A CONTEST PROBABLE

Over the Estate of the Late Daniel Rash.

HIS SON NOW IN MISSOULA

MISSOULA, April 15.—It is now certain that there will be a contest over the estate of the late Daniel Rash. Some time ago, the STANDARD printed the fact that the deceased had left a family in Iowa, when he came West 30 years ago. It was stated at that time that the Iowa wife had since married and that the children, now adults, had instituted inquiries regarding the property of Rash in this state with a view of having claims to a share of the estate.

The report of the administrator of the estate, filed last week, shows that the value of the estate is about \$11,000, consisting principally of real estate and bills receivable. J. H. T. Ryman, the administrator, has been informed officially of the existence of the Iowa claimants. It will remain for the court to decide what the disposition of the estate shall be.
