BURT MARSH ON TRIAL

All the Evidence in the Case Presented.

IS READY FOR ARGUMENT

Details of the Hearing Resumed Before Justice Nichols - The Testimony Presented by the Defense.

The preliminary hearing of Burt Marsh, the lawyer who is accused of inflaming Thomas Jones, a client, was resumed in Justice Nichols' court yesterday afternoon.

The taking of testimony was finished and an adjournment taken to this morning to hear the arguments of counsel, after which the court's decision discharging or binding over the defendant will be given.

It will be remembered that at the previous session of the hearing, held last week, the state introduced testimony to show that Thomas Jones employed Marsh to institute a damage suit against Evan Fisher for \$200; that the suit was brought and subsequently compromised; that Marsh represented to Jones that he compromised with Fisher for \$100, turning over \$90 to Jones and retaining the balance for his fees.

The defense set up was that Marsh had compromised the suit for \$150, that he agreed with Jones when he began the suit against Fisher was that he was to have half of whatever he recovered from Fisher and that in accordance with this agreement Marsh paid Jones \$75. A receipt for \$75 running from Jones to Marsh was introduced in evidence by the defense, the signature to which Jones repudiated.

An important point in the case hinged upon a scene which transpired in the court of Justice Bliss at South Butte. One O'Donnell was on trial for a public offense and Marsh was defending him.

THEY WERE BOUND OVER

Earles and Edwards Must Stand a Trial.

WILL BE SENT TO HELENA

Ball Has Been Fixed at \$1,000 Each - It Is Possible That Habeas Corpus Proceedings Will Be Instituted.

Earles and Edwards, whose side of the case was heard Monday by United States Commissioner Wood, were yesterday bound over to the district court of the Northern district of Idaho, in the sum of \$1,000.

From the evidence in this case, it does not appear possible that these defendants could have committed the crime alleged in the first count of this indictment, and I am of the opinion they established an alibi.

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A SERIOUS LOSS

A Rare Collection of B. O. Books Destroyed by Fire.

Rabbi Maurice Eisenberg sustained a serious loss by fire yesterday, which destroyed a large portion of a very valuable library. Dr. Eisenberg lives in the residence owned by Mrs. Joseph Oppenheimer at 862 West Granite street.

He has a study on the second floor in which is kept his library, a collection of books containing many rare volumes, and for this reason the collection had a high value. The bookcase stood close beside the stove in the study. A few weeks ago a leg of the stove got broken and a block of wood was used to hold the stove up until repairs could be made.

The department responded to the alarm shortly after 2 o'clock, in putting out the fire some of the books were considered a long time and Chief Sanger proposed to dip in water, but Rabbi Eisenberg thought more of the print could be saved by letting them dry out, as the water would do about as much damage as fire, and at his suggestion the books in this condition were placed in a pile, he promising to watch them, and the department withdrew.

Two persons ran for a fire alarm box at the same time. One pulled box 45 at Broadway and Excelsior, and another box 28 at Quartz and Alabama. No. 45 came in first and the department responded. Immediately 45 ceased striking 28 came in, calling out the reserve. The incident created considerable excitement down town, as it was feared a big fire had broken out on the West side. It turned out that both runs were useless.

This was the first fire to occur under the regime of the new chief, Peter Sanger.
