

THE VOTE IS CANVASSED

City Attorney English Produces the Returns Before the Council.

NO CHANGE IN THE FIGURES

In the Case of the Tie Vote for Alderman of the Fourth Ward No Action Has Yet Been Taken.

All the troubles of the city council with reference to the canvass of the vote vanished yesterday with the return of City Clerk and Attorney English from Boulder.

The bills of the clerks and judges of election were approved and ordered paid, allowing each man \$7.50 for one day and a half's service.

The canvass of the vote was made by the council in committee of the whole. The books were checked up very carefully, but no errors were detected and no change was made in the result as given in the STANDARD the morning after the election.

The tie vote in the Fourth ward for alderman, between J. R. Walkup and J. F. Stagg, remained a tie, each receiving 189 votes. The council declared the result to be no election for alderman in that ward and ordered certificates of election issued to the successful candidates.

Alderman Williams had a scheme for breaking the tie and introduced a resolution to the effect that the council decide between the two candidates by a ballot.

Alderman Leiser asked for authority on the matter, and Alderman Williams cited the statutes for 1887, which declare that in case of a tie vote, the council may direct the tie to be broken by casting lots.

The matter was referred to the city attorney, who said he had not time to investigate, but in his opinion the resolution was in error and practically gave the council power to elect an alderman, which that body is in no event authorized to do.

Aldermen O'Connor and Williams were disposed to press the resolution in order to settle the case at once, and then City Attorney English stated that if the council adopted the resolution and elected an alderman no matter who he should be, he would refuse to issue a certificate of election to the man chosen in that way, and would resign in justice to his bondsmen and his opinion of law.

The council then took a recess to discuss the situation informally, but did not reach a decision and the matter was made a special order for the next meeting and an adjournment was taken to Thursday evening.

GRAND SUCCESS.

The Darktown Fire brigade out on parade yesterday afternoon was the source of much amusement to spectators. They were advertising the Easter ball given by the Hook & Ladder company No. 1 of the Anaconda Fire department last evening.

Notice to Teachers.

The county superintendent received the following letter from State Supt. E. A. Steere:

County Superintendent:

The new school law takes effect July 1, 1895. Said law raises the requirements for a second and first grade certificate. What is now a first grade certificate will be a third grade after July 1, and certificates granted for a first and second grade at the May examination, can only stand as such to the examination that takes place in August. Then if you wish to do so, you can make these certificates third-grade and to hold for the time originally granted. Parties should not be permitted to write for a certificate at the May examination whose certificate will not expire before the next regular examination period.

The new law will be printed in about two months and be ready for distribution soon after. Sincerely,
