## NEW MACHINE SHOPS

Extensive Improvements in the B. & P. Anaconda Yards.

## ALL THE MODERN FACILITIES

The Buildings Will Be Near the Round House, on the West Side of the City, and Will Be First-Class Every Way.

Surveyors were at work yesterday staking out the ground plans for the machine shops for the B. & P. railroad. The site is just west of the round house.

The new buildings will be about 80x100 feet each in dimension, and will be used as machine shops, blacksmith and boiler shops. A double track will run through the shops and engines to be repaired will be taken into the buildings on wheels. Pits will be dug so that the wheels can be removed without lifting the engine from the track.

Every facility for handling engines and cars, even to the building of new ones if necessary, will be secured. It will be possible to thoroughly overhaul any rolling stock that belongs to the road.

This is already being done with the machinery on hand, but at a disadvantage of being cramped for room and limited facilities. Excellent work has been done, however. In the new shops there will be abundant room and all the latest improved machinery, so that work will be accomplished systematically. Bids will probably be called for soon for the erection of the buildings.

Engine No. 6, coach No. 2 and combination coach No. 9 are now in the shops. The coaches are being entirely rebuilt and refitted. The engine has been thoroughly cleaned and overhauled, new parts replacing those that are worn. When put in service again she will be as good as new. In addition to the shops a new supply store room will be erected and the old one torn away.

### Anti-Missionary Outrage.

Victoria, B. C., May 20.—The steamer Altmore, arriving from the Orient last night, brought news of an anti-missionary outrage at Tai Chau, China. Two English missionaries named Ferguson and Walker were the victims. Proceeding by boat from Shanghai, they arrived at Tai Chau on April 15. While awaiting the return of a messenger whom they had sent with their names and passports to the residence of the chief local official, they were attacked by a mob that bombarded them vigorously with stones. The two missionaries, finding the situation intolerable, left the shelter of a cabin and attempted to pull up anchor and shove their boat into the stream, their crew having fled beyond the range of the missiles.

During this operation the stone throwing became more vigorous than ever and a shot was fired, the bullet passing through Ferguson's left hand. At last the boat was got off, and, being rejoined by its crew, dropped down the stream. The boat became the target for a cloud of missiles as it passed a narrow point of the channel, but no serious injury was inflicted. An officer and 10 soldiers arrived upon the scene while the outrage was going on, but their presence had little, if any, effect in quieting the rioters.

### The Johannesburg Prisoners.

Pretoria, May 20.—The sentences of the leaders of the Johannesburg reformers, it was announced to-day will stand over for the present and meanwhile a sentence of 15 years' imprisonment has been substituted for the sentences of death imposed on Colonel Rhodes, John Hays Hammond, Lionel Phillips and George Farrar. Nine other prisoners are discharged. Eighteen were sentenced to five months' imprisonment and 22 to three months' imprisonment.

London, May 20.—Secretary of State for the Colonies Joseph Chamberlain, had not received any news this morning of the final decision of the executive council of the South African republic regarding the commutation of the sentences of the Johannesburg reform prisoners. It was rumored on the stock exchange to-day that all prisoners are to be released unconditionally. A private dispatch says President Kruger has pardoned 59 prisoners condemned to imprisonment, banishment and fine of \$10,000 each. No mention was made of Rhodes, Hammond, Phillips and Farrar.


