THE COUNTY FINANCES

Annual Statement of Them Prepared by County Clerk.

GOOD CONDITION SHOWN

Inventory of County Property Shows It to Be Worth Nearly One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars. The County Debt.

County Clerk Martin has completed the annual financial statement which he is obliged to make, under the provisions of section 4294 of the code, and present to the commissioners at their March meeting. The report is somewhat similar to the annual report he prepared recently, but is more detailed in character. Among other items it contains the following inventory of the property owned by the county and the valuation thereof:


Total... \$148,896. In placing a valuation on the new court house and jail property in this city, County Clerk Martin fixed the sum at what has been expended to date. The valuation on the Deer Lodge court house property was fixed on the same basis as that used when the county was divided, namely, the original cost less 1 per cent, per year depreciation. As the property is 29 years old, 29 per cent of the original cost was deducted.

The cash assets and liabilities of the county are set forth in the recapitulation of the report in ledger form as follows: To bonds, 1 to 156, \$150,000.00. To interest on same, 5 months, 3,125.00. To bonds, 151 to 250, 100,000.00. To interest on same, 6 months, 2,683.33. To contingent fund overdrawn, 3,558.19. To warrants unpaid, 70,028.45. To accrued interest on same, 2,262.83. By cash on hand, general fund, \$44,197.15. By cash on hand, poor fund, 14,946.07. By cash on hand, road fund, 9,352.84. By cash on hand, bridge fund, 3,946.62. By cash on hand, bond fund, 16,741.64. By cash on hand, court house fund, 18,182.38. By cash on hand, back tax, 1,267.86. Balance, Dec. 1, 1899, 222,421.24.
