

HARMONY PREVAILED IN THE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

Full County Ticket Nominated Without the Slightest Hitch—Candidates Fought Hard, but Squarely—The Nominees Are All Representative Citizens of the County—Their Election Assured. Resolutions Adopted—Convention Had a Full Representation of Delegates—Delegates to State Convention Selected.

For representatives in the legislature: John Fitzpatrick of Washington gulch. J. R. Toole of Anaconda. E. D. Matts of Anaconda. J. M. Madden of Anaconda. O. Y. Warren of Warm Springs. Charles Boylan of Carroll. For sheriff—John Conley of Anaconda. For county treasurer—P. J. Twohy of Anaconda. For county clerk and recorder—M. Martin of Anaconda. For county attorney—John H. Duffy of Anaconda. For county assessor—George S. Miller of Deer Lodge. For county superintendent of schools—Miss Helena Gleason of Anaconda. For county surveyor—W. E. Pinegar of Anaconda. For coroner—A. Hardenbrook of Anaconda. For public administrator—W. Y. Batterson of Anaconda.

The ticket above named is that of the democratic party of Deer Lodge county. It was nominated at one of the most harmonious county conventions ever held. There was no ill feeling whatsoever, and the only incident that came anywhere near being out of tune was a remark or two which came about on the legislative ticket. The incident, however, amounted to nothing, and the utmost good feeling prevailed throughout the convention. The ticket nominated is composed of citizens who are representatives of the community in every sense of the word. The ticket will without the shadow of a doubt receive the undivided support of every true democrat in Deer Lodge county. The gentlemen named in yesterday's convention will serve, while in office, the best interests of the whole people of the county, and that they will each and every one be elected there can be no question.

The convention was held at the Margaret theater, one of the most pleasant audience rooms in the state. The convention began at 2 o'clock and lasted until 12:30 o'clock this morning. There was a large attendance of delegates, the whole number of delegates, as apportioned under the act, with only three or four exceptions being present. Some of the candidates who had been spoken of for the different offices did not materialize in the convention, and there were some who had not been counted on before the convention was shown up with considerable strength. Marcus Talbot was in the race for county clerk and recorder, and Charles H. Williams, who was expected to be out for county treasurer, was not nominated. One of the candidates for sheriff before the convention, Martin Gleason, did not appear in the nominations. Pat Twohy, the successful candidate for the nomination of county treasurer, was not personally in the convention, being confined to his home by illness. M. Martin, the nominee for county clerk and recorder, had the distinction of receiving the largest number of votes in the convention, where a ballot was taken. The offices of sheriff and county attorney consumed the greater part of the time, owing to the large number of ballots necessary in the selection of candidates.

It was 2:15 when Chairman of the County Committee J. R. Toole took his seat upon the stage. Only the chairman and the secretary, J. R. Walkup, occupied the stage. It was some minutes before the large number of delegates got into their quarters, and there was much moving about and shifting of seats before the convention finally got down to business.

Mr. Toole called the convention to order and Secretary Walkup read the call, in which the apportionment was given. Ed Burke nominated J. H. Durston for temporary chairman. The nomination was carried unanimously. Mr. Toole appointed Dr. O. Y. Warren and Mr. Ed Burke as a committee to escort Mr. Durston to the chair. Mr. Durston thanked the convention for the honor and congratulated the democracy of the county, especially at this time, when the prospects for democratic success in the national field were so hopeful. He then called for nominations for temporary secretary. J. R. Quigley of Blackfoot City nominated J. R. Walkup for temporary secretary and the motion was carried without opposition.

J. R. Toole's motion was to select the chair appoint three committees, five members each on credentials, permanent order of business and platform and resolutions. J. R. Quigley objected, saying that the appointment of all the committees was too much to be left to one man. The motion was carried, there being but a few dissenting votes. Mr. Durston then named the following committees:

Credentials—Tom McTague of Deer Lodge; John Hamill, Anaconda; P. Y. Murphy, Carroll; George Barich, Anaconda; J. R. Quigley, Blackfoot City. Order of Business and Permanent Organization—A. M. Walker, J. W. Geary.

Col. P. O'Leary then moved that the convention take a recess until 3 o'clock. Tom McTague suggested that the hour be made 3:30 o'clock in order that the committee on credentials might have time enough to do its work. J. R. Quigley moved that before the convention took a recess the chairman of the various delegations step forward and deliver their credentials. The motion was carried. All of the delegations brought in their credentials except Pioneer, Blensburg, Bald Butte and Granite Butte.

Mr. Durston then put the motion to take a recess until 3:30, which was carried. At 3:30 o'clock promptly, Mr. Durston dropped his gavel on the speaker's stand and in five minutes the convention was at work. The report of the committee on credentials was read by the secretary. The committee recommended that J. R. Quigley be seated as a delegate from Pioneer and that he also be delegated to cast the vote for Ovando and one of the other unrepresented precincts, also that the Stuart delegation consist of Tom Ford and D. Griffin. The report was unanimously adopted.

The report of the committee on permanent organization and order of business was then read. It recommended that J. R. Quigley of Blackfoot City be elected permanent chairman, J. R. Walkup permanent secretary and W. W. Goodman assistant secretary. The order of business as recommended by the committee started out with the selection of six candidates for the legislative ticket. It also provided that the chair appoint a committee to select the names of the delegates to the state convention. The report was unanimously adopted. Mr. Durston appointed A. M. Walker and J. R. Toole as a committee to escort Mr. Quigley to the chair.

As the old veteran of democracy stepped upon the platform the convention burst into thunderous applause. Mr. Quigley thanked the convention for the honor conferred upon him. He was sorry that he was not a Cleverly. He understood that there were a number of candidates who would ask the convention for favors. He hoped they would all fight fair and square. The democracy of Deer Lodge county must place a good thing in the field, and if this was done he had no fear of its election. He again thanked the convention for the honor conferred upon him. He had acted as chairman of the democratic convention for 15 years and hoped he would live to act for 25 years more. Upon the conclusion of his remarks he was loudly applauded.

Gets Down to Work. The convention then got down to work at once. Mr. Durston was recognized. He said that in the interest of Deer Lodge county democracy he had taken the liberty to write out a list of names whom he desired to place in nomination for the legislature. The names were representative democrats of the county and men who would serve the interests of the entire community faithfully, earnestly and energetically.

The names read by Mr. Durston were as follows: John Fitzpatrick of Washington gulch, Dr. O. Y. Warren of Warm Springs, J. R. Toole of Anaconda, Charles Boylan of Carroll, E. D. Matts of Anaconda and J. M. Madden of Anaconda. He moved that the nomination be made by ballot, and that the ballot be taken by a rising vote. Tom McTague rose to offer an objection to the method of nominating the legislative ticket. The nominations, he said, ought to be made singly. He wound up his remarks by saying that "there was lots of time, and we have our fighting clothes on."

The ballot was taken by a rising vote, the result of which was 43 in favor of Mr. Durston's motion and 43 against.

There was considerable applause when the result of the vote was announced. The next order of business was the appointment of the committee to select delegates to the state convention. The chair appointed the following gentlemen as such committee: J. R. Toole, B. McGinley, James W. Geary, Dr. O. Y. Warren and Thomas Elliott. Tom McTague was at first named, but he declined to act. John McInerney of Deer Lodge was also named, but he, too, refused to serve.

Nominations for the office of sheriff were then called for. Col. T. O'Leary took the floor. He said the democrats of Deer Lodge county had been very fortunate in their selection of a sheriff heretofore. He desired to place in nomination a man who learned his democracy at the feet of one of his masters, who was a friend of Douglas and the great Lincoln; who was a major general during the rebellion; an associate justice of the supreme court of the state of Illinois; a senator from several states; the only man who had ever defeated Stonewall Jackson in battle. He referred to Gen. James Shields, and from this illustrious man had the candidate whom Colonel O'Leary desired to place in nomination received his primary lessons in democracy. He desired to place before the convention the name of James Shields of Anaconda. He did not desire to take up the time of the convention by a lengthy speech. He did not care to go into the dark ages and disturb the dead, as the speaker had done who preceded him. He congratulated Mr. Shields on being related to such a hero as the great General Shields. It afforded him great pleasure to place before the convention the name of a man who was known to every man, woman and child in the county; nay, he would go further, a man who was known to every person within the confines of Deer Lodge county. A finer gentleman never trod the walks of life, nor had any one ever lived in closer touch with the people than the man he desired to nominate; that man was William Kelly of Anaconda. Warren W. Goodman had promised to nominate a man for the office of sheriff. The man to whom he referred

General Jacob Buch, acting chief division officer of the North Pacific division of the Christian volunteers, is in the city arranging to organize a branch of the army. He was here about three months ago and spoke about establishing a foothold for his volunteers in this city. The church or army was founded in San Francisco on Christmas day of 1896, and since that date missionaries have been building up congregations all over the western part of the United States. It is so far an exclusive coast movement, no work as yet having been done in the East, although it is the plan of the promoters to extend the scope of work to cover the world sooner or later. General Buch will remain here for a few days before going to Butte, where he is booked to deliver a lecture from one of the pulpits of that city. From there he goes to Ruby Valley and later will organize a church at Great Falls. The principle of the order is similar to that of the Salvation Army, except that the Christian Volunteers administer the sacrament of the Lord's Supper once in three months at least, besides they follow more strictly the teachings of the Bible and adhere more closely to its tenets.
