COME TO THE FRONT

The Time for Registration Is Drawing to a Close.

IT IS EVERY MAN'S DUTY

Old and Young Must Give in Their Names—Three Refuse to Sign the County Seat Removal Petition—Five More Days.

Registration is progressing very slowly and unless it lives up a bit during the next few days the number of men entitled to vote will be very small this spring. Already three days have gone and only 500 names have been recorded on the big book. This is a small fourth of the number who should be on hand on election day.

Many erroneously suppose that former registration will give them a vote. Such persons will lose their franchise most assuredly, for at regular city elections the entire work must be done over again each year.

To the old timers and men who have been voters for 30 or 40 years this works what many of them feel to be a hardship, but being a matter of law they have no alternative but to obey, walk down to the registration office and swear in their votes just the same as the youngster who approaches with awe and trepidation to qualify for his first vote.

Up to the present time just three men out of the 600 have declined to sign the petition to the county commissioners for an election on the proposition of moving the county seat to Anaconda. They could not and would not give any reasons for the refusal and none can be imagined.

Only five days remain and it behooves every man who is interested in his city to take time by the forelock and make it his chief business to register to-day. In this government of the people, for the people and by the people, the man who loses his vote by neglect to register is guilty of unpatriotic, disloyal negligence.

Election day is the time to raise voice and vote on questions of public interest, then should the people speak, and if they fail to do so should hold their peace forever after, at least until next election.

Up to date the populists have the only ticket in the field. Democrats and republicans may be sawing wood, but they have not said anything.

A DOG TALE.

This Little Vagrant Was Supposed to Have Been Quite Dead.

A ragged little dog was adopted by Judge Fitzgerald one day last winter while seeking a home. He was a wretched pup and looked like the bad boy who never will have his hair combed in the morning, but he had big bright eyes, and by a show of affection for the court, was, after vain efforts to shake him, accepted finally and given a home. The pup was a hobo, that was apparent, but the judge thought he could reform the shaggy rascal, and accordingly, gave him a good box to sleep in and regular meals.

For a time "Rags" behaved genteelly, he would trot along at the judge's heels or stay at home when told to do so, as a well behaved doggie should. He waxed fat and his coat became glossy, so that it gained in favor and was regarded as a very promising pup.

But after a time "Rags" was spoiled, he could not stand prosperity, and he began traveling in fast company, such as brought the ruin of Tray and other good dogs. He would stay out of nights, and finally became such a scamp that after formal trial he was sentenced to death.

The Zosel District.

The increased activity at the Zosel mines is very encouraging and the new ore bodies uncovered during the past two weeks insures a mining camp that is sure to attract widespread attention, says the Silver State. In every case where property in this district has been opened and ore found it may be depended on as being of sufficient value to ship at a good profit. The character of the ore makes it easy to mine and easy to treat. Good carbonate ore has been taken from several claims in Zosel at the grass roots and that the Emery mine is taking still better ore from the 25-foot levels is evidence that the camp is permanent. In every case where depth is attained the ore carries more and more gold. Many men are coming in from the outside with a view of interesting themselves and in many instances have done so.

Jacob Hitz, one of the owners of the Wake-Up-Jim claim in Zosel, has secured a bond and lease on that property from the other owners and will put three men to work at present, that number being all that can work to advantage now. The terms of lease are the same as the Argus embraces, which are: Bond, \$20,000; lease 10 months without royalty or eight months with royalty. Alex Shugro and Jake Kokenparger, who have a lease on the Argus in Zosel, are greatly pleased over a strike of very rich ore which gives all appearance of being permanent. They have had good ore from the start, but the strike of the past few days "insures a good property," to use the words of one of the interested parties. They are preparing to make a shipment of the product at an early date.

W. B. Matheson, who is working the William Coleman claim in Zosel, has some very rich ore at present that gives much promise. There has been a small vein of ore for some time, but the property now makes a showing that it never did before.

Dennis O'Donnell of Butte, who secured a lease and bond on the Carbonate Extension, an adjoining claim to the Emery, was here Saturday making final arrangements and also having the names of

Thomas P. Graves and H. Pickering added to the lease and bond as his associates. Mr. O'Donnell is an old timer in this county, having 20 years ago worked at shoemaking with Peter Lansing in Deer Lodge. For a number of years he has been active in mining in Butte and has accumulated considerable wealth. He is pleased with his proposition in Zosel and the machinery, which is all new, is expected here to-day and they want to have it in operation by April 1. They will begin operations down the hill from the old incline and when the lead is tapped it will be at a depth of several hundred feet.

Parties will go out to-morrow to examine the Black Rock mine, which is located near the Emery, with a view of obtaining a bond and lease. It is a good mine and only needs systematic working to make it a rich producer.
