MR. ROM'S SUCCESSOR

John Schuttly Elected Alderman From the Second Ward.

AN OPINION AS TO SEWERS

Attorney O'Leary Quotes the Law and Codes on the Problem—A Petition Not Granted—Outline Business and Adjournment.

At the council meeting last night the vacancy caused by the resignation of Alderman John Rom was filled by the unanimous election of John Schuttly of 555 East Park avenue to the place. He was nominated by Alderman Peter Cox. Alderman Schuttly was present and qualified, taking his seat with the council at once.

The opinion of City Attorney O'Leary on the sewer problem was submitted in writing. After liberal quotations of the code the opinion says:

"From the foregoing provisions of the code it appears that the city council may adopt the general sewer system wherein all of the expense of the construction of the sewer in the city may be paid from a general sewer fund. This system necessitates in the present financial condition of the city the consent of the taxpayers at a special election to bond the city for an amount that would make this construction possible. The amount which the taxpayers are asked to vote at the special election June 6 would not be enough to pay for but a small part of a general system.

"Beside the general sewer system the code provides for the construction by the city of main sewers and the lateral connections to be constructed by special improvement district system. The expense of the mains to be paid by the city at large and the laterals by the district.

"The district is created by the city council. Under the system outlined by the city council these several districts for sewer purposes would consist of the blocks through which the laterals would run in the alleys to connect with the mains. Each line of laterals to be a separate district. The entire expense of the making of the laterals and connecting with the mains must be paid by the lots in the district pro rata according to their area. The city does not pay any of the expense of the laterals under the district system. It only makes repairs and keeps in order the laterals when completed.

"City Attorney." The opinion was received and ordered filed. The report of the city engineer, E. P. Leahy, on the sewers, was received. He announced that the mains had been thoroughly cleaned and recommended the building of a box at the mouth of the sewer. He estimated the expense at \$75. The council requested bids.

The special committee to whom the protest of citizens against licensing a saloon at the corner of Fourth and Birch streets, reported that "from the present outlook that corner is likely to become a business corner and business house erected in that locality very soon." They therefore recommended that petition be not granted at present. The fire department made a request for 1,000 feet of hose, and the council instructed the clerk to advertise for bids for furnishing the same.

The bill of Pat Walsh for digging the city hall sewer, was allowed less \$15 paid for hauling away dirt left on the street.

Mayor Thornton was granted a leave of absence, during which he will visit California friends. The council then adjourned.



HE HAD TO RUN.

Bold Attempt to Rob An Open Safe Yesterday Afternoon

A sneak thief came within 30 seconds of making a big haul yesterday afternoon at L. A. King's store. Mrs. King was busy with a customer in the front of the store and Mr. King had taken the usual deposit to the bank. Mrs. King saw a man walk to the rear of the store and when she finished waiting on the customer went back to see what he wanted. She found the stranger all doubled up close to the safe door which was open. He claimed to be sick and was in a hurry to get out doors. Then he changed his mind and wanted to buy paper and pens. Mrs. King went behind the counter to get the paper and being suspicious of the fellow, called Special Officer Newman's attention to him in an undertone, asking the officer to watch him, and he did so. The would-be thief saw that he was neatly trapped and walked to the front of the door, dashed out and escaped through a saloon. It is supposed he caught the 2 o'clock train out of town.

Subsequent investigation of the safe showed that he had opened the cash drawer that had been emptied for deposit and had looked into a sack which contained \$32, from which he extracted a few coins to see what the bag contained. Just at this instant Mrs. King interrupted him and he had feigned illness. Then he was watched so closely that he was unable to get the sack again in his possession.
