

ANACONDA BOY ROBBER SHOT

A Young Local Desperado Attempts to Hold Up Saloon and Meets With Instant Death.

KILLED BY PARTNER IN CRIME

Con Kiley the Name of the Young Man--Family Greatly Shocked by the Deep Disgrace.

Anaconda, Sept. 27.—Con Kiley, a 19-year-old Anaconda boy, lies dead at the morgue with a bullet through his heart. Together with a companion he attempted to hold up the saloon of Hovarth & Kara, at the corner of East Fourth and Birch streets tonight and in the melee that followed he was fatally shot, presumably by his own partner.

When the burglars entered the saloon Mike Karas, one of the owners of the saloon, and Albert Selene were in the place. Karas was tending bar. Kiley entered through the side door. He wore a black mask. Running behind the bar, one end of which is near the side door, he forced the bar tender back toward the end of the bar near which stands the desk and safe. He ordered Karas to throw up his hands and as he obeyed, Karas knocked the revolver upward. The burglar immediately struck Karas on the side of the head with the gun, inflicting a scalp wound. Karas grabbed him around the waist, throwing him down and securing the revolver. Karas states that he ran for the side entrance and out of the saloon.

In the meantime Kiley's partner had taken up a position in front of the bar, and Karas avers that the former began firing. Karas, though considerably excited tonight, stated positively that he did not shoot Kiley, and that it must have been a bullet from the gun of Kiley's partner which laid him low.

Selene stated to a Tribune reporter that he grappled with the highwayman who was doing the shooting, but was not able to hold him. The revolver taken from Kiley by the bartender is a 41-caliber Colt's.

Immediately after the shooting a crowd thronged the saloon. Night Chief of Police Fitzpatrick and a number of policemen arrived quickly and Coroner Welsh was notified. He took charge of the body. It was a pitiful sight that met the eyes of the crowd in the saloon before the coroner arrived. The body of the dead boy lay on the saloon floor, the black mask with which he had disguised his features was pushed back so as to show his face. Death must have come quickly. Beside the body stood an older brother of Kiley, gazing stupefied down into the face of the younger brother.

Young Kiley had long been a resident of Anaconda. The family came to Anaconda about 10 years ago and the boy grew up in the city. A number of holdups have taken place in Anaconda recently, and it was believed that local boys were doing the work. The police are endeavoring to secure some trace of the one who attempted the holdup with Kiley, and have a strong clue on which they are at present working. Coroner Walsh held an inquest.

REPUBLICANS INDICTED.

Helena Leaders Who Assaulted George D. Freeman Up Against It.

Helena, Sept. 27.—It developed today that the federal grand jury, which was discharged by Judge Hunt on Monday, had returned indictments against former mayor Frank J. Edwards, former Chief of Police Travis and Sam Goodman, charging them with having assaulted Geo. O. Freeman, receiver of the United States land office in Helena, in the office of the receiver in the federal building.

When the grand jury was discharged Monday there were given to the newspapers 13 of the 17 indictments returned. It developed today that one of the indictments not given out was a blanket affair, in which the men cited to answer in court are those above named.

Another indictment was against Joseph Lazar, who is charged with unlawfully fencing the public domain. Lazar was arrested at East Helena by Deputy Marshal Garlow, and later he gave \$500 bail for his appearance.

The other two indictments have not yet been made public, the men not being under arrest. It appears that neither Edwards,

Travis nor Goodman were formally placed under arrest. They were notified during Monday afternoon that they had been indicted and they called at the office of the court clerk. They were told of the amount of their bail and today they appeared and furnished it, and were released from custody. It is probable that they will, in company with a number of others indicted by the grand jury, appear in court tomorrow morning and plead to the indictments. The bail in each case was fixed at \$300. COLD-BLOODED MURDER.

Bob Gates of Big Fork Found With Bullet Holes Through Body.

Katispell, Sept. 27.—What is thought to have been a cold-blooded murder has been reported from Big Fork. A man by the name of Bob Gates, who has lived in this country for a number of years, started from the town of Big Fork last Thursday and went up the river to the lake on a hunting and fishing trip.

Nothing more was heard from him until Sunday afternoon when a man who has been employed scaling logs on the river came upon his cold remains, about two miles from the mouth of Swan lake.

His faithful dog was guarding his body, and would not permit of a close inspection at first. It was finally discovered that he had been shot twice through the body, the last shot entering his left side near the heart and causing death instantly. His rifle was about eight paces from him, lying up on the gravel bar from which he had been fishing.

Forty yards distant an empty rifle shell of a 32 special was found, and as it didn't fit his gun it is supposed to be one of the shells used in his death. It is presumed that he was probably shot last Saturday as the string of fish he had was fresh when found.

The body was taken to the town of Big Fork and the coroner held an inquest today with the county attorney in attendance. The result is not known.

As he was 70 feet away from all brush and timber all thoughts of his having been taken for an animal are put aside, as he was in an open space and must have been standing when shot.

"The murder is supposed to be the result of an old quarrel he had with some person."

VERY LITTLE RADIUM.

Entire Supply of the World Is One-Tenth of an Ounce.

Says Sir William Ramsay: "I do not suppose there is one-tenth of an ounce of radium in the whole world. If you can imagine getting that amount of radium together it would supply more energy than 250 tons of dynamite. Few persons who talk about radium and its components realize the great scarcity of the raw material for yielding radium in the exceedingly minute particles used in the experiments that have astounded the world. It is impossible to say where the future supply of raw material is to come from. I believe that in America carnotite looks promising as a basis for it. Clearite, a mineral found in Norway, is also looked upon as a favorite source of supply. Dealing with the possibilities of radium is much like speculating upon the future of a babe in arms. We must watch it develop into childhood and mature growth before we can talk much about its future. There is still plenty of room for a complete revision of the original dieta concerning radium and helium. Science has shown that the emanations of radium can be dealt with as a gas. In tubes its passage may be followed by the eye in darkened rooms. Experiments made by Prof. Soddy and myself determine by direct measurements the rate of decay of radium as one-thousandth of the mass per year, which gives the average life of the radium atom about 1,000 years. The rapid rate of decay renders it out of the question to assume that in the radium now existent we are dealing with the residue of a larger quantity reduced by decay to its present amount. So far as the commercial advantages of radium are concerned, they are only apparent as yet in medicine. Radium is, I believe, a sure cure for certain forms of cancer, tumor, and lupus."

AN ODD PHENOMENON.

Showers of Rain Can Come From a Cloudless Sky.

It appears that rain can fall from a cloudless sky. This is true of a thin drizzle which falls in France, known as "cassini." As the atmosphere looks quite clear when it falls, the probability is all in favor of the moisture having been brought by the wind at a great elevation. In the island of Mauritius the phenomenon is by no means uncommon during the prevalence of southeast winds, slight showers falling in cloudless evenings when the stars are shining brightly. There the rain is thought to be due to invisible vapor in the upper reaches of the atmosphere, being condensed at once and falling in drops without passing through the intermediate stage of cloud. Ross said that in the south Atlantic it rained on one occasion for upward of an hour while the sky was altogether free from clouds. Says a Genoese naturalist, "The night was clear, the stars were shining with their accustomed brilliancy, when a shower of rain, consisting of large lukewarm drops, fell during six minutes upon the town." A similar view was once observed at Constantine, in Algeria, about noon, the sky being all the time a splendid blue. Some believe that these showers are the result of particles of ice formed in the higher regions melting and falling, while others attribute them to currents of warm and cold air traveling in opposite directions, with the result that the latter condenses some of the moisture in the former and causes it to fall.

OLD TIME MANNERS.

The Exaggerated Courtesy of the Eighteenth Century.

In Social England the following appears as indicating the exaggerated courtesy of fashionable people early in the eighteenth century: "Chatterfield teaches that it is boorish to congratulate a friend on his approaching marriage with merely 'I wish you joy,' when he should have said, 'Believe me, my dear sir, I have scarce words to express the joy I feel upon your happy alliance with such and such a family.' The 'compliment of condolence' on a bereavement should not be, 'I am sorry for your loss,' but 'I hope, sir, you will do me the justice to be persuaded that I am not insensible of your unhappiness, that I take part in your distress and shall ever be affected when you are so.' His child began his lessons in 'breeding' at nine years old, having till then learned Latin, Greek, French, history and geography. He is warned to beware of using proverbial sayings in his speech, such as 'One man's meat is another's poison,' or 'Every one to his taste, as the good man said when he kissed his cow.' He must attend to the graceful motion of his arms, the manner of putting on his hat and giving his hand. Horace Walpole's entrance into a room is described by an eyewitness as in the style of affected delicacy which fashion had made almost natural, chapeau bras between his hands, as if he wished to compress it, or under his arm, and feet on tip-toes, as if afraid of a wet floor."

Origin of Texts.

The custom of taking a text as the basis of a sermon originated with Ezra, who, accompanied by several Levites in a public congregation of men and women, ascended a pulpit, opened the book of the law and, after a prayer, "read in the book in the law of God distinctly and gave the sense and caused them to understand the reading."

Previous to the time of Ezra the patriarchs delivered in public assemblies either prophecies or moral instructions, and it was not until the return of the Jews from the Babylonish captivity, during which they had almost lost the language in which the Pentateuch was written, that it became necessary to explain as well as to read the Scriptures to them.

Elongated Palates.

It is not an uncommon thing to suffer for an elongated palate, which causes great discomfort in various ways. It is inflamed by cold and then aggravates a persistent cough. It brings a sense of oppression in one's breathing, and it is sure to make itself felt in long continued talking. Doctors are generally loath to touch it. Perhaps the most quickly efficacious treatment recommended by them is gargling with alum water just before brushing the teeth. This has been known to work a radical bettering of the distress.—Pearson's.

Jumping.

Long and high jumping alike give elasticity of movement to the person with sluggish, heavy gait. The high jump should be practiced over a piece of cotton fixed to two poles or other supports. This cannot possibly occasion a fall. A piece of white paper run on the cotton near the center will be easily distinguishable. The student unused to jumping should begin with a nominal height, say twelve inches, increasing this as advance is made in proficiency.


Left the Farm Perforce.
