New Jersey Given First Place, Wescott Nominates Mr. Wilson.

AN ELOQUENT SPEECH

In Concluding, the Brilliant New Jersey Attorney Said: "Not I, but His Deeds and Achievements; Not I, but the Spirit and Purpose of America; Not I, but the Prayers of All Just Men; Not I, but Civilization Itself Nominates to Succeed Himself to the Presidency of the United States Woodrow Wilson."

COLISEUM, ST. LOUIS, June 15.—Nominations for president began at 10:14 p. m. Alabama yielded to New Jersey and John W. Westcott nominated Woodrow Wilson.

Applause was given to Judge Westcott's remarks on the policy toward Mexico. The crowd was attentive and met. It voiced approval of America's "tenaciousness of international law" of the crowd, however, were for the nomination.

It would have ignored the fundamental conceptions of moral progress and denied the right of fifteen millions of people to govern themselves. Ambition and greed were prepared to sacrifice America and all that America stands for, in order to acquire the wealth of Mexico. The diplomacy of "watchful waiting" averted these calamities and preserved in their original purity the principles of American freedom and justice. "Watchful waiting" repudiated the brutal dictum of science that the weak must go down before the strong. Help Mexico lest, over her bloody grave are sown the dragon's teeth of our own destruction. War with any European nation would have set the world aflame and stopped the march of progress for a century. Would anyone have had it so in order to affirm a "virile Americanism"? Is a "virile Americanism" bloodshed, destruction, the horrors of war and its uncertainties? The substance of civilization is the arts, the sciences, literature, industry, industry, the domestic virtues, freedom, religion and peace. But this is the substance of American nationalism. This is the virility of Americanism. It knows no national boundaries. It yet lives in the trenches and broken homes of Europe and pervades its very arteries. Therefore, America lives in the trenches and broken homes of Europe and its thrones. The stupendous conflagration is consuming the errors of statesmen and dynasties; it is not consuming the substance of civilization. Civilization is a unity. War with Europe would have cut asunder the moral forces that bind the nations and left an age of darkness, anarchy and despair. Standing on the immutable foundation of such Americanism, the schoolmaster and statesman, with consummate skill, a skill that commands the admiration of the world, direct the forces of civilization, not with arms, but with reason and moral pressure against the excesses of a belated world. From the smoke and ruins of a thousand cities, over the graves of millions of brave men out of the blackness of the battle smoke, arising from the obscurities of national passions, already the peoples of the earth recognize the dim outlines, growing ever more distinct, of the composite soul of America in the patient and serene wisdom of the world's real pacifist. Of what avail all the wealth of our beloved land if it had been consumed in the destructiveness of war? What avail the travail of human progress for the thousand years had not the schoolmaster and statesman been pacificator? His achievement is so vast that ambitious men are blind to its reality. But he plans millions, of all creeds and nationalities, recognize in it the imperishable glories of a Christian civilization. It glorifies the peasant and king alike. The schoolmaster is statesman, the statesman is financier, the financier is emancipator, the emancipator is the pacificator of the world. This is the nation accomplishing the destiny of democracy. The commanding fact of the modern age is the spread of intelligence. The schoolhouse has conquered ignorance. The printing press has transformed the purposes and capacities of man. Education has qualified him for a better existence. The Bible made him a moralist. Men know that the world is big enough to support the human family in peace and comfort. Men know that the great problem of peace and comfort is not yet solved. They know that it cannot be solved by the savagery of war. They know that its solution is obtained in the resolutions of peace, reason and a practical morality. This state of knowledge is the crowning achievement of progress. The American experiment of self-government has stood the test. The achievements of the American system are known of all men and felt throughout the world. The United States is the world's asylum. Here all laws, all conditions, all creeds are assimilated, helped, elevated and men are made its greatest progress, because it is progress in which all men have a part. That form of government which affords the fullest opportunity for happiness and comfort is destined to be the universal form. Such is the irresistible logic of progress. War cannot stop its inevitable march. The opinion of all men is more powerful than the opinion of one man. The best opinion of the best men, by the force of example and mutuality of interest, becomes the opinion of all men. American opinion is embodied in a man of peace. American opinion is marching through the world. When the imperialism of Europe cast the iron dice of destiny, America threw the moral dice of destiny. America staked the principles of her justice. There they stand in untarnished integrity in the gaze of a stricken world. The intelligence of men grasps the meaning of America. Her example will readjust the relations of men everywhere. The aspirations of men are for freedom. Men and women

can and should rule themselves. The day when they rule themselves will disappear. The hand of Divinity has so written it in the needs and necessities of humanity made in its image. America, prosperous, peaceful, blessed, is so because the inscrutable purposes of God intend it. The contrast between Europe in flames and suffering and the United States peaceful and prosperous is the divine contrast. By saving the American system civilization is saved. The peace of America demonstrates the folly of war. The principles of democracy furnish the means of avoiding and preventing war. The universal intelligence of men decrees that the now devastating Europe shall be the last war. It will end in a world's league for peace. Sons of America, keep unswayed the sacred shrine of peace, through whose portals will yet pass arm in arm the crowned head and the humble peasant in silent worship of God. Out of the ruins and sufferings of the present century whose dome will be the blue vault of heaven; its illuminants the eternal stars; its pillars the everlasting hills; its ornaments the woods and beautiful fields; its music the rippling rills, the songs of birds, the laughter of happy childhood; its diapason the roar of mills and the hum of industry; its creed, on which hangs all the law and the prophets, "Love thy neighbor as thyself." Above its altar, in ineffable color will live eternally the vision of its artificer. Therefore, my fellow countrymen, not I, but his deeds and achievements; not I, but the spirit and purpose of America; not I, but the prayers of all just men; not I, but civilization itself, nominates to succeed himself to the presidency of the United States, the presidency of a hundred million free people, bound in inalienable union, the scholar, the statesman, the financier, the emancipator, the pacificator, the moral leader of democracy, Woodrow Wilson. As Judge Westcott closed with a mention of the name "Woodrow Wilson" the crowd broke into a great demonstration. Moving picture flashlights blazed and flags were paraded in front of the stand. The band played "The Star Spangled Banner," while a huge banner bearing the president's likeness was unfurled from the roof of the hall. The delegates began a parade bearing state stanchions. Chairman James yielded the chair during the demonstration, to Representative Herlin of Alabama. Women delegates were among the pacifists in the aisles. Senators and representatives helpfully carry banners. Senator Hughes personally bore the New Jersey flag. Sergeant-at-Arms Martin stirred up the enthusiasm by waving the Texas "Lone Star" flag over the heads of the crowd from the chairman's rostrum. Other state flags were taken to the platform and the crowd joined in singing a medley including "How Dry I Am," "Old Blue," "The Red, White and Blue," "The Star Spangled Banner," "The Dixie," "The White and Blue," and others. After the demonstration had been under way 30 minutes, New York and some other delegates resumed their seats. Waving a cane over the rail at the chairman's desk, Senator Hughes renewed the clamor by leading three cheers for the president. The band exhausted the list of popular national airs, then turned to "Tipperary," the crowd joined in the chorus. Some of the delegates stopped demonstrating long enough to drain pop bottles and then went at it again. There was absolutely no attempt to control the crowd in the Coliseum while the demonstration was going on. The crowd roared and several women suffrage workers with golden umbrellas and yellow sweaters who mounted the platform and held a suffrage umbrella over the head of Representative Herlin of Alabama, one of the most vigorous "anties" in congress. He apparently enjoyed the situation. The band, its repertoire taxed, turned to such ancient ballads as "On the Banks of the Wabash" and "Turkey in the Straw." At 11:30 all but a few delegations had taken their seats, apparently ready to go on, and at 11:30 Chairman James sounded the first gavel rap. The demonstration had lasted 45 minutes. The roll call of states was resumed and Arizona yielded to Ohio. Former Governor Harmon of Ohio made the first seconding speech in behalf of President Wilson. The second speech in seconding the president's nomination was made by Governor Stuart of Virginia, to whom the Arkansas delegation yielded. Referring to Virginia as "the mother of presidents," Governor Stuart referred to the president as "her illustrious son." When Judge Westcott of New Jersey had placed the president in renomination and the nomination had been seconded by former Governor Harmon of Ohio and Governor Stuart of Virginia, the delegates wanted to wait no longer and cried "vote, vote." On motion of Senator Hughes of New Jersey the rules were suspended and no ballots whatever were taken. The delegates simply roared "aye" when the names of Wilson and Marshall were called and Chairman James declared them nominated by acclamation. Senator Kern, nominating Vice President Marshall, discarded a long prepared speech and simply said: "I re-nominate Thomas R. Marshall." The nominations of both candidates were completed at four minutes before midnight. Because the platform committee was not ready to report at 12:35 a. m. the democratic convention adjourned at 12:35 a. m. on Friday.

HAS MANY PLANKS

Democratic Platform Is Strong for Americanism and Reforms.

EVERYBODY PLEASED

Draft of the Platform Contains About 25 Planks, Including Those on Americanism, With a Denunciation of Foreign-born Citizens Who Conspire to Influence the International and Domestic Policies of the United States; Tariff, Preparedness and Woman Suffrage—Requests of Organized Labor Granted.

ST. LOUIS, June 15.—Senator Stone, chairman of the resolutions committee of the democratic convention, announced at 1 o'clock that it had approved platform planks and will send foreign questions, Mexico, the tariff and preparedness and that the suffrage and other planks still were under consideration. The plank on Americanism, including President Wilson's suggestions as to the activities of foreign-born citizens in conspiring to influence foreign and domestic policies, was among those approved. Chairman Stone said the committee was about half through and had now only domestic questions to deal with. He said the committee probably would sit all night so as to be able to present the platform to the convention Friday morning.

A tentative draft worked out by a sub-committee of nine was laid before the full committee for approval. The draft was about 4,000 words in length and contained about 25 planks, including those on Americanism, with a denunciation of foreign-born citizens who conspire to influence the international and domestic policies of the United States; tariff, preparedness and woman suffrage.

Members of the drafting sub-committee said tonight that there had been several changes in the platform as suggested by President Wilson. Secretary Baker, who brought the president's own draft to St. Louis, did say that it had no word from the White House today about any changes or additions. More than 1,000 suggestions were before the sub-committee from various sources and this delayed its deliberations.

The sub-committee consisted of Senator Stone, chairman, and Senators Webb, Hollis, Martin and Pomeroy; Representative Fitzgerald of New York, and Ralney of Illinois; Governor Stanley of Kentucky, and former Representative A. Mitchell Palmer of Pennsylvania.

It was in continuous session from 9 o'clock this morning until 8 o'clock tonight when it recessed for dinner. The platform as agreed upon by the sub-committee carried the Americanism plank as outlined by the president. It endorsed his conduct of foreign affairs and followed his recommendations regarding the attitude of this country toward foreign powers, except that the committee added a paragraph regarding Mexico, declaring it to be the duty of this country to lead American forces in Mexico until hereto American interests shall become improbable.

Planks were inserted supporting the legislative program of the administration. There was complete compliance in the draft with all the requests of the representatives of organized labor.

PRESIDENT STANDS PAT. WASHINGTON, June 15.—Word from St. Louis that some democratic leaders favored modifying President Wilson's Americanism plank to make its denunciation of political activities by foreign-born citizens less specific, brought an emphatic declaration from the White House late tonight that the president would not consent to such a change under any circumstances. The president's position was made unmistakably clear to his personal advisers at the convention by telephone and telegraph.

Two hours later the president's representatives in St. Louis telephoned his assurances that the plank would be adopted exactly as approved at the White House and that action on the platform would be taken before adjournment for the night.

At the conclusion of the 45-minute demonstration in his honor at the convention the president retired for the night. He left word that he should be awakened if there were any important developments on the floor of the convention.

President Wilson was notified at 1 o'clock tonight by Secretary Tumulty a few minutes after he and Vice President Marshall had been nominated by acclamation at the St. Louis convention. His only comment was "I am very grateful."

Prior to tonight's session of the convention the president was in communication with administration leaders at St. Louis on details of the platform and on organization plans for the democratic national committee. His decision to have Vance C. McCormick of Pennsylvania manage the campaign as chairman of the national committee, and to have Representative Carter Glass of Virginia, serve as secretary, was reached only after prolonged consideration and after consultation with democratic leaders here and in St. Louis. Mr. Glass already is in touch with the president's plans and ideas on the political situation and Mr. McCormick is expected to confer with Mr. Wilson within the next few days.


Mr. Wilson had gone to bed a few minutes before, after spending the evening with his wife and a party of officials receiving returns from the convention and waiting for the nomination, known to be coming. He retired, however, only after a telephone

message had come giving satisfactory assurance that reported opposition to the emphatic terms of his Americanism plank would not be serious, and that the declaration condemning the political activities of citizens of foreign birth would go into the platform as he had wanted. Aroused early in the night by word from St. Louis that some party leaders wanted to make the declaration less caustic and recast it into a more general stigmatism of such activities, the president notified his personal representatives at the convention that he would consent to no emasulation of the plank. So determined was the president upon the point that it was said he was prepared to go to St. Louis and carry his plea in person to the floor of the convention should persistent opposition develop. During the night session of the convention, up until the hour of his retirement, the president was in constant touch with developments at St. Louis. Brief bulletins describing the convention proceedings were flashed to the White House telegraph room and over the long distance telephone Mr. Wilson listened to the 45-minute demonstration in his honor on the convention floor. Mrs. Wilson, Secretary Tumulty and other members of the party, who had assembled to hear the returns, also listened to the proceedings.

VERDICT IN THE NITSCHKE CASE

JURY REACHES AN AGREEMENT AFTER STRUGGLE OF OVER TWENTY HOURS.

After being out more than 20 hours, the jury in the case of W. H. Nitschke came into court about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon with a verdict of guilty, leaving the penalty to be fixed by the court. The penalty for the offense is imprisonment not to exceed a year or a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or both such fine and imprisonment. The defendant was charged with having conspired with Lewis Eddy, a fugitive from justice at this time, for the theft of an overcoat from the Sweitzer store. The case was a peculiar one and the trial attracted a great deal of attention.

FOUR STAND OUT FOR ACQUITTAL

Up to just before the jury came in the members stood five for acquittal and seven for conviction. After considering the case all night, the jury reported yesterday morning and asked to have the testimony of Nitschke and Bullard read and Mr. Gibbs re-interested with the juror, and read this testimony. It did not seem to have any effect as the change came hours afterward. When the jury was polled, after announcing the verdict, it was found that four, Messrs Kynett, Parkey, Stanley and Goodwin, did not agree to the conviction.

DEATH OF MRS. HONOR GANNON AT GREAT FALLS SATURDAY


