FLORA CUSHING WINS

Her Husband George and Her Daughters Lose Their Case.

THE COURT SAYS SHE IS SANE

Jury Verdict Drawn and No One Was Slighted—The Real Estate Transfers and Personals at the County Seat.

Special Correspondence of the Standard.

Deer Lodge, Nov. 9.—The notorious Cushing case was again aired in the district court to-day. The admission of the testimony of George Cushing was the chief bone of contention. Attorney J. H. Duffy objected to his testifying on the ground that the law forbids the husband testifying against his wife or the wife against the husband without the consent of the other, excepting in a civil or criminal action by one against the other. This proposition was argued at length and the court ruled that he would hear the petitioner's testimony and afterwards exclude it if he deemed it proper to do so. The petitioner, George Cushing, then took the stand to show the incompetency of his wife to manage business affairs or to be entrusted with the care and custody of the children. He denied that he was shiftless and dependent upon his wife for a living, but that he worked conscientiously for a remunerative salary while in Anaconda and gave his check monthly for the maintenance of the home until he was compelled to leave and seek employment elsewhere. While on a visit to the city of Montreal about a year ago he said his wife had called to see him and that a reconciliation was effected with the understanding that they should return to their home in Montana, commence life again anew and that neither one should ever refer to their differences again. This re-union was of short duration and inside of a week hostilities were renewed in the household. Flora Cushing, the respondent, took the stand in her own behalf, and in a broken dialect she gave a graphic description of the causes that led to the estrangement. She said that for a number of years she alone provided for the home and paid for the education of the children, and that her lord and master was simply a figurehead.

At the conclusion of the testimony the court denied the petition of Cushing for the appointment of a guardian for his wife and ordered the costs of the case to be taxed to him.

When the venire jury for the November term of court was drawn last Monday the jury box contained nearly 1,000 names of taxpayers, all written on separate ballots. The drawing was conducted by the clerk in open court and the law now places so many safeguards about the selection of juries that even the clerk is not aware of the name drawn until he is about to announce it to the court. Those who were overlooked in the draft are assured that it was an impartial affair and no slight intended. There were 35 drawn and summoned to appear Monday next at 10 a. m.
