

PICKED OUT THE PLACES

The Council Located the Election Booths Last Night.

ALSO JUDGES AND CLERKS

The Work for the Spring Election Has Been Put in Shape In So Far as the City Council Is Concerned

All the aldermen were present at the council meeting last evening except Alderman Williams, who is in Deer Lodge attending the meeting of the board of county commissioners.

The voluminous records of the meetings of February were read by Clerk English and approved by the council.

A petition on from Bruno Maville for permission to erect a double frame building in the "burnt" district was referred to the fire committee.

Fire bills of the usual expense were audited and warrants ordered drawn on the treasury to pay them.

City Clerk English reported that he had made all the necessary arrangements for the city election in the way of preparing and posting notices and all that would be necessary would be the selection of polling places and the election of judges and clerks of election.
