From the Daily of Friday.

Last week 135 car loads of cattle were shipped from Billings.

The Butte City Miners Union at its last meeting, held last Tuesday evening, elected J. W. Thomas, President in place of Henry Nichols, resigned.

Mr. J. D. Strrett has leased the room on East Broadway, formerly occupied by J. L. Hamilton's boot and shoe store, which he will fit up as an elegant bar and club room.

In the absence of electric lights, Manager Renshaw illuminates the street in front of the opera house by means of a huge bonfire, which lights up the approaches to the theatre in every direction.

The Knights Templars will meet to-night at Caplice Hall, to make arrangements to attend the corner stone ceremonies Saturday. Knights wishing to participate should certainly be present.

The Second National Bank of Helena, has received for circulation, an issue of the new brown backed National currency. The bills resemble in general appearance the National gold notes.

At Glendive last week, Frank Steery and another man attacked Officer McTung, who was trying to arrest them for disorderly conduct. The officer took considerable punishment before drawing his revolver, which he fired at Steery, who was dangerously wounded.

The Knights of Pythias, Odd Fellows, and other Butte societies have called meetings for to-night to make suitable preparation for the attendance in bodies, with the appropriate regalia and uniforms of their respective orders, the ceremonies connected with laying the corner stone of the Masonic Temple in this city on Saturday. All society members should attend their preparation meetings.

The telegraph line was down last night, between Butte and Helena, via Spring Hill, which is now the regular route. The MINER made an effort to obtain its usual fair report, over the military line via Deer Lodge, but it was ascertained that the military operator at Deer Lodge, where connection had to be made, was ill and the office closed. This will account for the absence of any report of the races in this morning's issue.

Renshaw Opera House.

Said: "Judging from our own business, the trade of Butte is far ahead of what it was last year and prospects were never more favorable than they now are. Butte has seen its hardest times; it's the floating population that talk about dull times. Legitimate business is on a solid basis and you hear no complaint from men who are doing that kind of business."

Said: "My business has not fallen off at all, if anything it has gained. Collections, as usual at this season, are perhaps a little slow. Our business this month will show better sales than that of last July, which was considered a bang up month. I look for a good fall and winter trade and an getting in shape for it."

Said: "The camp has had some setbacks, in the failure of one or two mining projects, but we consider it in a good and prosperous condition. The setbacks referred to were really beneficial to the camp, as they cleaned out some irremediable enterprises, which could have continued business only at the expense of their creditors. We consider the future of the camp as sure. The business community never sought or desired a boom. Business is on a substantial footing and the progress of Butte rests upon a solid basis."

OUR SILENT LETTER.

Prospects for the Fair—The Finest Lot of Horses Ever Brought Together—Electric Lights. Helena Theatricals.

When your correspondent first arrived in the city the place presented a rather dull appearance; but for the last day or two, owing to the fact that the Fair will commence to-morrow, things are beginning to assume a more lively appearance. The Fair promises to be the most successful of any previously given here, providing the weather is favorable. Although it looks rather cloudy to-day, I think that it will brighten up and the weather be first-class.

It would require a great deal of space to mention the names of the horses entered for the different races, but suffice it to say, there is a larger number of horses entered for the different races than at any previous fair ever held in Montana. I find from good authority there are between forty-five and fifty fine blooded horses entered for the races during the week. A fine lot of stock will be on exhibition competing for the numerous premiums offered. Floral hall will be nicely decorated by the dry goods men and ladies of Helena. A large number of strangers have already arrived here, and I think if they keep on coming in as fast during fair week, that Helena will possibly present as lively an appearance as Butte usually does on a Saturday evening.

I notice a number of electric lights in full force here. They are very brilliant lights, though they are very hard on the eyes as their light is very irregular. One moment you see a very brilliant light, and the next moment its brilliancy is almost extinguished. This irregularity I understand is owing to the fact that the power for running the battery is not sufficient for the number of lights furnished in the city.

The Nellie Boyd company played here for the past two evenings to crowded houses. I think the company is the strongest that ever appeared in this Territory. She will appear here during the whole of fair week, after which the troupe will go to Butte. Miss Boyd, the old Montana favorite, has received many prizes from those that have seen her and though on her former trip to the Territory it was thought she could not be surpassed by any one that came to Montana, it is now conceded she is even better than she ever was. Mr. Emery, formerly of the Sawtelle company, is a member of the troupe and is the "leading man." Emery, even in the day of Sawtelle, was considered a fine artist, had Sawtelle given him half a chance he has proven him to be an actor of fine attainments and good enough for any country. His first appearance on Friday evening was greeted with rounds of applause. The band that travels with the company is an excellent one, being granted that they furnish the finest music ever furnished in Montana. All in all the troupe is first-class and if the Butte people do not turn out to hear them when they come over, they will miss a rare treat.

HELENA, Sept. 20.

Sudden Death.

Martin Ryan registered at the Girton House Wednesday evening. He told the clerk he was not very well; that he had been under medical treatment for some time and had come into town from the wood-choppers camp at Yankee Doodle to see a physician. He did not appear to be particularly unwell, but occasionally coughed hard and complained of pains in the chest. At half-past two o'clock yesterday afternoon he came into the hotel office and advanced to the clerk's desk, holding his pocket-book in one hand, as if about to pay his bill, when he reached the desk he was seized with a violent fit of coughing, which terminated with two or three spasms, and fell to the floor. Mr. Milo French, proprietor of the hotel, was behind the counter and ran to the man when he saw him fall. Seeing that the case was a serious one he left Ryan in charge of some by-standers and ran for a physician. Dr. Hough responded to the call immediately, but when he reached the hotel the man was dead. The coroner was notified and took charge of the body, which by his direction was laid out in a vacant building adjoining the hotel and left in charge of the undertaker to-day when an inquest will be held. It is impossible to ascertain the cause of his sudden death until an official investigation has been had, but the symptoms of which he complained, seem to point to a pressure of blood upon the heart, caused by a highly inflamed condition of the lungs, as the probable cause of death.

Coroner's Inquest.

An inquest was held yesterday upon the body of Martin Ryan, who fell dead in the office of the Girton House Thursday afternoon. Several witnesses were examined, but nothing was elicited, further than has already been published in the MINER, which indicated that Ryan had been suffering for some time, that a year from some affection of the heart. The jury summoned by Coroner Thompson found that "ceased came to his death by some disease of the heart or lungs, or both, or by some cause unknown to the jury."

CAUGHT ON THE FLY. A \$10,000 Bank Robber Arrested in Butte.

There arrived on the Helena stage night before last a very plain and unassuming gentleman, who might have been taken for a Choteau county sheep rancher or a Wood River miner. The gentleman appeared to have business on hand, and it was observed that he occupied his time principally in the examination of hotel registers and inspecting the livery and boarding stables of the city. Yesterday forenoon the gentleman in company with City Marshal Lou P. Smith and Deputy Marshal Lytle, visited Mr. Stone's stable, on Montana street and arrested a young man named Thos. Moore, who proved to be one of the parties implicated in the robbery of the First National Bank of Kewanee, Illinois, on the 14th of last August, and it then transpired that the unassuming gentleman was J. C. McGinn, one of Pinkerton's most efficient officers. He had followed Moore through Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, along the Northern Pacific railroad to Fargo, thence to Bismarck, Miles City, Billings and Fort Custer, through the country to Helena, where he took him to the city, where he landed last Tuesday.

The clue by which Moore was traced in his circuitous travels was his handwriting upon hotel registers, which proved an unerring guide for the detective. After leaving Custer the horse which he had purchased there proved an additional clue. The robbery was a highly sensational one, and created a great excitement at the time. About 6 p. m., after the bank had closed, Moore knocked at the door. A lady clerk opened the door, when Moore seized her, and aided by two other men, who immediately rushed in, forced her back into the bank vault, where they bound and gagged her. The cashier of the bank, J. D. Pratt, who turned out to be an accomplice in the robbery, was also bound and gagged and the robbers then proceeded to empty the till of \$10,000 in cash most of it being carried off in suit cases and in bundles carried off in broad daylight, through streets crowded with people.
