This morning in the police court M. Goodman, a tailor and dealer in second clothing in Helena, was tried for brutally beating his ten-year-old boy, and fined therefor \$100 and costs of suit.

His trial took place this morning at 10 o'clock, when the above evidence was given by the witnesses. Goodman refused to be sworn, stating that he would appeal the case anyhow, and that he was justified in chastising his boy.

Upon the conclusion of the testimony the City Attorney made a few remarks, stating that there were no extenuating circumstances, and recommending the imposition of a heavy fine.
