NOTICE OF ELECTION, CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

Substitute for House Bill 1, 4 & 5.

"An Act Entitled, "An Act Providing for the submitting to the qualified electors of the State of Montana, for their approval or rejection, Amendments to Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Montana, by adding thereto three new Sections as follows:

Section 3. Prohibiting the employment of children under sixteen years of age in underground mines.

Section 4. Making a period of eight hours a day's labor on public works, and in mills, smelters and underground mines.

Section 5. Providing for legislation to enforce the provisions of this Article. Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Montana:

Section 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Montana, at the next general election to be held within this State, the following amendments to Article XVIII of the Constitution of the State of Montana, relating to Labor:

Section 3. It shall be unlawful to employ children under the age of sixteen (16) years of age in underground mines.

Section 4. A period of Eight Hours shall constitute a day's work on all works or undertakings carried on or a day by any Municipal, County or State Government, and on all contracts let by them, and in Mills and Smelters for the treatment of ores, and in underground mines.

Section 5. The Legislature by appropriate legislation shall provide for the enforcement of the provisions of this Article.

Section 2. The vote upon this Amendment shall be counted and canvassed by such persons, and in such manner as provided by law for the counting and canvassing of the vote for Member of Congress and if a majority of all the votes cast at said election, for and against said amendment shall be in favor of the amendment, the Governor of the State shall immediately so declare by public proclamation, and said amendment shall be in full force and effect as part of the Constitution from and after the date of said proclamation.

Section 3. The official ballots to be used at the general election to be held in November, 1904, shall have printed thereon the following words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution Relating to the Rights of Labor," and the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution Relating to the Rights of Labor."

Section 4. All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.

Approved December 10, 1903.

THE PEOPLE GET NOTHING.

Republican organs are asking people to vote for Republican candidates for the legislature so that Tom Carter may go back to the United States senate. The Northern Pacific wants him. He is the chief land agent of that corporation. By his cunning the Northern Pacific has pocketed some \$10,000,000 that belonged to the people and it would like to make another haul.

Are the people of Montana to get nothing from the next legislature? They want a railroad commission; they want a primary nomination law; they want an initiative and referendum amendment submitted to them, so that they can vote for it. A good fellow servant law is needed.

They will not get one of these things from a republican legislature. Tom Carter will see to that. They will get Tom Carter into the senate and nothing else, if they elect a republican majority to the legislature. That won't pay. Let the Northern Pacific take care of its own land agents.

INFANT INDUSTRIES.

The Republicans speak of the manufacture of barbed wire, wire nails, tin plate and other commodities as "infant industries," and say the American people must go down in their pockets and subsidize these "infants" with high tariff duties.

These articles are manufactured in America, from American, raw materials, are protected from foreign competition by high duties, and are then carried across the ocean and sold in foreign markets at lower prices than in American markets.

The Montana rancher, mechanic and laborer pay from 30 to 100 per cent more for dinner pails, nails and barbed wire than they are sold for in England and other foreign countries to which they are exported. That is the way the Dingley law helps the American farmer, mechanic and laborer.

Practically every manufactured article that is protected by the Dingley law is sold at a lower price in foreign markets than in the American market. American steel rails are sold at \$28 a ton in America and at \$21 a ton in Canada.

One American railroad runs for a short distance through Canada. It bought steel rails in Pittsburg. On the American side it paid \$28 a ton and on the Canadian side \$21 a ton for the same rails from the same mill. Hurrah for Roosevelt and bogus protection.
