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
Pullman of Palace Car Fame.
George M. Pullman, the palace car magnate, was born on a farm at Brocton, Chautauqua county, N. Y., 68 years ago. He started in life by working in a country store for \$40 a year. He went to Chicago in 1860 and made

money as a contractor. Then he went to Pike's peak as a gold prospector, and when he returned to Chicago in 1864 he built his first sleeping car. He has been building them ever since to such good purpose that he is now many times a millionaire, as everybody knows.

For Governor of Kansas.

David Overmyer, the Democrat's nominee for governor of Kansas, was born at Circleville, O., in 1847 and was educated at Asbury university, at Greencastle, Ind. He was admitted to the bar in 1870 and removed to Topeka a few years later. He has been a member of the legislature and an unsuccessful candidate for congress.
