A HOME ENTERPRISE

The Havre Brewing company brought in their first consignment of beer to the Havre market Thursday morning. Although the first brew seems to be up to standard in every respect, the management claim the second brew will eclipse anything yet put on the market in this city. Havre beer will be introduced in all the towns along the Great Northern as far as Glasgow. The bottling plant has not yet been established, but will be in operation sometime this fall.

The company is now engaged in excavating for a large reservoir to hold their winter's supply of water. The new brewery wagon makes daily trips to Havre and the home enterprise is being well patronized. A telephone system has been established between here and the brewery.

CHESTNUT STARTS BUILDING

Lease & Richards, contractors, with headquarters at Great Falls, have been awarded the contract for the erection and completion of a two story and basement brick and stone building for Frank Chestnut. The building will be situated on Third Avenue, adjoining the Chestnut block. The building when completed, including heating, bar fixtures, second story uncompleted, will cost \$12,500. The interior design is very unique and original, prepared by C. S. Haine, architect of Helena. When completed, it will be one of the finest and most complete taverns in Montana.

GAMBLERS RETIRE.
