A GREAT LUXURY.

A Big Reading Tent for the Soldiers in the Philippines. The soldiers of the 1st Montana regiment of infantry, now at Camp Merritt, are to be provided a means of spending some of their leisure moments in greater comfort than their stuffy little individual tents afford, when they reach the torrid regions of the Philippines. A movement has been started here to purchase a large chapel tent to be sent to the regiment, to be used as a place for holding meetings and as a reading

and lounging room in their idle moments. The friends of the soldiers, realizing that such a tent would be a great luxury and afford the boys a great deal of comfort they would not otherwise enjoy, got together and decided to raise the money for the purchase of the tent, by subscription, and a subscription list was opened yesterday by ex-Governor Rickard at his office in East Broadway. The tent is to be 24 by 30 feet in dimensions with side walls, with the necessary lights and conveniences, and it will cost \$150. Governor Rickard hopes to raise the money in a few days in order to be sure and have the tent ready for the regiment before its departure for Manila. The tent will be supplied with reading matter and will be a great convenience to the soldiers.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED.

Butte Teachers Condemn the Action of the State Board.

The following resolutions were passed by the Butte teachers at a meeting held after the general teachers' meeting, last Thursday afternoon. They were adopted unanimously:

"Whereas, Attempts have been made to belittle the educational interests of Butte by certain members of the state board of education in attempting to cast reflections upon the reputation of this corps of instructors;

"Resolved, That we, the teachers of Butte, condemn the action of the said board of education for its recent act in going out of its way to not approve the nomination of Superintendent J. P. Hendricks as temporary instructor in the summer session of the state normal; that such action was evidently prompted by personal and partisan motives and to belittle the educational interests of Butte, and since the position was not sought and not desired by our superintendent, but tendered to him by the local board at Dillon, the action of the state board is the more odious.

"Resolved, That the educational affairs of the state of Montana should be conducted in the interests of the entire state and its entire population, and not in behalf and for the advantages of any section, clique, ring, faction, party, religion, nationality, person or association.

"Resolved, That we deplore the fact that the management of state educational institutions has kept many students away from them, and especially is this true of Butte; that we believe with wiser management, higher scholarship and broader principles the attendance would be greatly increased.

"Resolved, That we are most emphatically opposed to the foisting of individual ideas, impractical and irrational, under the euphonious name of 'new education,' and to the attempt to compel the educational trustees to accept the worn-out theories of deluded enthusiasts and upon failure to accept them be voted by the partisan members of the state board of education as 'backwoodish' and 'behind the times.'

"Resolved, That this corps of teachers, representing, as it does, years of experience and training in the leading colleges, normals and public schools of the land, not only believes in educational progress, but that we are progressing and endeavoring to give the most satisfactory results obtained by experience, research and common sense.

"Resolved, That we extend to the honorable board of trustees and Superintendent J. P. Hendricks our sincere thanks for the helpful and generous work of this year and believe that the efforts of all have resulted in placing the public schools of this city on a broader, higher and firmer basis for future development.

THEY MADE A BOLD RAID

Burglars Go Through the Residence of John L. Morris.

FOUR SILVER DOLLARS

They Overlooked a Large Sum of Money and Some Expensive Jewelry. Many Complaints Are Being Made.

Burglars made a bold raid early in the evening of Friday at the residence of John L. Morris at 104 North Montana street and secured four silver dollars for their pains. They might, however, have profited much better had they been more deliberate in their search of the premises, as a considerable sum in money and jewelry was overlooked and left behind. Burglaries have been quite numerous of late, at least complaints of them to the police have been quite numerous, but for boldness that of Friday evening surpasses any that have come to the attention of the authorities, as it was committed almost in the presence of the family and the operators were out and gone before their visit was discovered.

Mr. Morris had been engaged for a week prior to the burglary in excavating for the erection of a new building at the corner of Broadway and Montana streets, adjoining his present place, and Friday he drew money from the bank to pay off the laborers. The burglars evidently learned of this fact, as it was obviously the money they were after.

During the early part of the evening the family, with the exception of Miss Rose Morris, were sitting on the porch on the second story of the house, and it was during this time the burglars entered and went through the house unmolested.

About 8:30 Miss Rose, who had been at one of the churches practicing with the choir, returned home. She found the drawer of a desk in the sitting room on the first floor open, a rather unusual occurrence, and her suspicions being aroused, she turned on the lights and found the room had been ransacked. Miss Morris quickly summoned the family from upstairs, and an investigation was made. The room was turned topsy-turvy and the burglars had gone through everything that appeared as though it might contain valuables.

After a thorough search it was found that the only thing the burglars had secured was \$4 in silver. Mr. Morris' desk had been thoroughly ransacked, but in their haste the burglars had overlooked the thing they were doubtless after, the money Mr. Morris had drawn to pay his laborers. The money, something over \$100, was found among some papers in the desk. A number of valuable rings, which were also in the room, were likewise overlooked.

The burglars are supposed to have gone boldly into the house through the front door, which had been left unfastened, none of the family dreaming of thieves having the nerve to enter in broad daylight. The burglary was reported to the police, but as the money operators left no track there is little hope of apprehending them.

A REMARKABLE SCENE.

Judge Clancy Tells a Woman That She is Not Right in Her Head.

There was a somewhat remarkable scene in Judge Clancy's court room yesterday afternoon, during which the judge told a woman who had a matter before him that he thought she was not altogether right in her head. The woman, Mrs. Albert Morrison, mother of Albert Morrison, a newsboy who has been growing wayward. The mother seems to have lost all control of the boy and on different occasions she would draw on his father, and the county attorney to help her restrain the boy. She did not want to have him sent to the reform school, but thought if he were arrested and placed in jail he would be scared into being good. The experiment was tried, but it failed in its purpose.

A few days ago the boy ran away again and Mrs. Morrison again called on the sheriff and the boy was arrested. She then consented to have him sent to the reform school, and Mr. Stapleton drew up an information and it was filed in court yesterday afternoon. No sooner, however, had the information been filed than Mrs. Morrison repented. She did not want her boy to go to the reform school, and she asked Mr. Stapleton to hold him or wait a while before taking any further action, as she would not appear against the boy. The county attorney became disgusted and he went into court and obtained permission to withdraw the information.

After that had been done Mrs. Morrison appeared and asked permission of the court to say a few words in explanation. The permission being granted, she said her boy was wayward, that he would not go to school and that he had one clear beyond her control. She would send him to the reform school as a last resort, but wanted the boy held until she could hear from some private school. She said a friend had written for her to a private institution, and if she could get the boy into that she would rather do it, as she was able to pay for his keeping.

"Well, madam," said the judge, interrupting Mrs. Morrison, "I don't want to hear you any longer. I think you are affected in your head." Mrs. Morrison stood looking at the judge on the bench for a moment and then turned and walked out of the court room, remarking that she "would see about that." Her boy was ordered released from jail.
