

BUTTE NEWS. TALKED AND DISPUTED

Council Gets Into a Wrangle Over Mulholland's Bill.

NO AGREEMENT REACHED

A Motion to Disallow and a Bill to Allow Both Voted Down - The Council Postponed Final Action Until Next Saturday Night.

The flowers which the new janitor placed on each alderman's desk before the council meeting last night seemed to have the contrary of a soothing and harmonizing effect.

This bill of Chief Mulholland was for 10 per cent commission for all fines he had collected for the city...

The effect of the speech was tremendous, and in the face of higher offers for the same property, it was passed...

After the case had been voted, an offer was read of \$160 a month for two years or \$170 for five months...

A bill of W. R. Orr, for \$78, was received. He was a fireman injured in the explosion of J. B. Orr's...

The Cobban addition was offered to Butte and referred to the committee on streets and alleys...

The street and alley committee reported as follows: "We recommend that the street and alley fund, \$10,000, to the health fund, \$1,000..."

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By paying this percentage, as the collections are more thorough than they would otherwise be.

"I don't see," said Knowlton, "how the inspector of weights and measures was collecting without a commission."

"The chief of police is the only man ahead," said McArthur. "It would be better if he would attend to his duties as well as he attends to this collecting."

"This matter was all decided last year," said McArthur. "There's a proper way to make charges against an officer. Make your charge to the mayor in writing if you have any."

"It looks to me like compounding a felony," declared Leggat. "The council has changed your mind since last year," remarked the mayor.

"I distinctly recall the way Alderman Leggat and some other alderman voted on this question at that time."

The motion to adopt the majority report, which included Mulholland's bill, was then lost by the same vote, 7 to 8.

The bill was then unopposedly referred to the police committee. A resolution was passed that the "grafting" discussion be created when Alderman Ljubibratic made his maiden speech.

Many important matters have come up in the council since last spring, but Ljubibratic never made a speech until last night, although he did once second a motion.

His speech was very effective and as a consequence, the city will receive \$240,000 more in five years than it might otherwise have received.

The old city hall has been rented by Ljubibratic & Co. for a business of \$150 per month.

That was before Ljubibratic became an alderman. The lease expired recently, and Ljubibratic, being an alderman now, asked for a renewal of the lease.

The matter was referred to the building committee and Alderman McArthur put in a bid of \$160 a month on a two years' lease, or \$170 for five years.

Last night a communication was received from Ljubibratic & Co. offering \$150 a month.

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Several petitions in regard to taxes illegally collected were referred to the judiciary committee. A license to deal in junk was granted the Blumkin-Hyde Junk company on Platinum street between Ohio and Arizona.

A petition from J. H. Hunter for permission to engage in the house moving business, with offices at Utah avenue and Front street, was referred back for proper signatures.

The following petitions were referred to the proper committees: From W. H. Patterson and other owners of property in the Welcome Stranger addition, asking that an alley be opened up between Dakota and Pacer streets from Iron through to Alhambra; from the Royal Milling company for permission to place a weighing scale at the intersection of Utah, Arizona and Gold streets.

LIKES THE CRASH. Falling Glass Makes Music for Leon. Throws Stones Through Windows.

John B. Leon, who for three weeks has been at the best detective skill of Chicago and in that time destroyed \$10,000 to \$15,000 worth of plate-glass windows in Chicago, was brought to the detention hospital this morning by the police.

He was found on the street talking to himself, and locked up for safe-keeping. Leon is both sane and insane. He realizes his condition, knows he has mental loss when he talks to himself and his mind is beyond control.

He is a philosopher and something of a stoic. He knows how he is handicapped by his affliction and seems to bear no malice toward those who distrust him as an employe.

It was in November, 1893, that the young Italian came into greatest notoriety. In that month he helped cut the plate-glass manufacturers to the amount of many thousand dollars.

The business district was the walking place of a crank whose mania was the shattering of windows.

The police were put to work on the case, but for days could not find the man. Big windows continued to fall with a crash, and the owners of expensive store fronts were almost in a panic.

The detection of the perpetrator of these deeds came about through his mania. Leon's missiles were small cobblestones carefully polished and marked with a cross in chalk.

One evening he stood before a particularly tempting expanse of glass on Madison street, waiting for a chance to break it with a stone.

"Go away," said Leon, "you are likely to get into trouble. Go away, I want to break that window over there."

The man was an officer in plain clothes and the Italian landed in the station. He was taken to the detention hospital, and from there sent to Jefferson, from which place he was released in a few months.

GLASGOW "FAMILY HOME." Intended Mainly for Widows and Widowers Who Go Out to Work. From the St. James' Budget.

Among the many new things started recently by the Glasgow corporation is the "Family Home." It is intended mainly for widows and widowers who go out to work. There are 100 beds, each of which contains a good bed for the father or mother, and a broad cot for the younger children.

For these rooms the parents pay 5s a week, and that sum includes lighting, heating and cleaning of them. Clean linen is supplied once a week. In the home also there are dining, recreation and nursery rooms. The children are looked after and cared for while the parents are at work, for an infinitesimal sum.

The cooking, washing and bathing arrangements are excellent; and as the thing is done on a large scale and economically arranged, the establishment is expected to pay itself. Glasgow benevolence is nothing if not practical, and the new home seems a most admirable institution.
