

ORDINANCE NO. 14.
An Ordinance Defining the Rules Governing the City Council of the City of Butte and Defining the Duties of City Officers.
 (Passed May 20th, 1878.)
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BUTTE:
CHAPTER I.
SECTION 1. The City Council shall meet regularly for the transaction of municipal business on the second Monday in each month, at the hour of 7:30 p. m., or at such other hour as may be fixed by resolution. All meetings shall be held at the City Hall.
Sec. 2. That oral or written notice shall be given to each member of the City Council, or so many as may constitute a quorum, of all special meetings, by the officer calling the same.
Sec. 3. At the hour appointed for meeting, the City Council shall be called to order by the Mayor, or in his absence by the Clerk, who shall proceed to call the roll, and note the absentees, and announce whether or not the City Council shall meet in the absence of the Mayor. The Council shall elect one of their number chairman, who shall preside and discharge all the duties of the Mayor (except the signing of the warrants and the journal) during the absence of the Mayor. Upon the appearance of a quorum the Council shall proceed to business in the following order:
 1st. Reading of the minutes of the last meeting and amendment and approval of the same.
 2d. Reports of officers.
 3d. Reports of select committees.
 4th. Presentations of petitions and communications.
 5th. Unfinished business.
 6th. Notices, motions and resolutions.
Sec. 4. All questions relating to the priority of business shall be determined by the Mayor, who shall designate and appoint such standing committees as he may deem necessary.
CHAPTER II.
CITY OFFICERS AND THEIR APPOINTMENT.
SECTION 1. There shall be appointed by the Mayor by and with the advice and consent of the City Council, one City Attorney, one City Assessor, and one City Marshal, whose term of office shall be one year from the date of their appointment, and until their successors shall have been duly appointed and qualified: *Provided,* however, that the City Council shall have the right at any time to remove any of the officers for inefficiency or corruption in office.
CHAPTER III.
SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the police justice to keep the docket required by the laws of the Territory to be kept by justices of the peace, to hear and determine all cases that may be instituted in the police court under the ordinance of the city; to pay all fines collected; to violate the ordinances of the city; to receive the same fees that are by law allowed to all justices of the peace for like services.
Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the City Attorney to prosecute all suits for the recovery of fines and penalties, and to prosecute or defend all suits by or against the city, or any of its officers, on account of their official acts. He shall cause executions to be issued on judgments in favor of the city, and attend to their prompt collection, and pay all moneys received by him on account of the city to the City Treasurer.
Sec. 3. The City Attorney is hereby authorized by any ordinance or order of the City Council, and he shall be the legal adviser of the city and all of its officers.
Sec. 4. The City Attorney is hereby authorized to take appeals in all suits that, in his opinion and in the opinion of the City Council, are in the interest of the City, and to defend the same in the District or Supreme Courts; and to make the necessary arrangements and to execute in the name of the city the necessary appeal or other bonds, and sign the same as City Attorney.
Sec. 5. The City Assessor shall be authorized to assess all property in the City, and to present the same to the City Council, and to receive the same as follows: First, a monthly salary to be fixed by the Council; second, a fixed fee in dollars for each case before the police justice, to be taxed as costs, except in judgments rendered against the city; third, reasonable fees in suits appealed to, or commenced in, other courts.
Sec. 6. As ex-officio City Clerk he shall be the keeper of the city seal, and shall be the custodian of all city records, and attend to all proceedings in a book to be provided for that purpose. He shall countersign all warrants drawn and for what purpose, and enter the same in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, giving the date, number, amount in whose favor drawn, and for what purpose, and the date of cancellation of each warrant; and he shall do and perform such other duties as may from time to time be enjoined upon him by ordinance or order of the City Council.
Sec. 7. The City Assessor shall make a just and true annual assessment of all taxable property, real, mixed and personal (except the same by ordinance exempt) within the limits of the city, and return the same as the ordinances may require. And as ex-officio collector he shall faithfully collect the same, and when he comes due. He shall be provided with proper blank property lists with stubs attached, by the City Council, and he shall receive one-sixth of all moneys so collected, and such other compensation as the City Council may allow. He shall cancel each warrant on his register as the same is paid, and he shall endorse upon such warrants canceled quarterly to the City Council, and then deliver such warrants to the City Clerk for the action of the Council.
Sec. 8. It shall be the duty of the City Assessor as ex-officio treasurer and collector to keep a true account of all moneys received by him, stating from whom and on what account, and the same were received, in suitable books, to be provided by the City Council, and kept by him for that purpose. He shall pay from the treasury such moneys as may be ordered by the City Council, and the warrants therefor shall be signed by the Mayor, and countersigned by the Clerk, and shall state for what purpose the money is appropriated, and such warrants shall be his vouchers.
Sec. 9. Whenever any City warrant may be presented for payment, the holder shall be bound to pay the same, it shall be his duty to register such warrant in a book, to be kept by him for that purpose, stating the date, number and amount of the same, and the name of the person to whom the same is payable, the name of the person presenting the same, and the date of such presentation, and he shall endorse upon such warrant the time and date of registration, and all warrants shall be paid by him in the order in which the same are registered.
Sec. 10. The assessor shall be ex-officio treasurer and collector, shall, at the end of each quarter of the fiscal year, and oftener if required, prepare and deliver to the City Clerk a full and complete report for the quarter, stating the amount of receipts and expenditures of his office, and exhibiting all accounts and vouchers for settlement with the City Council; and at the close of each fiscal year he shall prepare and by before the City Council a full and explicit statement of receipts and expenditures of the City for such year.
Sec. 11. All officers appointed by the City Council shall before entering on their duties as such, take and subscribe the oath required of the Mayor and Aldermen. The Treasurer and Police Justice shall execute to the City, bonds conditioned for the faithful performance of their duties during their continuance in office, with at least two sufficient sureties to be approved by the City Council. The bond of the Police Justice shall be in the penal sum of twenty-five hundred dollars; and the bond of the City Assessor in the penal sum of three thousand dollars. The oath of the City Assessor shall be filed with the City Treasurer, and all other oaths and bonds with the City Clerk.
Sec. 12. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to suppress riots, disturbances and breaches of the peace; to apprehend all riotous, disorderly persons and disturbers of the public peace of the city, and all persons in the act of committing any offence against any of the ordinances of the city, or who may have committed such offence, and him, her, or them, forthwith take into custody; and if in the daytime, bring such prisoner or prisoners before the Police Justice, to be dealt with according to law; and if in the night time, to restrain him, her or them until the next day for examination or trial by such Police Justice.
Sec. 13. Whenever the Marshal shall have knowledge of the breach of any ordinance, or when information shall be given him by any person concerning the violation of any ordinance, it shall be his duty to make complaint, or cause the same to be done, before the Police Justice and obtain a warrant for the arrest of the offender.
Sec. 14. Whenever the City Council may deem it necessary, there shall be appointed by the Council one or more policemen to aid the Marshal, and such policemen shall be under the control of the Marshal during such appointment, and be assigned to duty as the Marshal may direct, and shall have the same power as the Marshal in making arrests, committing to jail, or in executing process.
Sec. 15. The City Marshal shall be the keeper of the City Jail and City Pound, and be the custodian of all real property belonging to the City, and except to the City Clerk therefor.
Sec. 16. The City Marshal or one of the policemen under him, shall upon duty at night, watchmen at dark, and equally divide the whole of the City into districts, and shall in visiting and examining every part of the city. He shall particularly inspect tenements and other buildings in every part of the City during such time, and

at any other time that he may deem such inspection necessary for the purpose of ascertaining whether any fire is burning or likely to break out therefrom, to the damage of any tenement or building; to cause such fire to be extinguished or prevented; to give immediate alarm to the inhabitants of the city in case of fire; to give immediate alarm to the fire engines to extinguish or prevent fire; and to cause defective chimneys or stove-pipes to be immediately cleaned or repaired.
Sec. 17. The Mayor, or in his absence or inability, an Alderman, is hereby authorized and required, at any time when in his opinion the City Marshal shall fail to perform his duty, to suspend such City Marshal from office and appoint some suitable person thereto and report such action to the City Council at its next meeting, together with such evidence of such failure as governed the Mayor or Alderman in such suspension and appointment; whereupon the City Council shall investigate the charges preferred, hear the proof offered to sustain the same, and either remove the City Marshal and appoint his successor, or restore the accused to duty, as justice and the good of the city may require. Every notice of such suspension and temporary appointment shall be in writing, signed by the officer making the same, and a copy thereof filed with the City Clerk, and such notice shall specify wherein the failure aforesaid consists.
Sec. 18. The City Marshal shall have the supervision of all streets, alleys and sidewalks in the City, and superintend and direct, under the City Ordinances, or orders of the City Council, the cleaning, repairing, or construction of the same.
Sec. 19. He shall make out a list of all persons liable to labor on the streets and alleys, in a book to be provided by the City Council for that purpose, and when any person shall perform such labor the words "paid by labor" shall be entered on the said list opposite the name of such person; and whenever money shall be paid in lieu of labor, the words "paid in money" shall be so entered, and all sums received by him to the use of the City shall be immediately paid to the City Treasurer.
Sec. 20. He shall receive such salary as the City Council may fix, and in addition thereto the same fees for like services as are allowed by the laws of the Territory to constables.
Provided, that nothing herein contained shall authorize the City Assessor to retain one-sixth of any money collected by him, except the annual tax of three mills on each dollar of the taxable property of said city. But for all other services performed by him in his official capacity he shall receive forty dollars per quarter.
 The above ordinance read and passed by the unanimous vote of the Council and approved by the Mayor, **HENRY JACOBS**, Mayor.
