IT'S ALL GIVEN AWAY

Impossible to Maintain Secrecy in Phillipsburg Council of the A. P. A.

MANY MEMBERS SUSPECTED

Charges Preferred Against One Man for Being Too Thick With Senator Sligh and Frank D. Brown.

Special Correspondence of the Standard. Phillipsburg, April 29.—The A. P. A. are having quite a time among themselves since the late municipal election in this city. The election referred to was an A. P. A. contest, although this fact was not published at the time, and as the result was not satisfactory to that secret band of misfit patriots they are now preferring all sorts of charges against several of their members.

As a sample of their work the following communications under one cover was handed to a member whose name for the present shall be Mr. Blank.

To the Officers and Members of Council No. 13, State of Montana: The undersigned, a member of Council No. 13 of the state of Montana, does hereby charge Friend _____ of said council, with conduct unbecoming a friend and member of the order, and the grounds of this charge are more particularly set forth in the following specifications, to-wit:

The above named _____ has been seen in company with Dr. James M. Sligh and Frank D. Brown, who are known enemies to this council, having been seen entering the offices of both at different times, immediately upon leaving the council meetings, and it is the belief of the undersigned that he has been divulging secrets of this council. Dr. Sligh was seen by the Standard reporter and said that he knew nothing about the matter and cared less; he had no object in knowing what they did at their secret meetings but was not aware before that they held secret meetings; he had always supposed that the A. P. A. was a public affair with no secrets and a membership made up principally of apostate Roman Catholics and foreigners.

Mr. Brown was not in town and won't be able to appear before the inquisition to testify against Mr. Blank and tell how much he knows about the inner workings of the A. P. A., but if he doesn't know all about it, it is because he has not had time to listen to the many tales voluntarily brought to him.

It is hardly fair to call the Phillipsburg A. P. A. a secret society, as its every act is known to the outside world and if worth the while almost a full report of every important meeting could be published, and the funny part of it all is that they are so blind as not to know the people, not one but several, who give their secrets away. The tale-bearer-in-chief has not yet been discovered, nor is he likely to be for some time, as he is very numerous and very active in preferring charges of one kind and another against truer and better men. If anything of importance should transpire in either the Phillipsburg or New Chicago lodges there is no reason on earth why the daily papers should not contain a full report of the proceedings the following day. The names of all of the members, the names of the officers, the names of the committees appointed to interview prospective new members, the names of aspirants for county offices, the names of the fellows selected to go to side and to make nominating speeches in republican conventions, the names of any members who may have withdrawn and upon application for reinstatement the names of those who were sent out to purchase nice, clean, new blackbills so that all could vote who wished, all of the hated Papists and the more hated Protestants have never denied that they were born in the United States and willing to abide by its constitution.

About the next job for the country-savers to attend to here is the republican primaries and county convention, and this little matter is said to be already settled.

There may be republicans here who do not belong to the A. P. A., but all of the A. P. A. are republicans; that is, all who belong are dominated and controlled by a republican crowd, and it is said that the machine is in good working order and can be expected to do a good job when the republican convention meets. A. P. A. republicans who are glad that they are republicans are wearing McKinley badges, and when told that the more has been denounced as a Romanist in disguise who they smile, look wise, but still wear the badge, and if the Granite county republican delegation to the state convention are caught voting for McKinley delegates to St. Louis no one need be surprised. Senator Tom Carter has many admirers here among all parties, except of course the A. P. A. party now in absolute control of republicanism in this country, but if he wants the Granite county delegation to vote for him he would better bring that same old check book along.

Many vague threats are being made against this and that one, about dire consequences and awful reparation to be demanded and enforced and therefore the Standard correspondent has been very careful not to write anything

that could be taken as offensive by the most sensitive of the patriots for office only, fearing a return attack the consequences of which would undoubtedly be something terrible.

AT THE EVANS MONDAY.

"Sinbad the Sailor" Will Be the Attraction—A Gorgeous Affair.

Ordinance No. 125.

An ordinance transferring certain monies from the general fund of the city of Anaconda to the dog fund and the street and alley fund, and the sewer fund of said city.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Anaconda: Section 1—The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars is hereby transferred from any money now in the general fund of the city of Anaconda into the street and alley fund of the said city, heretofore transferred from said street and alley fund to the said general fund, and the city treasurer and city clerk of said city are hereby directed and authorized to make such transfer on the books of said city.

Section 2—The sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars is hereby transferred from any money now in the general fund of the city of Anaconda into the sewer fund of the said city, heretofore transferred from said sewer fund to the general fund, and the city treasurer and city clerk of said city are hereby directed and authorized to make such transfer on the books of said city.

Section 3—This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.


