

ANACONDA NEWS. FIRE SYSTEM COMPLETED

Department Wires Are Now Independent Lines.

A NEEDED IMPROVEMENT

Danger of Alarm Wires Becoming Crossed With Other Lines Now Reduced to a Minimum—The Department's New Library.

One of the greatest improvements, and one that has long been needed, has been made in the fire alarm system in this city.

For a long time, in fact for some years, the department has been greatly annoyed by the almost daily interruptions which occurred in the service.

The old wires were bare iron wires of the No. 14 gauge, which is very small. The fact that they were not at all protected by any insulation exposed them to the danger of becoming crossed with any of the hundreds of wires running on the same poles.

This condition grew annoying as additional wires were put upon the poles. Chief Mentrin finally decided to put in an entire new system of wires.

This is an improvement which the department has long needed, and now that it is finally accomplished, the people will no more be started out of their beds at midnight by the wild ringing of the fire bell.

The school trustees have about concluded to put in private fire alarm boxes at the different school houses.

A DOG FIGHT. Witnessed by 50 Sports in This City Saturday Night.

One of the best dog fights ever seen in Anaconda was witnessed on Washington street, in the Eastern addition of this city, Saturday night at 11 o'clock.

More than 50 sports of Butte and Anaconda met at 10 o'clock on Saturday night, in a well-attended resort of this town, and half an hour later, departed for the scene, where the "best fight of the year" was scheduled to take place.

The fight was to be between two bulldogs of great renown in this city. The purse was for some hundreds of dollars.

The two dogs were the property of a well-known merchant and a likewise well-known saloon keeper. Only 25 sports were allowed in the barn, where a very suitable ring had been pitched.

At the time announced, both dogs were brought out by their trainers. They had not been fed for a few days, and both seemed anxious to get at one another. Sharp on time, the signal was given by the referee, and both dogs

were thrown into the pit. The saloon keeper's dog seemed more plucky than his rival. He made several jumps at the merchant's dog, but the latter seemed to be up to all the tricks of the game, and simply jumped away. They foiled in the pit for more than 10 minutes. Finally, the saloon man's dog seemed to fire of those tactics, and he went at his "dog" with a pluck that was surprising. He got him by the leg, but had to let go, as he got a bad bite around the neck. It is then that the fighting between the two animals began in earnest. The merchant's dog was on the aggressive for a few minutes, but as it did not prove profitable to him, he went on the defensive. The change proved fatal to him. After 25 minutes of fighting, the merchant's dog weakened and the spectators who had their money up on the saloon keeper's dog began to cheer. The fight was far from being finished. The dogs again participated in a fight, and it was then that the spectators on both sides began cheering. For more than 12 minutes it was a case of nip and tuck. One dog would bite the other, who would try to run away from him. The next moment it would be the reverse that would occur.

Finally, after 38 minutes of as terrific a bulldog fight as was ever seen in this state, the saloon keeper's dog bit his adversary severely on the throat, a bite which finished him. The referee awarded the victory to the saloon keeper's dog. As for the merchant's bulldog, he will never again participate in a fight, as he died 20 minutes after receiving the bite.

The referee of the fight was a well-known sport of this city. Much money changed hands on the fight. One young man of this town was enriched by more than \$400 on the result.

REAR-END COLLISION.

Four Persons Were Seriously Injured—No Fatalities.

Pendleton, Ore., Dec. 11.—A rear end collision occurred this morning on the Oregon Railway & Navigation railroad 12 miles east of here, between the west-bound fast mail and freight train No. 21. Four persons were seriously, though not fatally injured. The injured are:

Jay Adams of San Francisco, general agent of the Nickel Plate railroad, cut and scalded; David Pilger of Manunk, Ill., cut about the head and scalded; Louis Plechner, traveling salesman of Guiterman Brothers of St. Paul, slightly cut and scalded; Fireman Harry Burrows of the freight train, cut on the forehead.

The passenger train stopped near Cayuse station to remove a horse which had been caught in a cattle guard. A brakeman was sent back to flag the freight train, which was following, but before the freight engineer could bring his heavy train to a stop it crashed into the Pullman sleeper.

The rear of the Pullman was crushed to splinters and several freight cars were piled up in the ditch. There were nine people in the Pullman, but all escaped injury except three. Pilger, Adams and Plechner, passengers, who were injured, were dressing at the time of the accident. The steam pipes of the engine burst and the escaping steam scalded the three injured men.

Statement of Imports. Washington, Dec. 11.—The monthly statement of imports into the United States for the month of November, made by the bureau of statistics, shows that during that month the imports of wool amounted to \$67,284, as against \$1,622,384 for November, 1897. The same month the imports of tea aggregated \$38,066 as against \$1,655,490 for November last year, both showing a material decrease. The imports of sugar, however, increased from \$2,755,467 in November, 1897, to \$3,627,685, or about 20 per cent.

IT WILL BE REGRETTED

Father Pirnat's Departure From St. Ann's Hospital.

HE IS HIGHLY ESTEMED

He Will Be the Pastor of the New St. Peter's Church—It Will Not Be Opened Until After New Year's.

Father Pirnat is preparing to leave St. Ann's hospital to take charge of the new St. Peter's Austrian church.

This announcement will be sorrowfully received by the Sisters and patients of St. Ann's hospital. Father Pirnat, as was expressed by one of the Sisters, is a "child of the house," and his departure will be greatly regretted.

The Austrian father, who has been the chaplain of the institution since 1895, also expresses regret at leaving his home, the only one he has ever had in Anaconda, but, like many others, he has to answer the call of duty.

Father Pirnat has been named pastor of the new St. Peter's Austrian church in this city. The church it is believed will be opened about New Year's, and some time thereafter. It will not be dedicated to St. Peter before the pews are put in and the decorations arranged. Such is the wish of Father Pirnat.

There was for a time a desire among the parishioners of the new church that the opening should take place on Christmas eve. That desire has been given up. Their wish was impossible of realization, as Father Pirnat will be at St. Paul's church for the midnight mass on Christmas eve.

There has been no time set as yet for the departure of Father Pirnat from the hospital. Some of the Sisters, when seen, say that it is to be hoped that Father Pirnat will retain the charge of chaplain of the hospital and also attend to the business of his church, which would be possible.

The Austrians will find in their pastor one of the brightest names in the priesthood. He is well educated in both English and French, and a very fluent speaker in both languages. As a preacher in his native language he has few superiors.

Father Pirnat was born in Austria on Oct. 20, 1872. He studied his classics in his native land. His seminary studies were performed in the St. Paul seminary, St. Paul, Minn., under Archbishop Ireland. He was ordained in the priesthood by Bishop Brondel in Helena in 1895. He was then sent to St. Ann's hospital in this city, where he has remained ever since.

Father Pirnat is highly respected and respected by the Austrians, and there is no doubt that they will make his lot a happy one.
