VERY WELL KNOWN IN LEWISTOWN MILES CITY, March 19.—R. A. McDonough, a well known local man, was killed this afternoon when his motorcycle skidded on the Fort Keogh road, throwing him to the ground and crushing his skull. He leaves a widow, but no children. His parents live in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Mrs. McDonough's relatives live at Lewistown, Mont. Robert McDonough, who met a tragic death Sunday at Miles City formerly resided in Lewistown, leaving here about a year ago with his wife and locating in the Custer metropolis. Mr. McDonough is the owner of the Auto Tire Repair shop of this city, located next to the Lindsey Auto company and managed by his father-in-law, A. Haley. He was in personal charge of a similar business at Miles City. The victim was well and favorably known in this city and county, and his death comes as a severe blow to all who knew him. The decedent was a young man, not yet 30 years of age. He was capable and industrious and was meeting with success in his vocation. Telegrams were received here during the afternoon by Secretary Leopold Beck of the Elks' lodge and others, briefly announcing the tragedy.

PREPARING FOR CITY ELECTION

JUDGES AND CLERKS APPOINTED AND POLLING PLACES ARE SELECTED.

BUSY COUNCIL SESSION IS HELD

Mayor W. D. Symmes, Aldermen d'Autremont, Mettler, Vestrem, Sutter, Smith and Mathews were present at the city council meeting Monday evening, while the following appointive officials were also in attendance: City Engineer Kirkland, City Clerk Fliton, City Engineer Kirkland, Chief of Police Ray, Fire Chief Bebb and Police Judge Mettler. Will Make No Changes. A letter was read from the Security Bridge company asking that they be permitted to run the sewer in district No. 46 closer to the center of the street than five feet off center, owing to the fact the company's machine digger cannot work on that line. City Engineer Kirkland informed the company that there was a water main down the center of the alley and that experience taught that no sewer line should be closer than five feet therefrom, so he insisted on the work being done as specified. The action of Mr. Kirkland was ratified by the city council. Action Is Deferred. A schedule of new water rates made by the railroad and public service commission of Montana was submitted. There is a report that the supreme court decision is to the effect that the commission has no jurisdiction over tariffs of municipally-owned plants. Action deferred until next week. Want Water Extension. A letter from A. W. Warr was read, asking that the council again take up the matter of extending water mains from Brasscy street to certain property in Lewistown Land company's addition, as the frost was out of the ground. George Forbes, secretary of the company, appeared on the same matter. About Saloon License. Anticipating a petition of S. B. French, owner of a saloon license which had been operated in the Day house, for a removal of same to some other place of business, E. W. Mettler appeared as attorney for Jacob Holzman to protest. No action was taken, as Mr. French presented no petition. There is an opinion on record by City Attorney Kirkland in this matter, in which he held that the license owned by Mr. French is a saloon license like any other, and subject to transfer or removal upon some conditions as any other saloon license in the city. Grade Established. George H. Kelly asked for a grade on Water street, as he intends to erect a residence, corner Water and Fifth avenue. Mr. Kirkland submitted a grade, which was adopted. W. W. Watson asked for the building of a cross walk, near his property, which has been ordered some time ago. This matter will be attended to forthwith. For the Election. Judges and clerks for the coming city election of April 3 were appointed, being the same as for the last regular municipal election. Polling places were named as follows: First ward, Farmers' institute room, court house; Second ward, Armory hall; Third ward, city hall. Car of Pipe Ordered. Mr. Kirkland was authorized to order a carload of cast iron pipe, four-inch, at a cost of about \$1,300. The city engineer was also given authority to replank a bridge across the McDonnell ditch, near the Great Northern depot. Ask More Time. The committee on proposed trunk sewer lines asked for one more week of time. Granted. To Fence Grounds. The council, as a committee of the whole, during the past week visited the city dumping grounds and decided to proceed with the fencing of same in an effective manner. Cannot Keep Open. Chief Ray stated that several men who conduct restaurants in saloons asked to open early on Sunday before the saloons are allowed to do so. He was informed that the state law strictly forbade this. Building Notes. Fowls & Coulter offered a bond for protection of street paving in front of Big Bear building. Accepted. The plans for the new Woodman building were filed by Contractor Dyrant, but the specifications were lacking.

KIRKLAND GETS EXONERATION JUDGE ROY AYERS, UPON RE HEARING, SUSTAINS DEMURRER TO ACCUSATION. REINSTATES THE FORMER DECISION The matter of the demurrer interposed by the defense in the case of I. B. Kirkland alleged in an accusation filed by County Attorney Frank M. S. Gunn of Helena, to have received fees as city attorney in excess of the amount allowed by law, came on for hearing before Judge Roy E. Ayers Monday morning. This demurrer, it will be recalled, was argued last week and at that time Judge Ayers sustained it in full, which had the effect of terminating the whole proceeding. Immediately after, however, Mr. Wright asked for a rehearing and this was allowed. M. S. Gunn of Helena made the argument against the demurrer Monday, speaking at length. Col. C. B. Nolan of Helena, representing Mr. Kirkland, made an equally extended answer, and it was late in the afternoon when the matter was taken under advisement, the court announcing that at 7:30 he would give his decision thereon. At that hour Judge Ayers announced orally from the bench that the objection of the defense to the rehearing was overruled, and then for the second time sustained the demurrer, stating that his former decision, rendered last week, was reinstated. This finally disposes of the whole proceeding, exonerating Mr. Kirkland completely from the charges contained in the accusation. Judge George W. Plerson of Billings, who came here to hear the main case, in the event that the demurrer had been overruled, returns to his home Tuesday. WELL KNOWN HERE. G. W. JUDGE ROY AYERS, UPON RE HEARING, SUSTAINS DEMURRER TO ACCUSATION. REINSTATES THE FORMER DECISION

The matter of the demurrer interposed by the defense in the case of I. B. Kirkland alleged in an accusation filed by County Attorney Frank M. S. Gunn of Helena, to have received fees as city attorney in excess of the amount allowed by law, came on for hearing before Judge Roy E. Ayers Monday morning. This demurrer, it will be recalled, was argued last week and at that time Judge Ayers sustained it in full, which had the effect of terminating the whole proceeding. Immediately after, however, Mr. Wright asked for a rehearing and this was allowed. M. S. Gunn of Helena made the argument against the demurrer Monday, speaking at length. Col. C. B. Nolan of Helena, representing Mr. Kirkland, made an equally extended answer, and it was late in the afternoon when the matter was taken under advisement, the court announcing that at 7:30 he would give his decision thereon. At that hour Judge Ayers announced orally from the bench that the objection of the defense to the rehearing was overruled, and then for the second time sustained the demurrer, stating that his former decision, rendered last week, was reinstated. This finally disposes of the whole proceeding, exonerating Mr. Kirkland completely from the charges contained in the accusation. Judge George W. Plerson of Billings, who came here to hear the main case, in the event that the demurrer had been overruled, returns to his home Tuesday. WELL KNOWN HERE. G. W.
