FERGUS COUNTY REGISTRATION MORE THAN DOUBLED SINCE 1914

The work of tabulating the registration for the general election next month was completed Saturday afternoon by the county clerk and recorder's force and the total was found to be considerably in excess of all estimates, standing at 13,779. Two years ago, the total registration for the county was 6,290, so that the registration has been more than doubled since then. Of course, the extension of the franchise to the women is chiefly responsible for this big gain. The registration for Lewistown, by wards, is as follows: First ward, 1,207; Second ward, 815; Third ward, 1,019. Total, 3,041. For the primary nominating election in August, the registration for this city was: First ward, 1,023; Second ward, 658; Third ward, 873. With a total of 13,779 voters registered in Fergus county for the general election in November, it will require about 20,000 ballots to meet the requirement. The registration by precincts for this election, and also the registration for the primary nominating election held last August are shown in the following tabulation, prepared by County Clerk and Recorder F. R. Cunningham.

STORM DELAYS WHEAT SEEDING

LARGEST ACREAGE OF FALL GRAIN NOW PLANTED IN COUNTY'S HISTORY.

FARMERS ALL MARKETING WHEAT. The heavy snowstorm that prevailed Tuesday extended over a wide area and while it is generally beneficial, will delay threshing and seeding operations. County Agriculturalist Carl Peterson, who has recently been over the whole county, estimates that 80 per cent of the wheat has been threshed. In some particular sections the amount yet to be threshed will exceed this, while in others it will be considerably under the average stated. The storm will not injure the wheat now on the ground in the least.

Still Seeding. Mr. Peterson states that there is still a considerable acreage of fall wheat to be sown and his survey shows that more wheat is now in than ever before in the history of the county at this date. The big acreage makes a very large harvest practically certain next year.

Not Holding Grain. The farmers are not holding back their wheat in any part of the county this season. As a rule they are getting it on the market as soon as it is threshed, satisfied to take the very high prices prevailing. He has brought about a very satisfactory condition, since it has enabled the farmers to clean up debts and avoid interest charges.

Professor Parker Here. Professor J. R. Parker, assistant state entomologist, arrived here Tuesday afternoon from Bozeman and will spend some three days going over the county with Mr. Peterson to survey the insect situation.

LEWISTOWN BRANCH OF NATIONAL RIFLE CLUB DEFEATS MOORE CLUB

The Lewistown branch of the National Rifle club went to Moore Sunday afternoon where they competed with the rifle club of that city. The local team excelled at each distance, excepting the 300-yard shot, fire, which was tied. The scores were as follows:

(Continued from Page One.) found that the killing was entirely accidental and exonerated Mr. Napper. The latter testified that he had known the deer for some three years. On Thursday, he was with Mr. Sellers by auto on a trip taking up grain samples and attending to other matters, and going to Winifred. Returning by way of Hilger, they stopped there for a short time and were about to get in the car and start back to Lewistown, when the witness said he would get out a .38 caliber Colt's revolver, revolved the magazine in case any rabbits should show up in the light of the car. Mr. Seller was standing close to the witness when the latter undertook to draw the revolver from the scabbard and it was discharged.

"I'm shot," cried Seller and Napper caught him in his arms. The deer thereafter groined but did not speak and became unconscious almost immediately. Napper secured the immediate assistance of John Kelly and they carried Seller to Frank Myersick's room. Dr. J. C. Dunn was called up at Lewistown and informed as to the accident and instructed that the man be brought in immediately. Mr. Myersick's car was prepared for the trip. Mr. Napper testified that Seller died in his arms on the way in without ever speaking again. The witness was deeply affected on the stand.

Frank W. Myersick corroborated Mr. Napper's testimony, as did Mr. Kelly. Dr. J. C. Dunn testified to waiting for the arrival of the wounded man Thursday night, but Seller was dead when the party got in. The bullet entered the left side, low down, and lacerated the femoral artery, death resulting from internal hemorrhage.

REV. DONALDSON HOME. Rev. Charles M. Donaldson returned Saturday from a strenuous campaign in the interests of a dry Montana. Splendid rallies were held at Winnett, Flatwillow, Broadview and Forest Grove, and everywhere the people seemed ready to vote for prohibition. The meetings held were quite different from the usual rallies in that there were four in the party, forming a musical quartet, which sang many rousing temperance songs and quartet selections, making the meetings general and entertaining to all. The quartet was composed of Rev. B. Owens of Benchaud, Rev. A. Alton of Winnett, Rev. W. E. Brown of Grass Range and Rev. Donaldson of Lewistown.

SAFETY FIRST MEETING. Milwaukee employees held a safety first meeting at the passenger station Friday night, with A. W. Smullen, general chairman of the safety first committee, in charge. A number of interesting and valuable suggestions were brought out bearing directly on the important subject at hand.

CONDITION OF COUNTY FUNDS

AS TAX-PAYING PERIOD APPROACHES THE FUNDS ARE AT LOW EBB.

The report of County Treasurer Rufus Poland for September shows that there was on hand on October 1 in the county funds a total of \$57,995.48, and in the trust and agency funds \$111,512.96, making a grand total of \$169,508.44.

County Funds. Balances in the county funds on October 1 were: General \$3,703.98; road \$2,214.43; poor, \$2,951.25; bridge \$71.14; contingent, \$2,937.63; county sinking, \$24,808.11; institute, \$87.32; high school \$229.22; high school sinking \$19,997.34.

Trust and Agency. Balances in the trust and agency funds were: General \$4,786.14; district school, \$92,101.58; state bounty, \$110.45; state tuberculosis, 32 cents; state sinking, 70 cents; state stock bounty, 74 cents; state stock identity, 14 cents; livestock sanitary board, 12 cents; state insane asylum, \$3.97; coroner's estates, \$94.75; district court clerk, \$1,835.97; redemption, \$31.01; estates, \$9,309.90; Lewistown, \$98.55; Moore, \$174.65; Stanford, \$114.15; Roundup, \$229.79; Lewistown sanitary sewer, \$106.65; Lewistown boulevarding \$38.69; Stanford improvement \$177.89; Windham fire, \$1.78; unimproved business, \$281.56; Winifred fire, \$24.35; Hilger fire, \$12.56; Coffee Creek fire, \$49.62; Benchaud fire, \$46.84; Denton fire, \$4.29; Roy fire, \$288.42; Moccasin fire, \$12.70; Straw fire, 78.46; state exambler's deposit, \$2.50.

The disbursements in September amounted to \$2,794.53, from the county funds and \$18,906.66 from the trust and agency funds.

ROOMING HOUSE ORDINANCE IS UP

OLD ORDINANCE IS DIVIDED INTO TWO PARTS AND PASSED BY THE COUNCIL. TO RETIRE WATERWORKS BONDS

Mayor W. D. Symmes presided at Monday night's meeting of the council, with Alderman Smith, Kindsch, Matthews and Vestrom in attendance. City Attorney Mueller submitted a new ordinance regulating rooming houses and hotels. It is practically the same as the old ordinance in all respects except that it is now divided into two ordinances. The first refers to the issuing and revoking of rooming house licenses, providing a penalty only for conducting such establishments without licenses.

Rooming House Ordinance. The second ordinance regulates rooming houses and hotels and provides the penalty, a fine not exceeding \$200 or imprisonment not exceeding 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment, for violations of its provisions. Both ordinances were passed and became effective in 30 days.

To Retire Bonds. Mayor Symmes advised that the city retire \$25,000 of water bonds, of the issue of July, 1906, on January 2 next. The council concurred.

The agent of the Casey Candy company addressed the council, asking that punch boards for candy be permitted in this city. These punch boards, he said, were permitted generally throughout the state. They carried the full retail value in candy of the face of the boards. The council declined to take any action in the matter.

Judge E. K. Chesdale, representing J. G. Smith, asked as to the intention of the council with regard to closing Washington street near Mr. Smith's property. The committee thereupon recommended that the street be not closed.

Some time ago J. W. Hurbes presented a claim for \$1,000, setting out that a portion of Boulevard street traversed his property. The matter was referred to ex-City Attorney Kirkland, who retired from office without reporting on it. City Attorney Mueller was instructed to give an opinion on the matter.

Upon recommendation of the street committee, the sidewalks in front of the von Tobel, Sloan, Heavey and Baker & Sons' properties were ordered repaired.

The city engineer was instructed to repair the bridge at Third avenue and Hebb street and to put in street crossings at Main and High streets, and Main and Oulette streets.

A proposition to lease the city take over the sewer in the alley in the rear of the Watson property was referred to the sewer committee.

A resolution creating sewer district No. 48, the Hippe sewer, was adopted. A resolution of intention to create the Coleman sanitary sewer district, the sewer to be 320 feet long, was adopted.

CORN FROM WINNETT. Dr. A. C. Hiddle brought in several ears of Inokota dent corn from the Walter Swift ranch near Winnett. The ears are of good length with a finely developed kernel, and yielded fifty bushels to the acre. Mr. Swift has made an ensilage of the corn which he will use for winter feed.

DAUGHTERS OF JESUS ARRIVE

TWO SISTERS HERE FROM THE BATTLEFIELDS OF NORTHERN FRANCE. HAVE BEEN IN THE HOSPITALS

Direct from the scenes of carnage and destruction in northern France, which is all one vast battlefield, Sister Camilla, accompanied by Sister Garard, arrived in Lewistown Sunday and are now at the convent here. Sister Camilla came to America originally in 1903 and early in 1914 went back to France on a visit, intending to remain but a short time. She was caught in the war tempest, however, and the sister superior over there decided to retain her for assistance in the overcrowded hospitals. Thereafter until her departure Sister Camilla devoted her entire time to nursing the sick and wounded victims of the war. At the time they left there were 500 patients at the hospital with which they had been working.

The sisters sailed October 1, from Bordeaux, France, on the Espagne, landing in New York October 10. They experienced no difficulty on the trip or in landing, being provided with passports, but the day before they sighted Sandy Hook a report that a German submarine had sunk nine ships on the Atlantic coast caused their captain to circle far to the south to avoid the deadly torpedoes. The sisters are glad to get away from the scenes with which they have been so familiar and to enjoy the repose and sanity prevailing in this country.
