Wanted a Witness. Missoula, Dec. 21.—Jack Weir has returned to Missoula after an absence of several months. Most of the time he has been in Washington and in the British possessions and he will shortly return to Colfax, Wash., where he is wanted as a witness in the Hayden murder case.

A Pronounced Success. Missoula, Dec. 21.—The public installation given this evening by the local Masonic lodge was a pronounced success. The guests numbered fully 300 and the banquet which followed the exercises in the lodge room was all that could be desired.

Officers Fight Civilians. Berlin, Dec. 20.—The Arbeiter Zeitung reports an unprovoked attack by a party of officers, including Lieut. Chevalier d'Ansel, and Lieutenant Vitschin, on a number of civilians in the Cafe Rappel at Krems, Austria. Three civilians were badly wounded with swords before the police stopped the fray. Witnesses are to pay the bill. Lieutenant d'Ansel struck the waiter with his sword. The officers were not arrested.

General Sherman as a Humorist. Among the racy lot of letters from notable men published by Senator Rogers of Vermont in the December Forum is one from General Sherman brought out by Mr. Merrill's kindness in offering a resolution in the senate providing for the free admission of the diamonds presented to the general's daughter by the khedive of Egypt. He says:

"I beg to thank you in the name of my daughter, the ultimate beneficiary. Honestly, I am so conscious of the possession of an elephant of the largest dimensions that my thanks would be hollow. My daughter is married to a young man who has to search hard for a living. His whole income would not pay the tax which will be levied on this bauble. If bought within the state of Missouri, the diamonds will remain hidden away, subject to expense and all the chances of robbery and charges for keeping."
