CHRIST'S CHARACTER

His Cross and Crown Elder Barnaby's Subject.

AN ALLITERATIVE TITLE

Makes the Basis for an Eloquent Discourse Last Evening - A Large Audience Heard it at the Christian Church.

The title of Elder Barnaby's sermon last night excited considerable curiosity, as it was announced his topic would be C. C. C., and some people thought he had got roped in on an advertising dodge for an eastern railroad or an institution nearer home.

The name Christian is from God, and is the highest that can be conferred upon man. Seven hundred years B. C. the prophet, Isaiah, said: "For Zion's sake will I not hold my peace, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest until the righteousness thereof go forth as brightness, and the salvation thereof as a lamp that burneth."

There are many christi, as many as are the opinions of men, so many christi are there. The Christ of history is the Christ of God, of whom Moses in the law and prophets did write. Of whom the apostles also did write, surrendering their lives for the truth.

The prophet had said long before the angel chous at Bethlehem. "A virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and his name shall be Immanuel (God with us.)" Deceit was not found in His mouth, nothing worthy of death.

Even Judas who betrayed Him testified to His innocence. While in the flesh and form of man He was more than man—God, the Spirit, Gabriel, John the Baptist, John the Apostle, Paul, the disciples, Nathaniel, Martha, the Eunuch, the Centurion, unclean spirits and the legion all testify to His Sonship, divine Sonship.

He said: "I am the light of the world. There is a double meaning in these words. The Spirit of Christ in the world, directly and indirectly, is indeed the light of the world."

"The character of this blessed Christ is our next thought, and is worthy of consideration and emulation. Sin had fixed a great gulf between God and man; hence separation. God yearned for the return of His creatures. Our sinful condition forbade our near approach to God. But God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life."

"Do you desire to be like Christ? then you must follow Him. If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me." (Matthew 16:24.) Meaning that we must become a reproach in the sight of men, in a religious sense, in order to be a follower of Christ.

"Christ triumphed over all temptations and was crowned King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Listen to the Psalmist as he pictures the entrance into the palace royal of God, when He ascended up on high: 'Lift up your heads, O ye gates, and be ye lifted up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of Glory shall come in. Who is this King of Glory? The Lord strong and mighty; the Lord mighty in battle. Lift up your heads, O ye gates; even lift them up, ye everlasting doors, and the King of Glory shall come in. Who is this King of Glory? The Lord of hosts, He is the King of Glory.'—Psalm 24:7-10.

"What a triumphant entrance; what a glorious reception to the Conqueror over death, hell and the grave. By man rejected, by man ignored, and slain. Raised from the tomb, seen of men, ascended on high and crowned King of the universe. How great the honor. Do you desire to be a follower of this conquering hero and wear a crown also. Then seek Him 'while He may be found, call upon Him while He is near.'"

GENERAL G. A. R. ORDERS. Office for the Montana Department Elected and Appointed.

Lester S. Willson of Bozeman, who was elected department commander of the G. A. R., has issued the following general orders which will interest the old soldiers:

General Orders, No. 1. "The department commander elected at the Twelfth Annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic on April 16, 1914, hereby assumes the duties of that office."

"Expressing gratitude for the honor conferred and the trust imposed, he earnestly invokes the aid and cooperation of all comrades, to the end that this may be a year of enthusiasm and prosperity to the department."

"The following appointments have been made: Assistant adjutant general, Comrade B. F. Osborn, Bozeman; assistant quartermaster general, Comrade H. T. Bevan, Helena; judge, advocate, Timothy O'Leary, Anaconda; inspector, William H. H. Dickinson, Missoula; chief mustering officer, S. H. Almon, Butte."

"General Orders, No. 2. "The twelfth department encampment, held at Bozeman April 8th and 10th, 1914, elected the following officers: Commander, Lester S. Willson, Bozeman; senior vice commander, F. George Heldt, Great Falls; junior vice commander, Lyman Loring, Kallispell; medical director, Irwin M. Rockefeller, Anaconda; chaplain, George W. Jenkins, Stevensville; chief of administration, Josephus Rich of Steadman Post, A. E. Gloyd of Frank Blair post, James Gibson of Sheridan Post, Joseph M. Lindley of William English Post; William H. "The following staff appointments are announced: Senior aid-de-camp and chief of state, W. Y. Smith, William English Post, No. 10, Bozeman; aides-de-camp, James K. Pardee, Burnside post, No. 22, Phillipsburg; R. C. Wallace, Wordsworth Post, No. 5, Helena; James Gibson, Sheridan Post, No. 18, Great Falls."

"Post commanders will forward to these headquarters the names of comrades (one from each post) for appointment as aids-re-camp on the staff of the department commander; also names of comrades (one from each post) for assistant inspectors. Such comrades should be selected as will devote the necessary attention to the duties for which they are recommended."

"The official reports of the Woman's Relief Corps show that this patriotic auxiliary is doing a noble work. To these earnest, uniring and loyal women, who are adding to our cordial support and sympathy, but every effort should be made to assist in the growth and prosperity of this department."

"Its headquarters have been established at Butte. Mrs. Amytis Manchester, department president."

"In compliance with resolutions passed at the twelfth annual encampment, post commanders are invited as soon as possible to the assistant adjutant general at Bozeman a complete roster of their posts; also the names of all ex-soldiers and their address living in their vicinity. By command of Lester H. Willson, Commander."


