KILLING ENDS A DRUNKEN ORGE
WHISKEY CRAZED FOREIGN LABORERS CAUSE REIGN OF TERROR AT COFFEE CREEK.
ONE OF THEM GETS JUST DESERTS

County Attorney Frank A. Wright and Sheriff Firmin Tulock went out to Coffee Creek Saturday morning to investigate the killing late Friday night of a man known as Frank Black, a Russian Pole, who was employed on a section gang in that vicinity. An inquest was held and the whole affair was pretty thoroughly presented. Black was shot by F. J. Nelson, who is now in the county jail, along with Mrs. A. B. Norton, Leo Miscoff and Tina Kerin, who were brought in late Saturday night by the sheriff.

A Drunken Mob.
From the evidence developed at the inquest it seems that Friday evening a crowd of section men, all of them foreigners, got drunk and eventually went to the rooming house. They started making trouble immediately and finally got hold of Mrs. Norton, who conducts the house, and dragged her to the rear of the place. She was completely terrified and began screaming and eventually broke away from them, entering the house. The drunken ruffians did not think she had gone into the house and went across the street to the office of Mr. Zimmerman, the justice of the peace, thinking she had taken refuge there. They broke the windows and were finally admitted by the justice. Not finding the woman, they left and just then Mrs. Norton, still thoroughly frightened, was coming out the front door of the Milwaukee house to seek protection. They spied her, seized her, dragged her into the middle of the street and were beating her. Her screams aroused Nelson, who was in bed in the Milwaukee house. He took his revolver, partially dressed and went out to the drunken mob. At that time Mrs. Norton was down and Black was astride of her, beating her over the head. Nelson fired at the man, the bullet entering the right side of the back and ranging to the left. This did not immediately check the mob, the men making a rush at Nelson, who fired again. Then they scattered.

Quite a crowd had gathered by this time and one of the foreigners who had been engaged in the evening's festivities, was caught and tied up, while a citizen went to telephone for an officer. It was reported then that the section men had armed themselves and were returning and the crowd appeared. The man who had been tied up was released by his comrades but the hostilities were not resumed. Black, the man who was shot, managed to walk off about a hundred feet, when he fell and died.

Wrecked the House.
It appears that earlier in the evening, the section men broke all the windows in the Milwaukee house, broke in the door and going into the kitchen smashed all the dishes. It was during these proceedings that Mrs. Norton was seized by them and dragged to the rear of the place.

Very little is known here of any of the parties. Nelson has been conducting an auto livery at Coffee Creek for several months. The witnesses were unanimous on the point that when he fired the shot that killed Black, the latter was beating Mrs. Norton while the drunken crew was holding her down in the middle of the street. As indicated by the evidence, it may be stated that while they were engaged in smashing the windows of the Milwaukee house, James Cape came along the street in his auto. As he came up his light showed the men with their arms full of rocks, some of which were instantly thrown at Mr. Cape, who had his windshield broken by them.

Miscoff and Kerin have been identified as two of the men who took part in the riot, while Mrs. Norton is merely a witness in the case.

LIMIT IMPOSED BY JUDGE AYERS
SIX MONTHS IN COUNTY JAIL AND A FINE IF 500 FOR MRS. CHRISTIANSON.

Mrs. Lennie Christianson, who was found guilty a few days ago of assault in the third degree, appeared for sentence in the district court Thursday morning and was given the limit by Judge Roy Ayers, six months' imprisonment and a fine of \$500.

W. H. Smith, for the defendant made a brief address in behalf of his client, stating that the defendant was not in the best of health and he felt that if a fine, without imprisonment, were imposed, the ends of justice would be met. She expected her son here shortly and any fine imposed would be paid.

Judge Ayers commented on the case so further than to say that he felt the defendant was very lucky in having the jury agree upon the lesser degree of assault and imposed the penalty. Mrs. Christianson did not speak and following the sentence was taken back to the women's ward in the county jail where she will remain six months, and if the fine is not paid, 250 days in addition.
