NEW UNION TEMPLE

The Unionmen's Building Association to Erect a Three Story Block.

IT IS "LABOR'S GIBRALTAR"

A Magnificent Brick Structure Which Will be an Ornament to the City--Stock in the Concern Readily Taken.

Great Falls, May 1.—"Montana is labor's Gibraltar," was the message which Director Hogan of the American Railway Union, sent to the world during the great Pullman strike last summer. A few days later a prominent labor leader of Butte was in the city and, after referring to the above remark, said: "Yes; but Great Falls is the rock upon which that fortress stands."

In no city in the world are the labor unions so prosperous or influential; in no city is the personnel of their membership more conservative, fair or honorable; nowhere is organized labor accorded so much respect. Less than five years have passed since the hopes of the advocates of unionism in this city were realized and unions were formed on an enduring basis. But in that short period the unions have so prospered that they have rightfully ventured to attempt to build a labor temple. As chronicled in the Standard recently, the Trades and Labor Council of Cascade county authorized the incorporation of an association for the purpose of purchasing a site and erecting a home of their own for the unions.

In pursuance of the vested authority the delegates named form a corporation under the name of Unionmen's Building Association. Last night the council held a meeting and elected James E. Fox of the Retail Clerks' Union and president of the Trades and Labor Council, president; James Erickson of the Stonemason's union, vice president; A. E. Caulfield of the Carpenter's union, secretary, and L. M. McDonnell, county clerk and recorder, and a member of the American Railway Union, treasurer.

A committee, appointed for the purpose, at once began a canvass for subscriptions to the stock of the association, and in a few hours work met with gratifying success. It was not alone sympathy with unionism that caused the men to purchase stock, but shrewd business men realized that such an investment would prove profitable. The canvass will be prosecuted vigorously, and sufficient money will doubtless be raised in a few days to enable the association to safely commence the construction of the labor temple. The stock is offered at \$5 per share.

The building will be of brick, three stories high, and of handsome appearance, both as to exterior and interior. The office floor will be arranged for a store room, and the rental from this will pay good interest on the investment. The second floor will be arranged for lodge rooms and committee rooms for the various unions, and, if space will permit, there will be office rooms, which will bring to the association a moderate income. The third floor will be for a public hall. There is great need of such a room in Great Falls, the opera house being too expensive, and all other large rooms being occupied.

The association has secured an option on a conveniently located lot on Central Avenue, and when assured of success, as it doubtless will be, will complete the purchase and begin the construction of the temple.

BREVITIES AND PERSONALS.

Great Falls, April 30.—Jonathan McAssey and family will remove to Neilhart this week.

The range near Chinook is being rapidly stocked to the limit. C. W. Price has recently shipped in a car load of cow-horses from Washington and Oregon. Tuttle Bros. have placed 10 car loads of steers from Boulder on their range. Steadler & Kaufman unloaded 10 car loads of steers and Phelps & Preuitt turned loose eight car loads. James Berry will soon place several car loads of stock near Chinook.

TELL TALE FIGURES

It Is By Them That Business Transactions Are Shown.

DIVORCES NOT PLENTIFUL

The Anti-Gambling Law Will Not Materially Decrease the Revenues of Cascade County--Other Statistics.

Great Falls, May 1.—Speaking generally, statistics are most accurately described as dry, but when the statistics are connected with the purse strings of the reader they appear to him as of vital importance. Several of the county officials of Cascade county have been engaged for some time in preparing answers to questions submitted by Capt. J. H. Mills, commissioner of the state bureau of agriculture, labor and industry. The statistics thus compiled afford data not to be found in the official reports of the officers, and show, in part, not only what sums are received by the county, but to what purpose these sums are applied.

The district clerk of court has made returns from his books and in one particular shows that, although the West is prone to regard the West as wild and woolly and not inclined to respect the marital vows and the requirements of social purity, such is not the fact. The item that shows this is a number of divorces granted during the year 1894, the total number being 32. Twenty-six of these were granted on complaint of the wife and six on complaint of the aggrieved husband. The interest in the capital election caused an unusual number of naturalizations to be made in 1894. Judge Benton was unusually strict in his examination of applicants and few persons that did not merit the honors of American citizenship were granted the privileges. This is a flattering commentary upon the character of the foreign born residents of Cascade county, and it is a pleasant thought to the people of the county that nearly all of the foreign born residents of the county are citizens of the United States.

During 1894 925 persons received final papers, divided as to nationality thus: Austria, 22; Belgium, 1; Canada, 215; Denmark, 11; England, 97; Finland, 71; France, 7; Germany, 91; Ireland, 57; Italy, 10; Norway, 40; Russia, 7; Scotland, 65; Sweden, 147; Switzerland, 6; Wales, 16; all other countries, 16; Bohemia and Hawaii are unrepresented.

The court business has been expeditiously transacted and it is a cause for pride and gratification that it is not impossible to secure the conviction of a criminal in Cascade county. During last year the following was the court business: Civil cases begun, 327; civil cases disposed of, 332; civil cases pending at the end of the year, 245; criminal cases begun on information filed, 38; criminal cases begun on indictment pending, 3; criminal cases pending at the beginning of year, 6; convictions for felony, 18; convictions for misdemeanors, 6.

Considerable probate business was transacted as follows: Administrations pending at the beginning of the year, 60; letters of administration issued, 15; estates settled, 28; guardianships pending at the beginning of the year, 23. During the year there were 75 executions issued, 51 decrees of foreclosure and 162 marriage licenses issued.

The county clerk and recorder's returns show the following instruments recorded: Deeds, warranty and quit claim, 851; executors, administrators and guardians' deeds, 4; sheriff's deeds, 25; tax title deeds, 3; real estate mortgages, 101; chattel mortgages, 483; mechanics' liens, 28.

The returns compiled by County Treasurer Dickerman and Deputy Bernhard cover the fiscal year from March 1, 1894, to March 1, 1895, and show licenses collected as follows: Total, \$36,286.07; saloons, \$26,195; attorneys, \$532; butchers, \$280; gamblers, \$1,696.57; hotels, \$287.50; laundries, \$65; liveries, \$622.50; merchants, \$3,200; peddlers, \$340; real estate and insurance agents, \$148; restaurants, \$387.50; wholesale liquor dealers, \$1,425; all other occupations, \$1,377. It is noticeable that the licenses from gambling houses, which the codes are intended to abolish after July 1, amount to only \$1,696.57.

Other county officers were not asked for reports, their official reports affording all valuable data.
