SOME NEW TRUNK SEWERS NEEDED

CITY ENGINEER TO PREPARE THE PLANS AND ESTIMATES OF REQUIRED EXTENSIONS.

BUSY SESSION OF COUNCIL HELD

Mayor Symmes, Aldermen d'Autremont, Sutter, Matthews, Smith, Vestrem, and Miller were present at the council meeting held Monday evening, while the following appointive officials were also in attendance: City Attorney Kirkland, Chief of Police Ray, Fire Chief Bebb, City Engineer Kirkland and City Health Officer Dr. Wallin. The acting city clerk, George Waltz, who was appointed to serve during the absence of City Clerk Pitton, who has gone to his former home in Madison, Wis., on a short visit, was in the clerk's chair.

A New Sewer.

The committee which investigated the extension of the sewer lateral from the Boulevard system to the property owned by George W. Kelly and William Sharpe, reported favorably. The report was adopted by the council and the extension will be made in due course.

Bond Issue Needed.

Engineer Kirkland was instructed to make a detailed report, showing what new trunk sewer was necessary in the city. Riverdale is one of the sections that is in great need of sewer connections. Mr. Kirkland said that there were a number of short extensions required, and a bond issue will probably be put up to a vote, for whatever sum is required. This is not thought to require a large sum, several thousand dollars likely sufficing. The engineer will report to the water and sewerage committee and in turn this committee will report to the council, for further consideration.

Wants Back Pay.

W. C. Green, who has been taking care of the boulevard strips along East Boulevard, says that he has back pay to the amount of about \$50 still due him. Referred to finance committee for investigation.

City Garbage Dump.

Dr. Wallin called the attention of the council to conditions at the city dump, near the Chan ranch, and presented his recommendations. He said that the people of that section made serious but genuine complaint of the present condition, and that the city could make certain improvements which would result in everything being fairly satisfactory and sufficient. The dump should be enclosed with a good fence, to keep stock off it, and to keep the tumble woods, etc., from blowing onto the adjoining lands. He said that the health department was not considering means for burning the inflammable rubbish, and he would soon report more in detail regarding this plan.

It is Different Now.

The doctor also called attention to violations of the health laws by parties who dump garbage within the city limits. Mayor Symmes stated that the board of health had ample power to act on these infractions.

License Granted.

The license for the Bon Ton rooms was granted last, the committee's investigation having resulted favorably for the applicant.

Stephens' Endowment.

Rudolph von Tobel stated that as he had been interested in the bequest of the late Oscar Stephens for the library and seeing no mention of it in the city treasurer's report, desired to know its present status. He was informed that this bequest, which was for the Carnegie library, had been placed at interest on good security, bringing 8 per cent per annum. The bequeathed amount is \$2,000 and the proceeds are used by the library board in the purchase of books. Mayor Symmes informed Mr. von Tobel that the entire amount had been turned over to the library board and that the city had nothing to do with it now, owing to the state law which requires such endowments to be so handled. However, the clerk was instructed to investigate what records there are of this endowment. The mayor also asked the clerk to see how long the term on the library board of the late Mrs. Charles Marshall is before expiring. A new member of the board will then be appointed.

HEALTH CONDITIONS GOOD.

Dr. A. W. Deal made an auto trip Friday to the Hobson, Utica and Benchtland sections, inspecting the hotels and investigating general health conditions, which he reports as being good. The doctor says that the roads were in good condition, except for a few mud holes, scattered along the highway.

SHOULD SHOP EARLY.

Now that the days are growing longer, some of the people forget that the stores close at 6 p. m. and therefore are late in getting there to do their shopping. It must be remembered that there is a nine-hour law in Montana which prohibits retailers from working over that length of time. Thus the stores are required to close their doors at 6 p. m. sharp. The merchants are required to adhere to this law, and the shopper should realize that he must be through with his buying when that hour comes along.

EARLY GUESSES ARE EXCEEDED FOR CONDENSED MILK FACTORY MORE WHEAT SHIPPED OUT OF JUDITH BASIN THAN HAD BEEN ESTIMATED. PROPOSITION FROM DENVER FOR ESTABLISHING SUCH A PLANT IN LEWISTOWN.

Almost 8,000 carloads of wheat have already been shipped out of the Judith Basin, by the Milwaukee and the Great Northern railroads, and there is considerable more of last year's crop yet to be marketed. The estimate of a prominent railroad man, given to the Democrat-News yesterday, is that the amount of last year's wheat crop, for shipment to the big markets, is 9,000,000 bushels. This is over 2,000,000 in excess of the estimated Judith Basin crop of a few months ago, made by the railroad men, and based upon the shipments to that date and the probable shipments to be made later. To this can be added over 1,000,000 additional bushels of wheat, kept on the farm for seed and domestic purposes, and considerable more which was consumed by the Montana Flour Mills company at Lewistown, being ground into flour. Thus the yield of wheat in the Judith Basin proper in 1915 was in excess of 10,000,000 bushels. In addition, large quantities of oats, barley and rye were also grown, and much of this has been shipped out. This big crop has brought much money to the farmers of the county and as a consequence there is general prosperity among the tillers of the soil. Other Shipments. The two railroads which supply the Judith Basin also shipped out 1,175 carloads of livestock during 1915. Hog shipments are on the increase. The Milwaukee alone shipped out 177 carloads of hogs to Seattle the past year, and during the past 50 days, the shipments were 50 carloads. This is a new course of income to the farmer here, and a lucrative one, too. When it is remembered that in 1908 the Montana Elevator company shipped out of the basin just one carload of wheat, that being the total amount shipped out in that year from the Judith Basin, it can be seen what a wonderful development in wheat growing there has been in this productive region. Another item of interest is that during 1915, 500 carloads of immigrants' goods were shipped into the Judith Basin. Generally a car means two families of new settlers, so this would indicate a considerable influx of this class of people. For This Year. It is a well known fact that the winter wheat acreage on the whole is not equal to that of last year in the Judith Basin, although a few sections report larger acreages than in 1915. However, with favorable spring weather and good crops, the total yield may not fall far short of a year ago.

GRAND LARCENY IS CHARGE AGAINST A WINNIFRED RANCHER

Charles Brostrom was placed under arrest Tuesday by Chief Stock Inspector Frank C. Lavigne and Stock Inspector Jesse E. Pinkley, near Winnifred, on a charge of stealing cattle belonging to the Judith Mercantile & Cattle company. He was arraigned before Justice of the Peace J. B. Seth a; Winnifred and entered a plea of not guilty. His bonds were fixed at \$1,500, which he furnished, so that he is now at liberty. The preliminary was set for March 7, in Justice Seth's court. It is alleged in the complaint that the defendant, killed a 3-year-old steer belonging to the P. N. outfit. Messrs. Lavigne and Pinkley also placed under arrest yesterday near Winnifred, Fred Triepke for not retaining a beef hide for ten days after killing the animal, as the law requires. He was fined \$25 and costs by Justice Seth, pleading guilty.
