Rev. Mr. Healy's Theme at the Union Service.

BLESSINGS OF THE YEAR

The union services last evening at the Presbyterian church were attended by a congregation that filled every seat in the house.

An offering for the relief of the needy was taken and was divided among pastors for distribution.

Rev. George Wade Healy delivered the sermon, taking his text from the Psalms, "O, give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endureth forever."

FOR A WIFE'S AFFECTIONS.

Editor Thompson's Suit Against School Commissioner Blauvelt of Nyack.

Nyack, Nov. 26.—The suit of William R. Thompson, editor of the Nyack Evening Star, against George A. Blauvelt, school commissioner of Rockland county, for \$25,000 for the alienation of his wife's affections was begun to-night in the Rockland supreme court at New City.

No case ever tried in Rockland county has attracted the interest that this has. William R. Thompson's wife, who is wealthy, recently secured a divorce from him for adultery, and less than three months afterward she married George A. Blauvelt.

Thompson at once instituted the suit against Blauvelt for alienating his wife's affections. Mr. Thompson's suit was based upon about 29 love letters written by her husband to Mrs. Wells, a widow, and now, to complicate matters, the co-respondent in the divorce suit, who has since by marriage become Mrs. Vaughn, has brought suit against Mrs. Blauvelt for \$25,000, which sum she claims was promised to pay her for the letters to use in evidence.

DIDN'T KNOW IT.

Georgians Who Have Not Been Heard From Since Election.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 26.—There is one county in the United States where residents did not know of the recent national election. That is Charlton county, this state. The officials in the office of the secretary of state are authority for the declaration that the people of that county could not have known of it, for no election was held there and the official digest of the election in Georgia has been made up with Charlton left out.

The famous Okefenokee swamp covers most of the territory of Charlton county, which is on the Florida line, and, indeed, runs down into Florida. According to the map there are several towns in the county, with Traders' Hill as the county seat, but all efforts of the secretary of state to get returns from there have proved unavailing, and it is claimed as a certainty that no election was held.

SASH HIT HIM IN THE NECK.

How Aged and Eccentric John Gleiss Met His Death.

Hicksville, L. I., Nov. 26.—John Gleiss was found dead this morning at his home in Central Park, three miles from here, with his neck caught between the window sash and the sill. Gleiss was nearly 70 years old, and lived with his wife. Both were eccentric. For years they did not speak to each other, although eating at the same table. They slept in different rooms, and Gleiss always crawled out of his bedroom through a window in order that he might not disturb his wife. He is supposed to have knocked down the stick holding the sash while crawling through the window last night, and the window, falling, probably knocked him unconscious. He died from strangulation.

BULLDOG ATTACKS A CHILD.

The Dog Was Shot After It Had Inflicted Severe Injuries.

New Brunswick, N. J., Nov. 26.—James Waker, a child of 5 years, went to visit his aunt, Mrs. Henry Waker, who lives on Patterson street, this city, yesterday. About noon the boy went around the corner into Hubbard's alley. Opening the gate into William Robinson's yard, he ran in search of a little playmate. As he entered the yard a large white bulldog, belonging to George Oliver, broke its chain, and springing at the boy, knocked him down. The boy's screams of terror were heard by Mrs. Robinson and she ran into the yard and placed herself between the dog and boy. The dog sprang at her, knocked her down, and without molesting her, turned on the child again. The child's hands and head were torn again and again by the dog's sharp teeth.

A number of men, who had been attracted to the scene by the boy's cries, stood looking over the fence without making any attempt to rescue him beyond poking the yard with umbrellas and canes. Rising to her feet, Mrs. Robinson caught the dog by the neck and dragged it away from the boy just as Edward Golden came running up from Hubbard's stables and panned the dog to the ground with a pitchfork. Then several men armed with pistols killed the dog by firing 13 bullets into its body. Covered with blood, the boy was carried into a neighbor's
