CITY COUNCIL.

The city council met in regular session Monday night with all the aldermen present excepting Young. The matter that created considerable discussion was the safety of the Pepin-Demar building on Main street. Part of the east wall was condemned by City Engineer Swearingen before the reconstruction was begun, but his advice was unheeded and the result is that unless some steps are taken by the owners to add additional support to the heavy building that it will in all probability be condemned by the city council. Aldermen Ober, Wallinder and McIntyre are a committee to recommend what action will be taken on same at the next meeting.

Mayor Newman recommended that the city secure a new blank Ordinance & Resolution book and that all the revised ordinances be written by hand in the ordinance book and same kept in a safe place for record.

City Clerk Kelly asked for a fifteen days leave of absence and same was granted.

Resolution No. 7 was adopted, creating a special improvement district for the purpose of laying water mains and the tax payers were given until the 15th of September to make a protest.

The meeting adjourned to Friday night, when the revised ordinances will be read and acted upon.
