

From Thursday's Daily. RACING AT RENSBAW'S. Tenderfoot Tracking the Tan Bark. The Second Amateur Go-As-You-Please Walking Match.

At exactly six o'clock and one minute last evening the judges called time, and the eight contestants for the amateur pedestrian go-as-you-please prize started on their weary tour around Renshaw Hall.

The judges were J. Ross Clark, H. G. Vallton and J. A. Hyde; the scorers Messrs. Joe Long, E. C. Dawson, Frank Andrews and R. H. Paxson.

The gentlemen who responded to the call of time were Messrs. Hale, Kester, Duffet, Penrose, Marks, Richards, Kelly and Clayton.

The first four miles were made in the remarkably good time of thirty minutes, the first seven miles in fifty-four minutes, there being then no decided advantage in favor of any particular one.

At seven o'clock, sixty minutes after time was called, the official score was as follows: Hale—7 miles, 11 laps. Kester—7 miles, 21 laps.

At this time Messrs. Penrose and Clayton were noticeable for the apparent absence of fatigue. The crowd soon began to gather and continued to increase steadily until about 11 o'clock.

At eight o'clock the score stood as follows—laps not counted: Kester—14 miles. Duffet—14 miles. Hale—13 miles.

Quite a number of pools were sold about eight o'clock, some running up as high as thirty dollars, with Duffet, Kester and Clayton selling as favorites.

At nine o'clock the score stood: Duffet—19 miles, 25 laps. Kester—20 miles, 5 laps.

Towards ten o'clock Hale began crawling up and at that time was selling in some pools prime favorite, Kester and Duffet being alternately the choice with Hale.

At 11 o'clock the score stood as follows: Kester—24 miles. Duffet—24 miles. Hale—23 miles.

Mr. Penrose at that time having left the track on account of a severe injury to his ankle. Six men were now on the track with two hours to go.

At 11:15 Clayton withdrew, having made 26 miles and 10 laps. The race was now contended for by Kester, Duffet and Hale, with Kester in the lead.

At 20 minutes to 12 Hale forced the pace and amid enthusiastic cheering he continued on a run and strong walk until a few minutes of the close.

At 11 o'clock the score stood as follows: Kester—30 miles, 2 laps. Duffet—29 miles, 27 laps.

At 11:15 Clayton withdrew, having made 26 miles and 10 laps. The race was now contended for by Kester, Duffet and Hale, with Kester in the lead.
