

RACING PROGRAMME. For the Seventeenth Exhibition of the M. A. M. & M. A., to be held at Helena August 23d, 24th, 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th, 1886.

CONDITIONS. Three horses to enter and three to go. No horse will be allowed to compete that has not some merit or reputation for speed.

Entries for running races must be made with the Secretary, in sealed envelope, enclosing ten per cent. of the total amount of the purse before 6 o'clock p. m. of the day preceding that upon which the race is to take place, unless such day falls upon Sunday; then the entries for Monday's races shall close on the Saturday preceding at 6 o'clock p. m.

Entries for trotting races close in the usual manner with the Secretary before 6 o'clock p. m. on the Saturday preceding the Fair.

Nominations in the stake races (Nos. 5, 7, 8 and 10) close June 1st. Each nomination must be accompanied with \$25 and a full description of the animal. The remaining \$25 must be paid before the rider or driver weighs in for the race.

Each entry shall plainly state name, age, color and sex of horse, name of sire and dam, when known, and name of owner. The color of rider or driver must also be given with the entry.

No entry accepted unless accompanied by the money, and under no circumstances will any conditional entries be received. No added money will be given for a walk over.

The first horse that passes the winning post shall receive seventy per cent, the second horse twenty per cent, and the third horse ten per cent. of the purse or stake for which he is running or trotting.

Running horses are required to carry in class stakes and purses—two-year-olds, 105 pounds; three-year-olds, 110 pounds. In all aged stakes and purses—two-year-olds, 85 pounds; three-year-olds, 107 pounds; four-year-olds, 117 pounds; five-year-olds, 121 pounds.

Five pounds less in heat races; three pounds allowed mares and geldings. The Association reserves the right to alter, amend or postpone any or all of these races should the Board of Directors in their judgment and for cause deem it expedient so to do.

- 1. Purse \$200; running; 600 yards. 2. Purse \$300; running; seven furlongs. 3. Purse \$400; trotting; 3.00 class.

TUESDAY—SECOND DAY.

- 4. Purse \$300; running; half mile heats. 5. Derby stakes; running; for three-year-olds, \$50 each, half forfeit, \$500 added; one mile and a half.

WEDNESDAY—THIRD DAY.

- 6. Purse \$400; trotting; 2.32 class. 7. Helena stakes; trotting; for two-year-olds, \$50 each, half forfeit, \$300 added; mile heats.

THURSDAY—FOURTH DAY.

- 8. Pioneer stakes; running; for two-year-olds, \$50 each, half forfeit, \$250 added; three-fourths of a mile. 9. Purse \$300; running; one mile.

FRIDAY—FIFTH DAY.

- 10. Montana stakes; trotting; for three-year-olds and under, \$50 each, half forfeit, \$500 added; mile heats. 11. Purse \$300; running; three-fourths of a mile.

SATURDAY—SIXTH DAY.

- 12. Purse \$500; running; one mile and a half. 13. Purse \$500; trotting; 2.35 class. 14. Purse \$250; running; for two-year-olds, half mile, handicap.

SUNDAY—SEVENTH DAY.

- 15. Purse \$300; running; one mile handicap. 16. Purse \$400; trotting; 2:40 class. 17. Purse \$200; running; three furlongs. 18. Purse \$400; running; one mile and a quarter, handicap.

Parties intending to be present at the meeting and desiring stalls for their horses are requested to write to the Secretary in advance, stating what horses they have and what stalls they are likely to require.

Oberlin College Fire--Wild Excitement of Students.

CLEVELAND, January 9.—There were scenes of the wildest excitement in Oberlin College at 1 o'clock this morning. At that hour flames burst from the third story of the lady's hall, a brick structure connected with the college and in which 150 female and 100 male students were accommodated. The girls were sound asleep when the alarm was raised, and when they were awakened they rushed from their rooms into the street clad simply in their night garments. The weather was intensely cold, and it was difficult to get water into the building. The hall was completely destroyed. The loss on the structure and contents is placed at \$50,000. The students on the upper floors lost all their effects. So far as can be learned nobody has been injured.

A Journalist's Home. SPRINGFIELD, O., Dec. 16.—It has often been said of newspaper writers that they are a thrifty set, that they never provide for the proverbial rainy day. There have been notable examples of the contrary, one of whom lives just north of this city, in the beautiful Mac-o-chee valley of Logan county. The place is called Mac-o-chee, and is the home of the journalist Don Platt.

Mr. Platt inherited his thrift from his Jacobin ancestry. John H. Platt, an uncle of his, was a successful merchant and banker of Cincinnati, and contributed much to the early prosperity of that city. Mr. Platt's grandfather was an officer who distinguished himself in the revolution. The Platts have always been possessed of considerable property, and well they may. The owner of this beautiful house at Mac-o-chee has had a sufficiently varied career to distinguish any family. From a promising lawyer to a judge, then from secretary of the Legation at Paris under the administration of President Pierce to charge of affairs. From a private in the war of the rebellion to a colonel. Then a member of the Ohio legislature, and afterwards from a newspaper correspondent, and the most brilliant of the times, to the proprietorship of the Capital, a journal which George Alfred Townsend assisted him in founding, but which the shrewd Col. Platt abandoned because it was unprofitable. Col. Platt inherited, with his Jacobin thrift, much of his self-reliance and also some of their cynical disposition, which latter has brought him at sword's points with those who dared criticize or restrain him.

President Lincoln well expressed this trait of Col. Platt's when the latter was proposed as a successor to Gen. Schenck, who had been elected to congress. Mr. Lincoln said: "Schenck and Platt are both good fellows. If there is any rotten apple in the barrel they can be counted on to look 'em out; but, gentlemen, they run their machine on too high a level for me. I don't have much obedience, but a little is necessary, you know."

That was just it. Col. Platt had natural talent enough to be one of the foremost statesmen of the country. His home might have been the "White House" or political mansion, but the proprietor of Mac-o-chee could not be bent or restrained. He was considered a dangerous man in politics, and has therefore been passed by.

His home, though, is a credit to the state. It is built of a creamy tumbled stone, quarried right on his estate. In fact, all the wood used in its construction, with the exception of the pine, was grown there also. He has been adding to the house for the past thirty years, so that the building now measures 55x100 feet, and must have cost at least \$20,000. It is situated in a delightful valley and is, indeed, one of the beautiful homes of America. J. B. FENTON.
