CAPITAL GOSSIP

What the Committees are Doing—A Slice of Idaho Liable to Go to Washington.

WASHINGTON, February 24.—Mr. Morrill called up the House bill permitting National banks to change their name, location and capital by a vote of two-thirds of their shareholders. The bill makes no changes in the approval of the Comptroller of Currency.

Mr. Beck thought an important change ought to be made subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury. Mr. Beck charged that the Comptroller approved to work to the disadvantage of the National Banks. He wanted to substitute "Secretary of the Treasury" in the bill, but this was lost.

On motion of Mr. Hoar, an amendment was made to the bill limiting the right of a bank to change its location so that it shall not change to another State nor to a place more than thirty miles distant from its original location. The bill was passed.

The bill authorizing President to grant permission to one or more officers of the army to accept temporary service from the Government of the United States was passed. Mr. Hoar offered an amendment permitting the officers to accept compensation from the Government of the United States.

The bill authorizing the Secretary of Education to make a report to the Senate on the condition of the public schools in the United States was passed.

On behalf of the Committee on Railroads and Canals, Mr. Murphy, of Iowa, called up and the House proceeded to consider in Committee of the Whole, the Hepburn bill.
