ELECTION NEWS.

We Have Met the Enemy and We are Theirs.

Republican Gains in Nearly Every State.

Connecticut.

Hartford, Nov. 4.—The election was for legislative only, and for the Senate elections were held in only 11 of the 21 districts.

Illinois.

Chicago, Nov. 4.—The election to-day was peaceful, and a good full vote was cast.

Indiana.

Indianapolis, Nov. 4.—Sangamon county usually gives 500 Democratic majority.

Massachusetts.

Boston, November 4.—The returns, as far received, indicate that Long the Republican candidate for Governor, is elected by a 15,000 to 13,000 plurality.

Maryland.

Baltimore, Nov. 5.—Hamilton, Democrat, has a majority for Governor in this city.

Mississippi.

Birmingham, November 4.—The election is not so quiet, but little interest was manifested.

Minnesota.

St. Paul, November 4.—A great amount searching makes the count slow.

New York.

Buffalo, Nov. 4.—A Republican victory generally conceded here.

Nebraska.

Lincoln, Nov. 4.—The indications are that Cobb (Rep.), candidate for Supreme Judge, is elected over Wakely (Dem.) by 12,000 majority.

New Jersey.

Trenton, Nov. 4.—Returns thus far received show that the Republicans of New Jersey have gained one State Senator and two or three members of the Assembly.

Ohio.

Columbus, Nov. 4.—The returns from the State election until to-day, show that the Republicans have elected Cobb for supreme Judge by 1,500 majority over Wakely, Democrat.

Virginia.

Alexandria (Va.) November 4.—This city gives 533 majority for the Debt Payer's candidates for the Legislature.

ALBANY, Nov. 5.—The Evening Journal says the State is in doubt—25 Republicans in the Senate and forty Republican majority in the House.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The Express (Tammany) says: The returns thus far indicate the defeat of Robinson by at least 30,000, and the election of the rest of the Democratic State ticket by a small majority.

A late dispatch from Albany to the Commercial Advertiser says that excitement is growing there from the fact that it is believed that with the exception of Potter the Republican State ticket is elected.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—In regard to the vote on State ticket, the Herald says: "Another day has passed, the third since election, without settling the fate of any officer on the general State ticket except Governor.

The Sun estimates Cornell's plurality at 3,850, and Potter's majority at 4,230.

The World says: "The most authentic returns received at the World office elect Mr. Potter by from 5,000 to 10,000 majority.

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INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—Sangamon county usually gives 500 Democratic majority.

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PHILADELPHIA, November 4.—The indications are that the city of Philadelphia has gone Republican by a larger majority than ever known on a State ticket.
