## HOBSON-ROY GAME ASSURED

MANAGER WOODWARD OF HOBSON TEAM ANNOUNCES ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED.

### SAYS 2,000 VISITORS ARE COMING

Thoroughly enthused over the prospects for a baseball game of real league calibre and certain that fans from all portions of the county will flock to Lewistown on Sunday, September 12, when Hobson and Roy will battle for the championship of central Montana.

The contest will be played at the fair grounds, just north of the city, and efforts are being made to get a round trip fare of 25 cents from the city to the ball grounds.

#### A Good Diamond.

Mr. Woodward said that the grounds will be put into first class shape. The diamond will be moved and scraped, then rolled, while the outfield will be mowed. The diamond will be a fast one, and located close to the grandstand, which will seat 5,000 people.

#### Great Interest.

"You would be surprised to know what interest has been aroused this season in baseball among the leading teams of the county," said Mr. Woodward. "I will make the prediction that not only will we have a Hobson-Benchland, Buffalo or Moore next Sunday. They will all come to Lewistown, loaded with fans, to see the game. It is conservative to estimate that 2,000 people from outside Lewistown will come to see the game. Besides the western part of the county there will be large delegations from Roy, Phillet, Winifred and all of the North Judith basin country."

#### Fans Are Pleased.

The fans of Lewistown will surely be pleased at the announcement that the game will be played here. Local fans have had to travel far this season to see baseball, and both Roy and Hobson teams have entertained them in this way. The selection of Lewistown means the game will be played on neutral territory and as each team has won a game from the other, this, the third and deciding game, will be hotly contested.

### PHELPS PITCHES A GREAT GAME

HOBSON, Sept. 5.—With Phelps pitching unbeatable ball, as he did a week ago against Roy, Hobson shut out the Moore team today by a score of 11 to 0. The Hobson boys took kindly to the offerings of Clary and landed on him when hits meant runs. Clary's support was wobbly at times, a couple of the Moore regulars being out of the lineup. However, the game was much more interesting than the score would indicate, some dazzling plays being pulled off by both teams. Hobson worked the squeeze play twice and also pulled off a lightning double.

Only two hits were registered off Phelps, McElroy and Redman being the lucky ones. Phelps struck out ten men and did not issue a single pass. Clary only yielded six real hits and passed but one man, but the hits were made at times when they brought in scores. The Hobson team appeared to have completely recovered from its batting slump, being right up to the old form. Apparently all pitchers look alike to the sluggers these days. Hobson's victory, it is claimed here, makes the game with Roy, to be played at Lewistown next Sunday, a real championship affair. The winner will have the right to claim the unquestioned title to the championship of Fergus county. If the winner should beat Fort Benton and Forsyth, it could lay claim to the state championship. W. L. Lawson, general manager of the Billings sugar factory, and J. E. Logan, the secretary, arrived in Lewistown Monday morning by automobile. Mr. Lawson has recently assumed his office at Billings, having come from Sterling, Colo., to succeed W. C. Buernsey. These sugar factory officials are making a tour of Montana. Mr. Lawson has taken his first opportunity to do so. This was his first visit to Lewistown and the Judith basin, and his expressed opinion was not only complimentary, but flattering. He was sincerely complimentary in his remarks about the city itself, and the basin was a revelation to him. In company with Secretary Blodgett of the Chamber of Commerce, Messrs. Lawson and Logan drove some 80 miles about the surrounding country Monday, the primary object being to view the experimental sugar beet tracts which have been planted. This gave Mr. Lawson an excellent opportunity to see the grain fields as well.

### McCARTHY WILL FIGHT MORAN

SPOKANE, Sept. 8.—Manager Irwin, who is looking after the interests of Tommy McCarthy, the Lewistown, Montana, heavyweight, who is matched to meet Lou Bodie at Couer d'Alene, on Sept. 18, received word today that his principal had been matched to meet Frank Moran in a twelve-round contest in Boston on October 12.

Moran is the fighter who lost a decision after 20 rounds of fighting to Jack Johnson in Paris just previous to the opening of the European war. McCarthy will arrive in Spokane on Thursday and will start training for his bout with Bodie at once.

Bodie fought with a bandaged right wrist, which he fractured six weeks ago.

### CHEESMAN GETS FINE WHEAT YIELD

Secures an Average of Sixty Bushels From One Hundred Eighty Acre Field.

Henry Cheesman has finished threshing a 180-acre field of winter wheat at the Bank ranch at Deerfield and secured an average yield of 60 bushels per acre. He has another field of 320 acres yet to thresh. At the beginning of the season Mr. Cheesman expected an average yield and provided binnage accordingly. He now finds that he must add one-third more to his binnage capacity to take care of the wheat from this ranch.

### TO RUSH WORK

The contract for the building of the new railroad from Three Forks to Radersburg, awarded to Clifton, Applegate & Co. of Spokane, as already announced in this paper, calls for the completion of the work by December 15.

### DRILLING WELLS

F. L. Newbury was in the city Thursday from the Denton county, where he is drilling wells for a number of farmers. He has completed seven wells this summer, in that section, striking good water in all of them, at depths varying from 95 to 470 feet.

## HIGH AUTHORITY ON SUGAR BEETS

GENERAL MANAGER OF BILLINGS FACTORY SAYS FERGUS PRODUCT UNSURPASSED.

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"I have heard a great many monstrous things about the Judith basin," said he, "and I was of the opinion that its yield of wheat might make breakfast for the allies. However, I must say that since I have seen it, I think that the wheat of this basin could keep the allies well fed for a year, anyway."

### Secretary Blodgett Took the Visitors

Several fields of sugar beets which were planted last spring by way of experiment in the interests of securing a beet sugar factory for Lewistown. One of the first fields visited was that of the Vanek brothers near Brooks. These beets have grown this year entirely without irrigation, and some of them are nearly three feet from tip to tip. Another tract was that of Henry Cheesman ranch near Deer, and both places are ideally located for irrigation. Mr. Lawson made a careful examination of the beets themselves and an inspection of the tracts of land which would probably nurture the crops, and his opinion as an expert is one which speaks exceptionally well for the future beet sugar industry here.

### INSTRUCTOR RUPERT ATTENDS IT

A joint meeting of the agricultural committee of the Chamber of Commerce, and a committee from the county high school board, was held in Commercial club rooms at 8 o'clock Thursday evening. This meeting was called for the purpose of considering what courses of study should be pursued in the newly instituted department of agriculture at the high school. Mr. Sackett, principal of the institution, was present, and Mr. Rupert, the instructor of agriculture, was present. Mr. Rupert's desire to offer such subjects as would be of most value in this community so that the greatest practical benefits might be derived by the boys and girls who will, no doubt, live in this county and assume charge of its lands sooner or later. It was considered that it would be a wise plan to get the opinion of a number in regard to these courses and work along the lines decided, will begin at the high school immediately. So far, the agricultural classes have been receiving valuable instruction, based on scientific facts, concerning all soil and agricultural conditions, and will be able to take up specific ranches on a good fundamental knowledge.
