

TERRITORIAL NEWS.

Helena Herald, Dec. 20th. The District Court adjourned Saturday. Six non-freezing Silby hydrants were received here yesterday for the fire company.

A huntsman in Meagher county succeeded in bringing down twelve elk, one mountain lion and a number of black tail deer during a recent hunting campaign in the mountains in that section.

On the 8th inst. Daniel Sullivan fell from scaffold in the Drum Lummon mine and received a severe cut in the hand and numerous bruises. He escaped further injury. He fell thirty-five feet.

Rev. J. B. Whitford held the first services of the Methodist Church (South) in Helena last Sunday.

Among the arrivals in Helena Friday were Mr. Eneas H. Macdonnell and his son, R. T. Macdonnell. These gentlemen are from Inverness, Scotland, and have been inspecting the Northwest Territory for the past six months, it being the intention of the young gentlemen to raise stock in the vicinity of Fort Macleod.


