City Council. A special called meeting of the City Council met at 8 p. m. yesterday.

Resolution. A resolution was adopted instructing the Mayor to procure plans and specifications for an engine and hose cart house, and to advertise for proposals for its construction.

Water. It is a matter of great importance that the inhabitants of the City of Butte, in order to protect their property from damage and destruction by fire, should at all times have access to water in sufficient quantities, and at convenient places, to prevent the great conflagrations which seem to be the present and dangerous condition of our city; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the City Council of the City of Butte, that the Mayor of the city of Butte be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to enter into and execute a contract with the Silver Bow Water Company, whereby the city of Butte shall be obligated to pay to said Silver Bow Water Company the sum of \$100 per month, to be paid on the first day of each month, commencing on July 1st, 1922, for the use of water and fire plugs for fire purposes; and that such contract shall continue and be in force for any time from one year to ten years, to be named by said water company, and be it further

Resolved, That in the event said Silver Bow Water Company shall name any term greater than five years as the period for which the contract shall continue, it shall be deemed that the said water company shall be granted a perpetual right of way and privilege to lay water pipes in any portion of the corporate limits of the city of Butte.

Provided, That the said water company shall obligate itself to furnish and keep in repair and ready for use, at all times, a sufficient number of fire plugs, including those already in position, which are to remain where they now are, and if any portion of this number be not now in position and ready for use, the same to be placed and made ready for use, at such points along the line of the water main as may be designated by the mayor, and the mayor is hereby authorized to make such provisions in said contract concerning any alterations or changes to be made in the number of fire plugs to be used as may be agreed upon between him and the water company.

A petition from Captain Sheppard was presented, asking for an appropriation of \$50 to erect a flag pole on the school house block. Laid on the table.

Council adjourned sine die.

Theatricals To-night. An attractive bill is presented for to-night at Renshaw's Hall by the Novelty Dramatic Company. Although this company is not known to Montana audiences, it is well and favorably known everywhere on the Pacific coast. They have played successful engagements along the entire western line of the Northern Pacific, and drew large houses in Missoula and Deer Lodge. The North-west, referring to the performance of this company at Deer Lodge, said in its last issue: "There are no past players in the troupe," and of the company it said: "It is one of the best that ever appeared in Deer Lodge." A company coming so highly commended should be greeted with crowded houses in Butte.

Police Court. A stormy Sunday seems to have so dampened the ardor of the habitues of Judge Wilcox daily reception that the attendance was remarkably small and the ceremonies of such a routine character that M. Quad of the Free Press would have despair of extracting a grain of humor, or a point for a moral from the subjects presented. Only two cases were tried; John Doe for abusive language and Richard Roe for assault.

John Doe confessed to having used words, and Richard Roe admitted the soft impeachment of having, with a drunken paw, attempted to deface the features of a similarly confused comrade. Both were assessed \$5 and costs, and settled promptly at the captain's office.

Two men were brought up from Silver Bow this morning, by E. N. Radcliffe, and turned over to Sheriff Lowry, charged with a burglary up on the store of Mr. Radcliffe, committed last night. The prisoners asserted their innocence, but further than this are reticent, refusing even to give their names, and they will probably be examined to-day under the names of Richard Roe and John Doe.

From the Daily of Tuesday, RAILROAD RACKET.

The Montana Iron Horse on the Rampage. Grading between Bonanza's Landing and Bonanza is expected to be completed and the roadbed ready for truck-hauling by November first.

The plans for the centre pier are in place and fifty men are at work on the Northern Pacific bridge across the Snake river at Ainsworth's Idaho.

On the 4th inst. the Northern Pacific mill was laid to a point seven miles west of Billings, and progress reported at the rate of two miles per day.

Surveys have been made for a narrow gauge railroad from Halsey to Beilston, to be constructed upon completion of the Oregon Short Line branch to the former point.

The Portage Lake Mining Gazette says: "Those who know say that Mr. Villard laid it down that the Northern Pacific road must find an eastern outlet along the south shore of Lake Superior."

One hundred bridge builders reached Blainmont, from the east, on the 4th inst., to work on the great Northern Pacific Railroad bridge, over the Missouri River at that point. They are sent out by the Detroit Bridge Company, who expect to complete the bridge in about thirty working days.

7,000 graders and track layers are employed on the Clark's Fork division of the Northern Pacific. Grading is completed to Flathead Reservoir 70 miles west of Missoula and from Missoula 17 miles west, leaving a gap of only 55 miles ungraded between Missoula and Portland, Oregon. Trains are expected to run between these points before next Christmas.

Mr. L. J. Fisk has come up from below with sixty teams to raise the grade of the roadbed made last spring, the engineers having ordered, the change. He expects to put on one hundred teams and intends to have the contract from the mouth of Little Blackfoot to Missoula completed and received by winter. He says the engineers on the lower divisions think that with a late fall the track will be very near Missoula by the time winter shuts off work.—New Northwest.

Territorial Notes. The races at Bozeman were well attended and were generally a very successful affair.

Ogden is afflicted with the tramp nuisance. A "wagon load" of the affliction were juggled Saturday night.

The "Ancient Capital" is exercised over the frequent occurrence of fires, which are believed to be incendiary, and agitates for a new fire watchman, or the employment of a man to wake the old one up in case of fire.

The Reporter, Vienna, Idaho, announces the Pioneer mines of the Middle Fork Country a grand find. Forty or fifty disgusted miners report the only find in the new diggings had been clay "color" and that there is no gold on the bar.

The stage bearing Wells, Fargo & Co.'s treasure box, with \$20,000 coin, was fired into by road agents last Tuesday night. Passengers and treasure escaped through a plucky return of the fire and a vigorous application of the driver's whip.

Registration is the prevailing epidemic in Utah. The commission appointed under the Edmunds bill decided to appoint Registrars and proceed with the election for a delegate to Congress. Under the provisions of the bill, which disfranchises polygamists, the Gentiles expect to elect their delegate.

Great prairie fires are raging in every direction from Benton. Fires starting in the Chestnut country swept over Mand Coulee, and Box Elder to Belt Creek. Sheep and cattle men were driving their herds to places of safety. A second outbreak of the fires on Arrow Creek, and a blaze in the Bear Paw country are also reported.

The Mining Link, a bran new journalistic experiment, published at Laramie City, Wyo., in its valdictory, announces the adoption of so emphonic a title in order to verify the prediction of the lamented Darwin, that "the missing link will some day be found in the wonderful Territory of Wyoming." The new and original make-up of the entire sheet indicate that its editors do not propose to "ape" anybody or anything.

At Glendive a sensational rescue of a steamer under attachment occurred recently. The steamer Peninah had been "tied up" for wages due her crew. The owners organized a strategic force whose duty it was to dim the eyes of the watchful Deputy Marshall by the seductive influence of the flowing bowl. Their efforts were successful and under cover of the midnight darkness the plotters steamed off with the Peninah while the Deputy in charge was being entertained on shore by the bibulous stratagetic force.

The First Snow. About two o'clock yesterday morning the temperature became sufficiently low to turn the humid atmosphere, which had prevailed during the past thirty-six hours, into prismatic flakes of beautiful snow. At daylight four inches had fallen, and the landscape, which a few hours before bore the warm coloring of a delightful Indian summer's day, presented the appearance of midwinter. Periodical squalls continued until two p. m., when the temperature moderated and a thaw set in, which soon reduced the "beautiful" to a condition of slush and our streets to muck and mire.
