opinion is that the only possible solution of the difficulty is republican concentration under M. Bourgeois.

FEARS FOR HANSEN.

There is Strong Probability His Boat Has Been Wrecked.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The Pall Mall Gazette says: Grave fears regarding the Nansen Arctic expedition are general among the Arctic voyagers of Great Britain and Scandinavia. Lieutenant Hornsby of the Danmpha expedition, wrecked in the Kara sea, has expressed the opinion to the Danish Geographical society that there is no question that the tram has been crushed in the ice and Dr. Nansen and party are retreating.

UNCLE BILL HAMILTON.

A Leaf From the Unwritten Memoirs of the Daniel Boone of the Northwest.

E. Hough, staff correspondent of the sportsman's paper of New York, Forest and Stream, while here last fall made the acquaintance of several old timers through the introduction of John D. Luskamp of Billings, says the Recorder. He was particularly interested in the romantic relations of Uncle Bill Hamilton of Stillwater, and devotes three columns of his letter on the "West of the Present and Past" to a brief biography of that well known scout and hunter, and some of the anecdotes of the early days before the Yellowstone country was opened up to the white man and when the west was truly wild and unknown from the watershed of the Father of Waters.

Uncle Bill has had little newspaper talk made over him, as modest as a girl ought to be, he has set an example the direct opposite of that of most or many would-be old timers, says this biographer, and has kept out of print all he could. For notoriety-loving scooters, wild west posters and long-haired people he has a ready contempt.

Uncle Bill is getting old now, beyond the limit set for the average man, but he is still straight as an arrow and there is fire in him yet, if you can only catch him talking and thinking of the old timers in the west. He is nearly 73 years of age and was born in England, traces of his Saxon origin are notable even now in his accent. That he is American in heart if not in birth is evident from the tattered flag whose colors are never lowered from above his cabin on the Yellowstone, whose green waters whisper up all kinds of things to the cabin window.

At the tender age of 12 we find him out at a trading station, where Laramie now is, a protégé of Bill Williams, and from whom he took his first lessons in the sign language, which he afterwards became so proficient in, and is credited with being the best sign talker alive to-day.

In these old days Bill Hamilton came to be an Indian in every respect of practice and habit. He lived with them, rode with them, hunted with them and followed their customs in every way, even to that of costume. He was widely known among the various Indian tribes and universally respected by them. The Indians always said he was the only white man they ever knew who could ride over the plains, day in and day out, naked except for the breech cloth, and never be burned or blistered by the sun.

Uncle Bill was on the plains six years ago a great explorer. In California in '40 Uncle Bill took in an incident but be cared little for gold. He pushed on to the wilder north, filling various posts in the army as scout, guide and hunter. He was employed by the army commandant, then stationed at the chief Oregon post, to cross the Rockies to the east and thence go north in order to feel the disposition of the tribes (of what is now Montana) whether friendly or hostile. Bill had with him one companion. These two men, absolutely alone, away back in the days before Montana had been dreamed of as a gold field, crossed the Continental divide making over the rough Cœur d'Alenes, and thence southward, working east of the range as low down as what is now called Gold Creek. Then they went north, keeping east of the Rockies, getting beyond the St. Mary's country, well up into the British possessions. They had long since developed the disposition of the tribes and found them about all full of light and scarce of friendship. Hamilton got through all right and made his report to the commanding officer, but his companion was killed.

He was sheriff of Choteau county, Montana, during the wildest days of Fort Benton, and it was during this time that he

THE TELEPHONE A DOOR.


But it is Often Closed So Long That Business is Lost.

The telephone is now so universal a means of intercommunication that it is well worth learning how to get the best results from it. Angus Hibbar, a well-known telephone expert, compares the instrument to a door through which business must come and go. He has found by recent investigation that in many offices business is kept away by the incessant use made of the telephone for outgoing messages. Some customers, weary of finding the telephone door blocked, went elsewhere to place their orders, and trade was thus lost. The outcome of the study resulted in one or two telephones in many places being reserved and utilized solely for incoming business. In one instance a subscriber with three lines complained that he was never able to use any of them. This was found to be due to the rush of calls from outside and was again remedied by employing an instrument for outgoing talk. Often the office boy was discovered to be the impediment to traffic. This can be cured by having each user note his calls. Trouble frequently happens from holding the line while the individual wanted is hunted up. During such a period dozens of other calls more important may be blocked out or held back. The practice should not be allowed, but note should be made of the caller and the line at once set free.

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
