Cloned From the Columns of Our Exchange.

Reports from Montana's many and multiplying herds and flocks, up to the closing days of the year, in effect say: Fatness and health abound everywhere.

A bar of gold was recently cast in Nevada City, Cal., which weighed 490 pounds and worth \$122,000. This is said to be the largest ever cast in this country.

Sunny skies, dusty roads, and temperature but little below the freezing point have been the experience in most parts of Montana up to the holiday season.

The Koonam-Marengo murder case was thrown out of court at Deer Lodge on the 26th inst. by the United States laws, that Koonam having been tried by the Indian laws, and placed in jeopardy and judgment rendered, would not again be heard.

Allowing that 50,000 head of Montana beef cattle have been marketed during the year, at an average of \$60 per head, it will be seen that our stock growers are able to furnish a pocket change for the season's sales.
