

ANACONDA NEWS. TOO MUCH ELECTRICITY

A Thunder Storm Calls a Game Off in the Fourth.

B. A. & P. BOYS NOT IN IT

Electric Light Employees Pile Up Five Runs and the Railroaders Score Nothing—Lightning and Rain Send Crowds to Cover.

Yesterday was a fine baseball day, barring a rainstorm of about 30 minutes' duration, which began just when everybody in town was looking at a hot ball game. The Athletic field was soon converted into a sea of mud, and when the shower ceased the grounds were in no condition for a continuance of the game and the Electric and the B. A. & P. returned home after playing three and a half innings. It was the same way up at the Lake park, where the Lone Stars (a junior nine) and the colored nine started to play a game of base ball. They had reached the sixth inning when rain interfered, with the score standing 11 to 2 in favor of the young boys.

A good-sized crowd went to the Athletic field early to see the advertised game between a Butte team of juniors and the Shamrocks of this city. It appears that a hitch, quite unexpected, occurred to prevent the game, and the Butte boys didn't come down just as the Anaconda regular nine didn't go to Butte to play the crack nine there; so Anaconda enthusiasts were content to see a game arranged between two very good teams from the employees of the railroad and those from the Electric light company's force. If the weather had not been so obstinate and showed some consideration for the lovers of the national game, there would no doubt have been a game worth seeing, and the boys started out with a vim and gave every indication of doing something grand, if nothing more. The score was: Electric, 5; B. A. & P.'s, 0.

The line was made up of the following crack-jacks: Griffith, Lynch, Harry, Emerson, Westland, Judah, Shelby, Daly and Howe. The Electric came in the following band: Freeman, Long, M. Sullivan, Messinger, McHale, Sutton, J. Sullivan, Railway and Potter.

The Electric went to bat and scored twice, Sutton and McHale crossing the plate. The railroaders couldn't do anything to prevent, after which, in the second, the Electric made two more runs, Sutton and Freeman this time scoring. Again the railroaders tried for home, but didn't reach by a long shot, and their opponents made one run in the third, Railway scoring. In the first half of the fourth the railroaders made a good start by Harry making first on a hit, and then electricity came so fast that Empire Charleton called time, while the players and crowd ran to the shelter. The lightning flashed in a dozen different sign languages, and the thunder roared and shook the foundation of the grand stand. What the overflow of the tall race did not do to the grounds, the rainstorm yesterday accomplished in a few minutes, and now the diamond and gridiron white marks are all run and jumbled together, so as to resemble most anything the imagination cares to conceive. It was the hardest electrical storm of the year and the rain came in torrents, June is the banner month of lightning, and yesterday was a red letter day in that particular line.

THE STREETS CLEANED.

Rain Washes the City and Flushes the Gutters.

The weather has been extremely sultry for three days, and yesterday afternoon the inevitable came in the shape of an exciting electrical storm. Vivid flashes of lightning and crashing thunder followed in despatchly rapid succession. Rain began to fall at 4 o'clock and continued with increased force for about 25 or 30 minutes. Small rivulets in the streets grew to raging streams, and light debris was hurried down toward the east end. Chips, cigar stumps, doggers and empty cigarette packages floated alongside of lemon and banana peels and old shoes. The gutters and curbs were washed out as whistles, and in some places the water cut deep channels where the ground is required to be smooth.

An unusual occurrence was noticed in rain barrels after the storm. The surface of the water was covered with sulphur dust, as much as half an ounce of the dust having been skimmed off of the water in one barrel. The flagstaff of the brewery was struck by lightning and splintered into a thousand pieces, which were strewn over a considerable area. No damage was done to the brewery.

The big drain ditch on the hillside south of the city broke and a flood of muddy water swept down Maple and Elm streets. Several small houses were partly submerged and a number of cel-

And Anaconda will celebrate, too; to what extent will be decided upon at to-night's meeting. In order to carry out plans properly and effectively committees must be appointed and work assigned to them. This work must be attended to at once, and to insure full and representative committees it is necessary that a large attendance be on hand. One or two men cannot go ahead and do all the work, but that number can offer suggestions. The suggestions will be offered at the meeting this evening, and if men join with each other in a general committee the work of arranging a celebration will be an easy matter. This Fourth more than any other in the history of this city is the one to be celebrated with all the heart and soul of the populace. There are many things that will form most excellent subjects of discourses at this time, and once the start is made all will be clear sailing. Turn out and make it a rousing start and the finish will take care of itself. Help those who have taken the initiative in the patriotic movement and make old Mount Blagoin tremble on the Fourth. The eagle is screaming, but with a little assistance he can scream louder.

"GET MARRIED."

A Few Words of Advice to the Eligible Young Men and Women.

In his fourth sermon on "Sermons for the Times and Place," Rev. Mr. Euster of the M. E. church spoke about the wrong idea prevalent about single blessedness and the ever recurring thought in his impression. He said in this relation:

"One of the greatest evils we have today, with which the future must contend, is the number of bachelors in the cities of the land and the fact that bachelors are increasing. France has within her borders over 3,000,000 bachelors, and she is the lowest in respect to morals, and with the fact that her immorality has lowered her standard before the nations of the world in the matter of having good soldiers; for the time was a century ago, when the soldiers of France were among the best, but now they are obliged to take a very degraded place in comparison with other nations. This idea of single blessedness oftentimes works out for single cussedness. The idea of home and the home life is the sure foundation of a nation's prosperity and stability; when the home idea is destroyed once it is time to hang out the danger signal, for complete wreck is not far in the distance. There is an agitation going on in parts of the nation for a law taxing single men over 25 years of age high enough so that the amount of revenue derived from this source will support the girls who are obliged to work at manual labor for a living. How much better would this city be if all the single men were married and had homes of their own, where they could cultivate the arts of civilization and thus grow up as husbands and fathers? It would be an immense gain for the city and a great blessing to every one of the men themselves.

"I honor the boys who rent cabins and have at least that much of a home life, and I have noticed that nearly all who get married are those who have tried this cabin life. It is a very hard thing to live the hotel life, and as one grows older, as this is indicated by boarding houses. This is about as far from the home life as anything can be, and with temptations very fatal and very numerous to lead away from the simplicity of the old home life, where all those amenities and blessings were prevalent. It is next to impossible for any young man to entirely forget the home life of his younger days, and this very fact in this boarding house existence will lead in the end to a home and as a result the money all goes, strength goes, mental powers are undermined and morals are only a dream! Build up the home life. Get married and cease your folly.

"Not alone is there danger relative to the boys. I was conversing with one of the most respected of our citizens the other day, and he said that the thing upon which he looked with the greatest concern and alarm was the habit of placing women in competition with men, and that in such manner that the women would do for an amount what the men could do for that amount, and thus break down one safeguard, financial, and also another, moral, by demanding that they dress well and live well, but without enough wages for either. He spoke of the terrible havoc wrought in large dry goods houses where girls were obliged to clerk for starvation wages, and other places where this same fearful tendency was apparent. This has much to do in breaking down the idea of home life. If this dangerous tendency should continue it is hard to tell where we will land in another generation. When the home idea goes, with this sure foundation washed away, it will not be long until the nation goes. A good, elevated, pure, religious home is the best and grandest thing upon the continent, of inestimable value to the state and a blessing to all who belong to it."

Female Mail Carrier in Ohio.

Miss Sadie Webb of Porter township, Ohio, for two years has discharged personally her duties as contractor on the United States mail route No. 31,277, which takes in five thriving towns. Every day except Sunday she drives 32 miles, making 192 miles a week, and before her four years' term expires she will have reeled off 36,554 miles. Miss Webb is just out of her teens and is the pride of the county. Besides carrying the mails for four postoffices she buys all of the goods for four general stores in the villages along the route that she has to travel. She also carries passengers. How to Tell an Officer's Rank.

The shoulder straps of the army officer from the second lieutenant to the major general are the same as regards shape and outer ornamentation, and it is only by the distinguishing marks on the pad that the rank of the wearer is designated. A shoulder strap is a narrow strap of heavy cloth one and three-eighths inches wide by four inches long, bordered with an embroidery of gold a quarter of an inch wide. If the pad has no mark on it the wearer is a second lieutenant; if the pad has at each end one silver embroidered five-pointed star in the center, it is a brigadier general; if two silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a major; if three silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a lieutenant general; if four silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a major general; if five silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a lieutenant general; if six silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a major general; if seven silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a lieutenant general; if eight silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a major general; if nine silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a lieutenant general; if ten silver embroidered five-pointed stars, it is a major general.
